PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE "Journeying Together in Love, Hope and Peace" by CWU-NJ President Sara Joslin

### **Greetings to my Sisters in Christ!**

I reflect upon my experience at the 2024 Assembly in Oak Park IL - a journey gathering together of women from across the country and across the generations uniting in celebration and community, exchanging hopes and plans, engaging in story-telling, prayer and praise, and moving into our new 2024-2028 Quadrennium under the leadership of CWU National President Margaret B. Rushing. Under the direction of Wendy Hood (CWU-KY), I represented NJ among the 13 states in the CWU Assembly Choir as we sang "The Gospel Light", "Child of the King", "Call Down a Blessing" and "Rejoice". I gave away all of the CWU-NJ love gifts "Seeds of Hope, Joy, Mercy, Peace, Kindness, etc " prepared by church women from the Garden State on the first day. The second day when our speakers were from the League of Women Voters of Illinois, my give-aways were from the Alice Paul Institute in Mt Laurel NJ ("VOTER" magnets, postcards, etc). President Sheila Louder (CWU-Atlanta) shared with me over breakfast about their "Rites of Passage" program for middle school girls including social media awareness, etiquette, financial literacy, and advocacy including letter

writing and meeting the Mayor of Atlanta. Reverend Dr. Carolyn Boyd led a workshop BREAKING THE CYCLE OF POVERTY and invited us to advocate / take action for one of the top ten states based on the highest % of people living in poverty. President Janice Durr and VP Joanne Compton (CWU-Montgomery AL) shared their issues and concerns with me. Janice and I discussed issues of rural health care, lack of public transportation, and the need for certified midwives for maternal and infant health. Joanne's focus was voter rights, voter registration, and the issues of voter suppression. Dr. Jennifer Buntin led WALK WITH ME, a refugee simulation game where we had individual roles in a group of extended family members. Each member individually chose 6 items to carry when we needed to flee from the outbreak of war to the relative safety of a neighboring country across the river. We encountered challenges on our journey, made decisions about what to jettison when we faced unexpected obstacles during our "escape". A child in my extended family lost everything and we each chose what we were willing to share to comfort, address trauma and meet needs. We could not all fit in the same boat when we reached the river so we had to divide our group to cross separately in two boats. Our future was uncertain but we were thankful that we had escaped from the violence of war. In the closing Asembly worship, the sermon by Reverend Dr Carolyn Scalan-Holmes was "CWU - Are You Ready for New Beginnings and New Perspectives?" She shared her exciting story about being a passenger on a plane that lost cabin pressure and needed to return to the airport. It was a bumpy ride but the emergency oxygen worked, and pilot landed the plane safely. Despite this experience, she made a decision to get on the replacement plane that was brought to the gate. God is in control. We may be tempted to play it safe, but God is calling us to do a New Thing. Hope is our belief that our future will be better than today and that we and God can make it possible. It may be a bumpy ride, but we are church women called by God and together, we are Church Women United called to act in Love, Hope, and Peace to impact the world!

#### **ECUMENICAL REPORT**

Church Women United in NJ thank our churches, denominations, units, and women for their actions and advocacy. We spotlighted on our CWU-NJ FACEBOOK page the ecumenical and denominational women leading daily worship sessions at the Church Center of the United Nations during CSW68, the Commission of the Status of Women and actions to address gender discrimination, violence, and the poverty of women by strengthening institutions. CSW69 on March 10-21 2025 is the 30th anniversary review of the Beijing Declaration and

Platform for Action on the status of gender equality and empowerment of women. NGO CSW/ NY is planning to focus is on Women in Leadership and Women and the Economy.

The Presbyterian Women in the Presbytery of the Highlands held their Spring Gathering at the Parish House of the Presbyterian Church in Morristown on April 13. Marianne Montero spoke about her 2023 Presbyterian Women USA Mission Experience at the Arizona border with a focus on immigration and refugee issues, violence against women and children during the immigration process, and challenges facing indigenous peoples.

Reverend Carol Lakota Eastin was the keynote speaker at the Greater New Jersey Conference United Women in Faith Spring Conference meeting "Native American Resilience and Healing" at Medford UMC on April 27th. Native Americans bring diverse gifts and talents to churches and society. Reverend Eastin of the Illinois Great Rivers Area spoke about actions to build self-esteem of women and youth, to protect the land and drinking water, provide trauma-informed care and to seek justice/raise awareness of missing and murdered indigenous women (MMIW). A staggering 84% of indigenous girls and women have experienced violence, more than twice that of other demographic groups.

### Remembering Dr Thelma Davidson Adair

August 29 1920 to August 21 2024

Church Women United in New Jersey celebrates the life and legacy of educator, church leader, and human rights activist Dr. Thelma Cornelia Davidson Adair:

"As an educator, I believe that the early years are most important for the development of character and skills. Helping children from the very beginning is important and it helps make them more inquisitive. We want them to be more aware of the world so they are able to solve problems and issues that will make them vital and valuable at home, the workplace, school, and church. Concern for the child begins before birth."

Dr Adair was elected as the first African American woman moderator of the Presbyterian Church USA in 1976 at the 188th General Assembly in Baltimore. She later served as the National President of Church Women United (1980-1984). The 15th Ecumenical Assembly in 1980 "The Spirit of the Lord is Upon Me" was preceded by global prayer and a spirit walk beginning on the Atlantic City NJ Boardwalk on World Day of Prayer.

