President's Message

Greetings on these warming says of Spring! The birds are singing and the flowers are blooming. Easter is just around the corner. God is good and the people are praising!

We, as members of United Women of Faith, formerly known as United Methodist Women, have come through a winter of many challenges. I hope and pray that you have all made it through these difficult times with grace.

First, it was COVID-19's continuation and the challenge of virtual meetings on Zoom. Now we are mustering the courage to gradually return to meeting in person. The "Turn it Up" Assembly 2022 is the first and largest meeting of United Methodists to occur since our Assembly in Columbus, Ohio in 2018. Ordinarily, there would have been a General Conference meeting (the governing body of the United Methodist Church) since we last met as United Methodist Women. But that has been postponed three times, due to the pandemic and the difficulty of international travel.

Then we had to navigate the re-districting in Greater New Jersey. I am pleased to report that many of our districts have handled this with grace and aplomb and are moving forward in mission. Thank you to those who have been working on these changes and elections and lists for the re-formation of our districts.

Lastly, our national organization, in anticipation of the pending upheaval and changes of General Conference, has been preparing for change for the last two quadrennium (eight years!). Their years of study and research and testing has finally brought forth a vision for a re-branded form of United Methodist Women,

that shall henceforth be called United Women in Faith. If you think back to the days of the "Ladies Aid Society" (before our time) or "Women's Society of Christian Service" (in some of our memories, but it was 50 years ago!), we can be grateful for the new name and the effort that went into its formation.

All of these changes could have brought a spirit of fear. But "there is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear (1 John 4:18)." "Finally, all of you should agree and have concern and love for each other. You should be kind and humble... Can anyone really harm you for being eager to do good deeds? Even if you have to suffer for doing good things, God will bless you. So, stop being afraid and don't worry about what people might do. Honor Christ and let him be the Lord of your life (1 Peter 3:8,13-15 CEV)."

These scriptures may have been among the beliefs that guided my mother, Deaconess Helen McCahill, during her 87 years of service to the last, the least and the lost. Her words appear later in this newsletter, in a story she wrote entitled, "Meeting Several Mr. Cooks." This story, read by my husband, Steve, at Mom's memorial service on March 26th, was one of the most-mentioned highlights of the evening. FLAG BURNING AT THE SPARTA UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

On the evening of January 1st, an unidentified individual drove onto the grounds of the Sparta United Methodist Church, 71 Sparta Avenue, and burned the rainbow flag that was suspended from a flagpole in front of the church. Two of the church's LGBTQIA+ members found it lying on the front lawn the following morning as they arrived for the Sunday worship service. Unfortunately, this hate crime was discovered by the very people the flag is meant to welcome.

The Sparta United Methodist Church has been flying the rainbow flag for approximately seven years since the congregation voted overwhelmingly to become a member of the Reconciling Ministries Network in the fall of 2015. As "Open hearts, Open minds, Open doors" is the message of the United Methodist Church, the Sparta UMC congregation values the inclusion of all who come through its doors. The young people of the church are especially appreciative of the welcoming message that affirms the inherent dignity and worth of all individuals. Upon hearing about the desecration of the flag, one member of SUMC's youth group made the following comment:

"Seeing the Pride flag outside of the church encourages youth to be themselves and lets us know that we are accepted at the church even though others may not accept us. It means inclusivity and love. It lets us know that we will be loved at the church no matter what. It's nice to see when you pass it knowing that there are people who are willing to accept and love you no matter what."

Since the flag burning occurred, the pastor of the church, Reverend Dr. Steven Bechtold, has received calls of support, as well as unsolicited donations to replace the flag, from Sparta citizens and members of surrounding communities. Because the congregation is committed to welcoming their LGBTQIA+ brothers and sisters, as well as all who wish to take part in the life of the church, SUMC will continue to fly the rainbow flag and display signs of welcome to all. The people of Sparta United Methodist Church extend thanks and gratitude to all who have expressed encouragement.

More Open and Inclusive

We are now United Women in Faith, choosing a new name and brand to embrace our desire to be more open and inclusive. In one of my conversations with other conference Social Action Coordinators, someone asked, even with these exciting changes:

"Who still is not yet welcome here?"

I am one of many people who hoped this new branding would be a more bold and non-gendered approach to faith, hope, and love in action. Perhaps this could have been the season where we defined ourselves as more than just one gender and truly opened this community to invite anyone and everyone to find a place here.

