Chile Relleno Casserole

An easy and delicious brunch or light supper dish

Four, 7 oz cans of whole, mild green chiles (28 oz total)

1 pound Monterey Jack Cheese

5 Eggs

1 1/4 cups Milk

1/4 cup Flour

1/2 teaspoon Salt

dash of black pepper

4 cups grated mild Cheddar cheese



1. Slit the chiles lengthwise on just one side. Remove seeds and drain. 2. Slice the Monterey Jack cheese into 1/4inch-thick slices and place inside the chiles. 3. Place stuffed chiles in an ungreased 3-quart baking dish. 4.Mix eggs, milk, flour, salt, and pepper well, and pour over chiles. 5. Sprinkle top with grated Cheddar. Bake uncovered at 350 degrees for 45 minutes. Makes 8 servings.

4 oz. Apple cider or apple juice

2 oz. caramel vodka

1 oz. cranberry juice

½ oz. grenadine

Ice cubes

Apple Slices and Cinnamon stick for garnish

- 1. Fill a cocktail shaker with ice; 2. Pour in apple cider, caramel vodka, cranberry juice and grenadine;
- 3. Shake vigorously for 10-15 seconds until well chilled; 4. Strain in chilled glass (coupe or rocks glass);
- 5. Garnish with fresh apple slice and cinnamon stick on the rim if desired.






It is Italian Heritage Month!! What do we Italians love to do more than eat, drink and have a fun time. This month I invite you to take a trip down memory lane. I read an article in the AARP Magazine entitled "You Can't Dance with a Smartphone." It sent me on a research mission. As I read it, I knew the author was right, today's young people (20 somethings) are missing out on one of life's greatest joys, dancing. It breaks my heart to admit that today's young people do not dance, including those in my family. It seems hardly anyone under 25 likes to dance. My mother would be lighting a candle in church if she were still here......

I witnessed this for the first time recently when I attended a wedding of a relative's son. The wedding reception space was small with about 100 guests. The DJ started playing music. I felt old because I did not recognize a single song. I could not believe my eyes when absolutely no one was on the dance floor. The young guests had no problem going to the bar, but no one ventured onto the dance floor. What a drag the rest of this event was going to be was all I could think. But when the DJ started to spin a mix of 70's, 80's, and 90's, well the small dance floor suddenly was alive as everyone in the room receiving social security or soon nearing that age filled the space. Meanwhile the Gen Zer's occasionally glanced up from their phones in wonderment, asking each other what are all those old people doing? I'll tell you what they were doing, they are dancing. We are not all graceful and we do not always look pretty on the floor. Some of us look ridiculous. But we do not care because we are having fun — a foreign concept to the people checking their phones and drinking beer.

My parents danced to the big band tunes. Several times each summer we would go to Elitches on a Saturday night. The kids would run through the park riding rides for hours while the adults, dressed in their Sunday best, went to the Trocadero Ballroom, and danced to big band music. Oh, how they loved to dance. Every party or family gathering included music and dancing. It was a way of life for us. We grew up dancing. It was how boys and girls interacted. Families gathered around the table and then on their feet to dance. I still dance in my kitchen with or without music.