CWU National President Thelma C. Adair presented the keynote address at the 40th Anniversary Celebration of Church Women United Inc on Dec 6, 1981 at St John the Divine in NYC. Dr Adair spoke broadly about the dire human consequence of a nuclear war, the need for nuclear disarmament, and peace among nations including at the 1982 CWU-NJ Assembly in Bloomingdale. "Peace begins as personal peace of mind and spirit but demands elimination of injustices such as poverty, sexism and racism." CWU-NJ adopted three symbols of peace: the dove of peace, the crane associated with Hiroshima, and a purple ribbon symbol of mourning for the transgressions which lead to war. The 1984 CWU Ecumenical Assembly "Come! Build a New Earth: Pieces to Peace" was held at Purdue University in West Lafayette IN. Church Women United state and local units were among those who prepared the Peace Ribbon segments to tie together and encircle the Pentagon, the White House, and the US Capitol on August 4 1985, the 40th anniversary of the bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

Former National President of CWU Dr. Thelma Davidson Adair was our keynote speaker for the CWU-NJ 50th Assembly at the Holiday Inn in Tinton Falls on May 19 2000. The theme was "Church Women United: Celebrating the Past, Envisioning the Future". Reverend Naomi L. Fuller of Red Bank was the CWU-NJ state President and First Vice President June Stoll was the State Assembly Chair. "Be strong and of good courage, be not afraid, neither be dismayed for the Lord thy God is with thee, wither so ever thou goest." Joshua 1:9. Dr Adair, organizer of Harlem's HeadStart program, was the keynote speaker for the 2009 CWU-NJ Assembly "Women Called to Defend + Maintain + Rescue + Deliver" was held at Mt Olive Baptist Church in Hackensack. Sister Carla Barr of the St Barnabas Catholic Church Community was the worship leader.

In 2022 CWU- NJ recognized Dr. Thelma C. Adair with the Church Women United SISTER award.

<u>Care n' Share thrift Shop</u>- Cherry Hill-Proceeds from sale of quality donated clothing, housewares, toys and books support local mission projects such as Urban Promise Ministries, Cherry Hill Food & Outreach Council, Interfaith Hospitality Outreach Council (IHOC), and Volunteers of America.

**<u>FULFILL</u>**, **NJ**- Neptune- The Food Bank of Monmouth and Ocean Counties celebrates 40 years of fighting hunger and building food security at the NJ shore.

<u>Good News for Women</u>- Flemington-Butterfly House Christian sober living residential facility and Mommy and Me House for mothers with young children, supporting survivors of domestic violence.

**North Porch Women and Infant Center-** Dover- Filling the gap for infants and toddlers in emergency situations when needy families are displaced or have budget shortfalls by providing diapers, wipes, baby food, powdered baby formula, and toiletry items.

<u>St.Joseph's Indian School</u>-Chamberlain SD- Providing education, safety, hope and love and love for Native American children from dysfunctional homes. They live on-site with one adult for every eight children.

<u>Saint Prison Ministry</u> -Moorestown- Reaching out to those in prison walls to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ through athletics and to mentor them towards spiritual maturity as they successfully transition to family and community.

**She Has a Name(SHAN)-** Camden -outreach ministry of faith and unconditional love for ladies who find themselves in bondage to drugs and prostitution.

## Cranford Township Dedication of Reading Garden In honor of Reverend Dr. Deborah Cannon Partridge Wolfe

Cranford Township recognized the many accomplishments of Reverend Dr. Deborah Wolfe as "Teacher and Preacher" during the dedication of a reading garden in her honor at Lincoln Park on May 13, 2024.



Reverend Dr Deborah Cannon Partridge Wolfe (1916-2004) was a noted African American educator, minister, and served as Education Chief of the US House of Representatives' Committee on Labor and Education. Between her junior and senior year at the Jersey City Teacher's College, Dr Wolfe had a summer internship with the Federated Council of Churches teaching pre-school and school-age children of migrant workers on the eastern shore of Maryland, an experience that led to her later work in the area of rural education. After completing her Masters degree at the Teachers College of Columbia University, she accepted a job at Tuskegee Institute (1938) to develop their rural elementary education and laboratory schools. The D.C Wolfe Elementary School in Shorter AL was opened by her in December 1938 where she was both principal and teacher. Her PhD dissertation was "A Plan for Redesigning the Curriculum of Rural Laboratory Schools of Tuskegee Institute" (1945). She then returned to Tuskegee where she established their education graduate program.

Dr Wolfe was the first African American professor on the Queens College faculty (1951), later taking a leave of absence in 1962 to serve as the Education Chief for the Committee on Education and Labor of the US House of Representatives and successfully guided 35 pieces of legislation through Congress including the Economic Opportunity Act (War on Poverty), the Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963, and the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, among others. Dr Wolfe was the first person to serve concurrently on the NJ State Boards of Education and Higher Education and served as educational advisor to both President Kennedy and President Johnson.

Ordained in 1970, she served as Associate Pastor of the First Baptist Church in Cranford NJ and was the first women elected as the President of the New Jersey Convention of Progressive Baptists. Throughout her life as an academic, social activist, educator, and public

servant, Dr Deborah Cannon Partridge Wolfe taught respect for all people and tried to inspire in her students a willingness to recognize the equality of each individu
