Dear United Methodist Women of Greater New Jersey and friends,

Redistricting, Part 2

Greetings to all, in the cooling weather of fall! I hope your families and friends, children and grandchildren, nieces and nephews are back to school, and everyone is staying healthy. We now know that there may not be a “post-COVID,” but pray that the pandemic proportions will cease.

Our summer newsletter explained what we then knew about GNJ re-districting. We now have only six districts and six district superintendents. This does not affect UMW yet, as we will continue through 2021-22 as is, yet planning for the future. Even some conference-level committees are taking a similar approach (e.g., DCOM). The Leadership Team will meet on October 27th to discuss our plan and our timeline. District Nominations Committees will consider the new districts throughout the next year and new slates will be offered at the fall 2022 meetings.

These changes are an opportunity to bring freshness and new life. I often sense God’s hand nudging us along. Just as COVID has forced change, sometimes these innovations become essentials. With Zoom and other virtual formats, we have done meetings, school, doctor appointments, concerts, family occasions, graduations and worship. We will plan for the future and create new things that will enable us to move with the Spirit into the future.

Two scriptures may help inform us at such a time as this. National United Methodist Women has used “new wineskins” (Mk2:22) as a metaphor for attracting new women by adjusting to meet their needs (see: <https://www.unitedmethodistwomen.org/news/new-wineskins-for-growth>). Another passage used for moving into the future was Paul’s shipwreck story (Acts 27:18-44), emphasizing, “What do we need to throw overboard in order to survive?” What old ways of doing things threaten to sink us if we do not adjust?

Let us continue to invite district superintendents to our annual meeting to increase our visibility in the conference. This may be a time to reconsider regional meetings, as there

Voting Equity

The Greater NJ UMW Annual Fall Meeting held on October 16, 2021 included a morning session on **Equity in Voting** with panelists Rev. Dr. Liz Theoharis from The Poor People's Campaign, Toni Zimmer from the NJ League of Women Voters, and Joyce Pratt, Equal Economic Opportunity Consultant and GNJUMW Communications Chair. Each panelist shared major issues requiring consideration when choosing the candidate of your choice when exercising your vote.

Rev. Theoharis shared why voter equity matters to God and to us and discussed how people of the "Poor People's Campaign: A National Call for Moral Revival" are coming together to confront the interlocking evils of systemic racism, poverty, ecological devastation, militarism and the war economy, and the distorted moral narrative of religious nationalism." Toni Zimmer of the New Jersey League of Women Voters (LWVNJ) presented the leagues mission, vision, and value to empower voters and defend democracy; envision a democracy where every person has the desire, the right, the knowledge and the confidence to participate; and value the power of women to create a more perfect democracy. Participants were invited to contact Ms. Zimmer at www.lwvnj.org.

Joyce Pratt shared three key issues requiring voting consideration in our next election – school segregation in New Jersey, redistricting/redlining/gerrymandering abuse that hinders our "one person – one vote" principle, and our debt ceiling crisis due to government spending more than it takes from taxes and other revenue. Ms. Pratt shared the following take-aways from a September 24, 2021 statewide conference on School Segregation in New Jersey entitled "A Pandemic of Inequality and Lost Opportunity."

- New Jersey is the fifth most segregated state in the United States
- Segregation is not just a feeling but a tangible cost.
- The cost to do nothing is horrendous (incarceration, poverty, unemployment, uneducated)
- There are New Jersey cities that prove desegregation is successful.
- Unfamiliarity creates distrust and hatred.
- We cannot teach children they have a specific place based on race/color.
- Be grounded. We all enter this earth/life as humans.

Ms. Pratt urged members to find their legislators and write or call them with their concerns and ask how our leaders plan to resolve local, state, and national issues at www.house.gov [click on "Representatives" and your state] and www.senate.gov [click on "Senators"].

Remembering Native American Victims of US Schools

United Methodist leaders decry church sponsorship of U.S. abusive "Indian boarding schools" and call for remembrance of victims and survivors. [September 28, 2021 ATLANTA] [umcmmission.org]

The Past

Recent media reports, a public education campaign, and the announcement of an investigation by the U.S Department of the Interior have cast renewed light on one of the most shameful practices in the deplorable treatment of the Indigenous people of North America by European colonists across 50 years. This was the forcing of thousands of Native American boys and girls into "Indian boarding schools" in a deliberate attempt to separate them from their families and cultures.

Disturbing new reports from both Canada and the U.S. indicate that, in some cases, large numbers of the young people died in school custody without notice to families and were buried in mass schoolyard graves. Some of these burials have been documented internally in boarding school records, but others have not.

While authorized and primarily funded by government, some of these schools were also sponsored or operated by religious organizations, including several with Methodist affiliations. Some Methodists and their institutions shared and promoted the sentiment that Indigenous people must be "Christianized" and then "civilized" to be regarded as human beings, or as stated by prominent proponents, "Kill the Indian and save the man."

The U.S. Secretary of the Interior Deb Haaland announced that the Bureau of Indian Affairs will investigate the programs and operations of these boarding schools. The General Board of Global Ministries of the United Methodist Church, Roland Fernandes General Secretary, has committed to sharing information discovered in their investigation of Methodist involvement in such institutions.