One of our members expressed similar frustrations:

"Right now, I am just super angry. My granddaughter, age 15 is gay. She has attended Mission U since she was 5... I can tell you she, and kids like her are watching us. They see the lack of care and compassion given to them by the church and also UMW. They know that they are unseen and unrepresented and are overlooked, to keep peace in the organization. Our lack of care is noticed. Our lack of care creates harm. Our lack of care is driving these kids from churches and will be the last nail in someone's coffin. When do they MATTER?"

Even before taking our new name, this organization made an effort to be open and inclusive to people who identify in Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, and Questioning Categories (LGBTQ). If you've attended an event hosted by our national organization, you've probably noticed they invite us to share our preferred pronouns. This is one small way of acknowledging the science that now proves gender and sexuality are a complex spectrum. Naming our pronouns is a small effort at making space to include and welcome all. In 2019, United Women in Faith also gave a substantial financial gift to the Trevor Project and Tyler Clementi Foundation, organizations advocating for young people who identify as LGBTQ and working for suicide prevention.

Still, we haven't yet done enough to make it clear in our national organization that we include and welcome everyone unconditionally. An advocate had this to say:

"At times I have been soul destroyed by their lack of willingness to say out loud, in public, where they stand on LGBTQ inclusion in regards the UMC. I felt it mostly strongly at the end of the last Assembly back in 2018. I was devastated that the question of inclusion was hinted at, but never named clearly...I am frustrated and sad and sometimes angry too. UMW has done a lot, but I believe has failed in taking the BOLD step they could take."

We also haven't really taken the next steps to openly include everyone in Greater New Jersey yet. We've listened to and learned from our diverse neighbors including some who identify as Muslim, Indigenous, Black, and Asian Americans. It's time to also listen and learn from our neighbors who identify as Gay, Transgender, Lesbian, Bisexual, and Queer. This year we will be adding an LGBTQ representative to our leadership team to help us do a better job of including, welcoming, and listening to neighbors who identify in these communities. I'll also be expanding our Social Action Resources to include some ways for us to learn and grow in our abilities to understand the intersectional justice issues experienced by individuals who identify as LGBTQ.

It's time to start acting on the commitment we made in our Intersectional Peace with Justice Resolution passed by our GNJ Annual Conference and submitted by GNJ UMW in 2020:

"The Greater New Jersey Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church makes a bold choice to work for intersectional peace with justice and to create inclusive communities that respect the dignity and sacred worth of all God's children, and honor our shared, common humanity."

Even while the United Methodist Churches continues to struggle with what it means to truly welcome all, even as United Women in Faith still cling to our gender-based labels for a little bit longer, we here in this Greater New Jersey Conference of United Women in Faith are working to create a community that includes and welcomes all without exception. We will keep asking,

"Who still is not yet welcome here?" until the day that there truly is no one excluded from our love in action.

Meeting Several Mr. Cooks

In Memoriam Deaconess Helen McCahill

In December 2018, my friend and her three teenage children were delighted to finally move into their first home since Storm Sandy in 2012 forced them into homelessness. The church in Ocean Grove loaned us the van to move the contents of their storage unit into their four-bedroom home. I was asked to pick up a young friend “Cook” at the train station in Asbury Park and bring him to help with the remaining stuff to be moved. He was described to me as a black male with an afro and gray sweat suit.

I pulled up to the door of the train station and saw three men talking. I called out for Mr. Cook. One gentleman came to the car window and introduced himself as “Cook.” I asked him to get in and commented on his different clothing than I expected. He told me how willing he was to help with my project and how pleased he was to meet me. As we drove toward my friend’s home, I explained their need for a dustpan and broom, and some breakfast food. We solved that at the hardware store and the food store.

He helped me carry the purchases into the house and suddenly I saw fear in my friend’s face. “This is not our “Cook,” they said. I said their “Cook” was not at the train station, but I thought this might be him. Everyone agreed that I should return this Mr. Cook to the train, but I wanted more directions for my transportation offer.

