I am 48 years old and received help in July 2023 to get into [The Arches Recovery Services](#). Before coming into the program, I was sleeping under bridges, in parks, and in a sleeping bag in front of the hospital. Now, I have over one-year clean, a full-time job, my driver's license and a car. My life has been changed for the good!

MATTHEW

At 19, I lost my mom to cancer. As an only child of a single mom I felt lost and turned to substances for comfort. My battle lasted 12 years, marked by strained relationships, time in jail, and the heartbreaking loss of trust from my wife and daughter. At my lowest point, I was ready to give up on life.



Fortunately, probation offered me a final chance for help instead of prison. With God's guidance, I found a transformative program at [Isaiah House](#). Today, I'm 34 and have been clean and sober for over two years. My soul is at peace, and I am living my best life!

VANESSA

I started using drugs at 17. Over time it continued to get worse and worse. I thought I could control it until a couple of years ago.
