# Northeastern Jurisdiction (NEJ) 2024 *Get Together* Keynote Speaker: Bishop Vashti Murphy McKenzie



Bishop McKenzie is the new President and General Secretary of the National Council of Churches (NCC). She provides executive leadership to 37 communions (denominations) representing 100,000 churches and 3 million people. She is the first African American woman to hold both positions.

Bishop McKenzie is also the 117<sup>th</sup> elected and consecrated bishop of the African Methodist Episcopal Church, the first female elected to episcopal office in the more than the two-century-old AME Church. She is the first female to serve as President of the Council of Bishops and President of the General Board.

# **What Easter Means to Christians**

On Easter Sunday, Christians celebrate **the resurrection of Jesus Christ** from the dead after his crucifixion and burial. It is typically the most well-attended Sunday church service of the year.

#### What Is Easter?

- According to Christian Scripture (<u>Isaiah 53</u>), Jesus Christ is the promised Messiah and Savior of the World.
- (or being raised from the dead) three days after his death on the cross.
- Christians believe that when Jesus laid down his life on the cross, he paid the full penalty for sin by offering the perfect, spotless sacrifice.
- Subsequently, by raising from the dead, the Lord defeated the power of sin and death and purchased, for all who believe in him, eternal life in <u>Christ</u> <u>Jesus</u>.

#### Easter in the Bible

The biblical account of Jesus' death on the cross, or crucifixion, his burial, and his resurrection, or raising from the dead, can be found in the following passages of Scripture: Matthew 27:27-28:8; Mark 15:16-16:19; Luke 23:26-24:35; and John 19:16-20:30.

The word "Easter" does not appear in the Bible and no early church celebrations of Christ's resurrection are <u>mentioned in Scripture</u>. Easter, like Christmas, is a tradition that developed later in church history.

# What Easter Means to Christians (continued from page 9)

As the most solemn and preeminent celebration of Jesus Christ's resurrection, it's unfortunate that many of Easter's customs are mixed with <u>pagan associations</u> and secular commercialization. For these reasons, many Christian churches choose to refer to the Easter holiday simply as Resurrection Day.

#### When is the Easter Season?

<u>Lent</u> is a 40-day period of <u>fasting</u>, <u>repentance</u>, moderation and <u>spiritual</u> <u>discipline</u> in preparation for Easter. In Western Christianity, <u>Ash</u> <u>Wednesday</u> marks the start of Lent and the Easter season. Easter Sunday marks the end of Lent and the Easter season.

<u>Eastern Orthodox</u> churches observe <u>Lent or Great Lent</u>, during the 6 weeks or 40 days preceding Palm Sunday with fasting continuing during the <u>Holy Week</u> of Easter. Lent for <u>Eastern Orthodox churches</u> begins on Monday and Ash Wednesday is not observed.

## **Holy Week**

The week preceding Easter is called Holy Week. Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday, the celebration of Jesus Christ's <u>triumphal entry into Jerusalem</u>. On Maundy Thursday is the commemoration of the <u>Last Supper</u> when Jesus shared the <u>Passover meal</u> with his disciples on the night before he was crucified. Jesus' death by <u>crucifixion</u> is commemorated on Good Friday.





# The Significance of Christ's Resurrection

Consider just **three ways** the New Testament highlights the significance of the resurrection.

# 1. Jesus' Resurrection means that his sacrificial death on the cross was sufficient, and therefore our sins can be forgiven.

Paul emphasizes this in <u>1 Corinthians 15</u>, reminding us that "Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures" (<u>vv. 3-4</u>). Then, in <u>verse 17</u>, he argues that "if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins."

In other words, Paul saw a direct connection between the resurrection of Jesus and the sufficiency of his death to atone for our sins. When Jesus rose again on the third day, it was the public announcement that God was fully satisfied with the sacrificial death of his Son. In his resurrection, Jesus was vindicated (1 Timothy 3:16). But in his vindication, we are vindicated too. That's why Paul says in Romans 4 that Jesus "was delivered up for our trespasses and raised for our justification" (Romans 4:25).[2]

#### 2. Jesus' Resurrection means that death is defeated once and for all.

As Peter proclaimed on the Day of Pentecost, "God raised [Jesus] from the dead, freeing him from the agony of death, because it was impossible for death to keep its hold on him" (Acts 2:24). Death lost its grip on Jesus!

But the resurrection means that Jesus not only defeated death for himself, but that he defeated it for us. He died and rose as a new representative for humanity, as the Second Adam. "But in fact, Christ has been raised from the dead," writes Paul, "the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep. For as by a man came death, by a man has come also the resurrection of the dead. For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive" (1 Corinthians 15:20-22). His resurrection guarantees ours.

The empty tomb assures us that sickness and suffering, death and disease will not have the final word.

#### 3. Jesus' Resurrection means that the material world matters.

Lest there be any misunderstanding, when the <u>apostles</u> said that Jesus rose again, they meant that his *physical body came back to life*. The risen Jesus wasn't a phantom or ghost, but a breakfast-eating, flesh-and-bone, human being (see <u>Luke 24:36-43</u> and <u>John 21:10-14</u>).

When Jesus came out of the tomb in a physical body, it was God's definitive stamp of approval on the creation project with all of its materiality. The resurrection shows us that matter matters. And this is why the early Christians looked to the future with confidence that the created order itself would be redeemed (see Romans 8:18-25).

Though we wait for the full consummation of new creation, the Scriptures also teach that the power that raised Jesus from the dead is already working within us (<u>Ephesians 1:19-20</u>). The resurrection, you see, not only assures of God's forgiveness and comforts us in suffering as we anticipate the final reversal of death, disease, and decay; it also motivates and empowers us to push back the tide of suffering and evil in the present world, through word and deed, in mercy and justice, all in Jesus' name.





# Vote-by-Mail

ATNJ Education Fund, a registered 501(c)3 nonpartisan charity in New Jersey, offers its initiative, <u>VotebymailNJ.org</u>, for voters in every county to participate in our elections by voting safely from home. Its website announces:

Open to all registered voters, Vote by Mail gives voters the options to mail their ballot using USPS, deposit it at a secure ballot drop box, or deliver it in person at official designated locations such as the Board of Elections.

ATNJ also provides the following vote by mail FACTS:

- "Vote By Mail" is a misnomer. You can cast your vote using this paper ballot and mail it, deposit it, or deliver it. It simply is voting early using a hand-marked paper ballot. Vote By Mail was previously referred to as "Absentee Voting." No excuses are required to Vote by Mail.
- Vote By Mail is also referred to as "VBM" and "voting from home."
- Voters who opt to vote by mail, "VBM voters," receive their paper ballots in their mailboxes starting 45 days prior to Election Day and can cast their ballots as soon as they are received.
- VBM voters can change their mind and not use their paper ballot to vote. Instead, they can show up on Election Day and vote in person using a paper ballot provided to them called a "Provisional Ballot." This security process ensures that voters do not vote more than once in any election.

Diverse voting methods strengthens the U.S. democracy, breaking down access barriers that might otherwise exclude voters from making their voices heard. The main objective of VBM is to encourage more people to vote.


Many organizations are distributing voting-by-mail material to assist those nonvoters who may find this process less of a burden to their lifestyles. In this way, we are assisting all Americans to exercise their right to vote. Applications for Vote by mail ballots to be sent to your desired location can be obtained by contacting GNJUWF or at your county clerk office.