Suddenly there was a call for help and “Get an ambulance” from the upstairs. A friend who had helped the preceding day was having chest pains and trouble breathing. Two persons helped the sick man down the stairs, and I was asked to drive him to the nearby hospital. (It was not spoken, but we all knew that an ambulance would cost \$200.) My Mr. Cook said he had medical training from his military experience and wanted to sit beside the sick friend on the way to the hospital. Son Sean sat in the front with me in my Dodge Caravan. We traveled as fast as was safe to the Emergency Room at Jersey Shore Hospital in Neptune. A nurse joined our group as we went through the door. As soon as we saw he was being taken care of, we left for the train station. Shortly after we pulled away, I called out to the back seat and asked for Sean to respond. (He seldom participates in small talk, but Mr. Cook told me he stayed with his friend in the hospital.) A phone call told me Sean had been left behind. I said I would come back, but not until I had returned “Mr. Cook” to the train station. I stopped at the bank and got \$15 to give Mr. Cook. We agreed that this day had been in God’s hands, not ours. He thanked me for being the nicest person he had ever met, and could we marry? It was a day to remember. We said goodbye.

I returned Sean to his mother, and we all took a deep breath. I asked for my friend to make me a bologna sandwich for energy to continue the day. She said she had no dishes or silverware but made me a sandwich of the items I bought at the store earlier. I suggested she wash her hands and use her finger to spread the mayonnaise and mustard. It was delicious! I suggested the others have a similar sandwich and then we would have the energy to empty out the remaining stuff from the storage unit. All agreed that that chore could wait for another day. I did finally succeed with Sean in the car, to find "Cook" and bring him to help work on sorting and shelving many belongings.

As I told my story, many wondered why I was not afraid or more careful. My life has included so many people from all walks of life that fear is not my way of interacting with strangers. It was a very special day. I spent the afternoon resting. God is good. All the time.

What a hoot!

Black History Month Celebrations

Black history month, celebrated each year during February, is a chance for Americans to learn details of their nation's history that, unfortunately, are far too often neglected and pushed to the wayside. As the saying goes, black history is American history and it's a varied and rich history.

This issue celebrates just one of the Black inventors you probably didn't know about, Marian R. Croak, Senior Vice President (SVP), AT&T Labs. Croak holds over 135 patents, primarily in voice-over Internet protocol (VoIP) and another 100 patents currently under review. As SVP, Croak serves as a mentor for women in AT&T labs, and sits on the board for the Holocaust, Genocide and Human Rights Education Center.



Following are a few facts on Black History Month and the resources below provide a miniscule collection of additional information and reviews on famous Black contributors and contributions to America and other countries.

Origin of Black History Month. Black History Month was established in 1926 by American historian Carter G. Woodson, the father of Black History. This annual observance originating in the United States has received official recognition from other governments such as Canada, Ireland, and the United Kingdom.

Why February as Black History Month? Carter G. Woodson and the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History declared the second week of February "Negro History Week." The week was chosen to coincide with the birthdays of Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass, two significant figures in the fight to abolish slavery. The civil rights movement propelled Negro Week to evolve into Black History Month, which was officially recognized by President Gerald Ford in 1976.

Importance of Black History Month. Black History Month is a chance to better learn African Americans' histories, highlight their achievement, understand the historical perspective and struggles of African Americans past and present, and prepare us to recognize where systemic racism still exists, and identify a more equitable path forward.

March 2. Women of the 117th Congress: Diverse Voices

The 117th Congress set a new record high for women's representation in the legislature. This event highlighted the achievements of women in Congress, and women members of Congress shared their thoughts on the importance of their voices in the practice of policymaking.

March 3. Women's Directors Roundtable at the 2022 Mother Tongue Film Festival

Every year, Mother Tongue presents a roundtable with women directors to honor the role of women in language transmission. This year, Smithsonian Folklife brought together filmmakers from communities in Canada, the United States, and Mexico to discuss the power of language in their films.

March 8. Female Genius: Eliza Harriot and George Washington at the Dawn of the Constitution. National Archives hosted Author Mary Sarah Bilder's look to the 1780s, the age of the Constitution, to investigate the rise of a radical new idea in the English-speaking world: female genius.

March 11, 16, and 21. Her Story: How women and Girls Transformed the World!

Smithsonian Institution American Women's History Initiative virtual workshops for children ages 3-6 and their adult companions. Viewers learned about art, history, and more!