The Future

In the face of renewed focus on the damages done by the boarding schools, we:

- Endorse and join the Day of Remembrance on September 30, 2021,
- Welcome the investigation underway by the U.S. Department of the Interior,
- Pledge to conduct our own study and investigation of Methodist-related boarding schools,
- Seek to embody in our work the spirit of our church's 2012 "Act of Repentance Toward Healing Relationships with Indigenous People,"
- Review and implement as recommendations for healing and reconciliation found in the resolution of 2016, including measures to increase the role and visibility of Indigenous persons and communities, and
- Promote equity and justice for Native Americans in both church and society.

GNJ UMW Social Action Updates Fall 2021

On September 11, the Charter for Racial Justice of the Greater NJ UMW offered the first program in a three-part series called Know Your Neighbor. We listened to three women who identify as Muslim share about the ways their lives and communities have been harmed by discrimination because of the way the United States responded to the horrific acts of Sept. 11 with more acts of violence and discrimination. Each woman talked about the diversity amongst people who call themselves Muslim and the power and importance of learning people's stories so we can better care for one another. You can view the recording of this powerful program below.

For the Oct. 9th Know Your Neighbor: Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders Experiences, we heard from Susan S. Kim. Part three of the series will take place on Nov. 13 and Noon: Experiences of Indigenous People with Cynthia Mosley. These conversations have been a powerful way to break down stereotypes and expand our understanding and compassion. There are a wealth of related resources and videos added into our shared resources file about these topics. There's also a section of resources highlighting ways we can support the 10,000 refugees from Afghanistan who are currently arriving in New Jersey through Fort Dix.

As we continue to recover from severe flooding due to recent storms, there's also a need for more cleaning buckets. See below.

There are a wealth of needs and opportunities to care for each other right now. In the midst of it all, remember to also take care of yourself. You are valued and you make a difference. We are so grateful for each of you. Thank you for all you do!

The outpouring of support and ecumenical collaboration from our local churches and nonprofit organizations has been amazing.

As GNJ's Disaster Response team continues moving forward with the relief effort, it has become apparent that there is a great need for more cleaning buckets.

2021 and 2022 Mission u

The event consisted of a three-day session held on July 16-18 and a one-day session held on July 25 with the theme from Romans 12:2 “Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God – What is good and acceptable and perfect.”

Forty-seven (47) women attended the three-day sessions via Zoom. Alana Walls from UMW National led the study on Pushout: The Criminalization of Black Girls in School by Monique W. Morris. Approximately thirty-four (34) women attended the one-day session as Rev. James McKeever led “Bearing Witness in the Kin-dom” and Kathy Schutz and Yvonne Bouknight led “Pushout.”

The Korean session held on July 25, 2021 was attended by thirty (30) women.

Plans for 2022 Mission u are for three-day sessions on Thursday and Friday night virtual and Saturday in-person with live stream capabilities. The dates are **July 14-16, 2022**. The one-day session will be virtual on **July 23, 2022**. The Mission u planning team is looking for a site to host the in-person session and two tech savvy women to assist with technical planning for virtual classes.

Neighborhood Center in Camden

Report from the Gateway South District September 2021 Newsletter

Despite the pandemic, 2021 has seen many good things happening at the Neighborhood Center.

Property improvements include a new roof, repair of the gym floor, new outdoor signage in front and on the side of the building, repairs to the trailer, and an updated security system. The new security system makes it possible to see who is at the front door using a video monitor. The basement is an area in need of remodeling to make better use of classroom space.

The teen and summer urban farming program went well this summer. Crops grown were sold at local farm markets in Camden. The summer camp program also went well. The noon feeding program continues with one-third of the clientele coming for meals every day. The Senior program has not restarted yet due to Covid.

The new Assistant Director at the Neighborhood Center is Zhaire McCormick. He has been involved with Neighborhood Center program for 4 or 5 years including as a summer camp counselor and running the evening basketball program. He was very excited to accept this new position as he is already invested in the lives of some of the children at the Neighborhood Center. Zhaire is a Rutgers graduate with a degree in social work. He has been a special education teacher working with both adults and youth. He also has experience working with DCP&P. Enrollment in the after-school program has clearly grown due to the basketball program which he ran so well.

Childcare is full. Preschool enrollment is low as preschool is offered free at Camden public schools. Enrollment in the afterschool program has increased from thirty-three students the first week. The very popular basketball program has eighty kids enrolled, including ages three and up on Saturdays.

A part-time Teen Director position is now being advertised. The Teen program had been on hold due to Covid and the low vaccination rate of teens. Goals of the Teen program include enabling a successful high school experience and transitioning the student to a successful college experience, teaching self-reliance and purposeful life skills, and assisting with preparation for college. Future goals include SAT test prep, financial aid application assistance, and furthering college partnerships with Rutgers, Rowan and black colleges.

The current plan is to hold the Thanksgiving food and Christmas toy store as usual with families able to choose for family members. The annual benefit dinner is tentatively planned for February 19, 2022 at Tavistock Country Club.

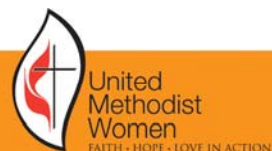
