## President's Message

Roger's Rst. ehrenbergii

The appreciation of orchids can also be an appreciation of diversity. Orchids come in a wide range of colors and sizes and shapes. And considering the wide range of habitats from which they originate, some exist that can appeal to all growers with their varying habitat conditions.

Phalaenopsis at this point appeal to the largest base of orchid growers because they do well at room temperature and have very long-lasting flowers. Oncidium types can have nice spikes of flowers but also have a very acceptably-pleasing foliage in their off-season. At the other end of this spectrum are some very unusual and some rather homely and even ugly flowers and plants.

I have had to answer the question of "How do you tell if it is an orchid?" Most large orchids are quite recognizable versus some that are microscopic. Some orchid forms are quite unusual to say the least like the slipper orchids or the bulbophyllums or most extreme are some of the stanhopea and gongora types. Orchid plants may be visibly pleasing while others with their long, naked canes are very unsightly. And then you have the mainly pleasing foliage type plants like the jewel orchids.

The wonderful experience gained from having an orchid society is not only the diversity of orchids that our various members can grow but the diversity of the members themselves. Some are relatively rich and some relatively poor. And the longer the orchid addiction remains untreated the poorer you get. Most of our members are older, many retired, but I am glad to see younger orchid enthusiasts join us.

Our orchid society gives us a chance to appreciate our orchid growing neighbors irregardless of any differences we may have such as political affiliations or religious choices or any other categories that we sometimes pigeon-hole people into to accentuate our differences. Hooray for orchids, our common bond!