March 30. Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg "Great Americans" Medal Posthumous Presentation. The late Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg, recognized for her groundbreaking commitment to gender equity and human rights, posthumously received the National Museum of American History's signature honor, the "Great Americans" medal.

Rally to #BreakTheBarriers

On March 31, 2022, a coalition of New Jersey youth, faith leaders, and social justice and civil rights organizations held a Rally to #BreakTheBarriers at the Richard J. Hughes Justice Complex in Trenton, NJ.

Bishop John R. Schol and Rev. Sammy Arroyo

Bishop Schol is the Resident Bishop of the Greater New Jersey area which includes the Greater New Jersey Conference in the Northeastern Jurisdiction of the United Methodist Church and Interim Bishop for the Eastern Pennsylvania Conference. Rev. Sammy Arroyo, Phd, is the United Methodist Church Pastor in Hightstown, NJ.

New Jersey has some of the best schools in the nation, yet its schools are also among the most segregated. No child should ever be hurt by bad policy, but that is exactly what is happening in our schools because of segregation.

New Jersey has a chance to end school segregation, give millions of public school students the benefits of an integrated education, and set an example for the entire country. This was the message of the March rally in Trenton, NJ as state leaders were called on to end segregation in public schools across the state and finally #IntegrateNJ.

The Neighborhood Center in Camden

The mission of the Neighborhood Center in Camden is to break the cycle of childhood poverty by honoring the individual, holding them as precious and loving them dearly. To that end we are embarking on a new journey at the Center, and I am inviting you to share in that work. As I write this note today, we have demolished the baseball field, the children and teenagers were simply not interested in playing baseball. Instead, we are installing a water well for irrigation, and are planting grass sod along with football goal posts, soccer and lacrosse nets. We are building a multi-purpose sports facility at the Center. Why? Because we know that it takes just one spark to change the direction of a child living in Camden.

Over the past two years we have learned a great deal from our basketball program which operates nearly every evening and weekend for one hundred children and teenagers. These same children with their parents then join us for our programs in the arts and academics. Our plan is to establish sports camps for football, soccer, and lacrosse at the Center to become a hub of sports activity that will lift all programs. We are so pleased to have John Martin on board as our volunteer Project Manager for this big project!

We are pleased to be returning to full Urban Farming at the Neighborhood Center under the direction of Farmer Chris. We are in the process of putting mushroom compost on our beds. We are once again hiring teen farmers to work with Chris. They will learn how to farm, nutrition, and important job skills. Additionally, we are adding a Kitchen Apprentice program to teach young adult the skills to become a chef and caterer. The Center will be returning to catering after a hiatus of five years. The program will be a source of income for young adults in Camden and any additional profits will support the evening teen program.

The Summer Camp will be bigger and better than ever this year. We are planning new content academically and field trips that engage the children in a broader world. We are seeking sponsorships of our children, the cost for an entire season is \$1,400 per child and we can expect one hundred campers. During this past winter we have remodeled our classrooms with new floors and addressed the foundation of the historic building.

Additionally, we are looking for opportunities to teach the children something new, so if you have a skill, craft, or talent and wish to share, we are all ears!

Stay tuned for a Baby Shower for our young moms on May 14th from 11 am to 1 pm. We are collecting everything a new mom needs plus diapers.

And a grand open house when the Multi-Purpose Athletic Field is inaugurated!

The District plans to partner with the Ronald McDonald House SNJ and provides the following Volunteer Meals Activity Program policies submitted by Jill Clement, Family services Associate for the Ronald McDonald House SNJ:

1. No one under the age of 12 may volunteer to cook. No one under the age of 8 may volunteer to conduct an activity.
2. 6 volunteers total are permitted to sign up to cook. This number includes chaperones for minors.
3. 6 volunteers total are permitted to conduct an activity. This number includes chaperones for minors.
4. Masks are required for all who enter RMHSNJ.
5. If anyone has any cold or covid symptoms, they should refrain from visiting the house.
6. All meals must be prepared in a commercial kitchen. (Nothing can be pre-made at home)
7. No at home pre-made casseroles can be served due to local health and safety guidelines.
8. Volunteers are permitted to serve the families food but must be wearing gloves.
9. For groups who would like to sign up for dinner, but would rather not cook, you can order from a local restaurant, and have it delivered, or you can drop it off. (Or), you can choose the option to pay for a meal and we will order it for you (\$200.00 minimum).
