Caring for creation, one butterfly at a time

The people of Christ the King Lutheran Church in West Chester, Ohio, are ministering to pollinators—butterflies, to be specific.



When its youth group learned that butterflies, especially the iconic orange and black monarchs, were at risk, the teens planted a pollinator habitat as part of the congregation's care for creation ministry.

According to Youth for Monarchs, a service-learning program for youth groups that launched its pilot program at Christ the King, the monarch butterfly population has declined 80% in the past two decades, mostly because their habitats, including the milkweed that the caterpillars require, are

being destroyed. Now Christ the King has dedicated part of its 8-acre property to growing native plants that feed and attract butterflies, bees and other pollinators.

"When you walk through a restored wildlife habitat—even a small patch—you become a witness to the abundance of life and goodness in God's creation," said Donna Pellegrin, a 12-year member of the congregation who led the youth group's 2018 butterfly garden launch. "Every creature is in symphony, and you can't teach the creation story any better way. When we teach Genesis and creation in Sunday school, inside sitting around tables, it's not the same as being a witness. You cannot help but meet God in nature."

Pellegrin's daughter, Anna Lavin, now in college, initiated the garden at Christ the King. When Lavin found caterpillars suffering in the family's yard, she asked her mom if they could save them. They brought the caterpillars to an environmentalist, who explained that the insects needed to eat milkweed, so the mom and daughter got the plant and nursed the caterpillars back to health.

The butterfly project at Christ the King has not only aided the monarchs and other pollinators but has also benefited the community.

“The amazing thing about this focus of ministry is that butterflies are cross-generational, and they cross every spectrum,” said Matt Byrd, pastor of Christ the King. “Everyone can get behind butterflies, and this has been good for the congregation and the community. To see people unify around this when people are so divided right now is miraculous. The gift of our land and caring for creation became an opportunity to teach people.”

The community gathers in June for the congregation’s annual Monarch Fest, an event to teach about butterflies and pollinator gardens, distribute free milkweed plants, provide garden tours, sell plants and offer family activities.

Pellegrin also offers educational seminars throughout the year, including a “Sowing Seeds in Winter” class, which gives instruction on starting miniature greenhouses in milk containers to grow native perennial plants from seeds. Last winter, parishioners and supporters from the community grew 500 native plants from seeds, which were then given away during Monarch Fest.

The congregation has also cleared the woods behind the church building of honeysuckle, an invasive and nonnative plant. Pellegrin is earning a certificate in permaculture, a landscape design philosophy that focuses on natural ecosystems, and had learned from a fellow environmentalist that honeysuckle was detrimental to a pollinator garden.

“A monarch habitat is home for many creatures,” she said. “If you restore the habitat for monarchs, you restore it for many creatures, including bees, dragonflies, hover flies and an enormous list of pollinators and spiders. We’ve lost 1-in-4 birds globally as part of habitat loss, and it has a cascading effect. We’re losing more than 6,000 acres every day. We plow it, pave it, poison it and it’s gone. We’re trying to do our part to restore it.

“We’re all part of this same food web, and every time a piece of this web disappears, it affects the entire web. Every time we lose a butterfly it affects us. Those it affects first are those who can least afford it.”

While the congregation had no budget for the garden project, local grant money, donations from nurseries, and congregational and community response have helped to make the gardens flourish.

“This has been an amazing way to help us focus beyond our four walls to the community,” Byrd said. “We did congregational revitalization training through the Southern Ohio Synod, and this project helps us focus on the needs of the neighborhood. People are inspired to see that our church cares about creation.”

Byrd said it’s fun to hear reports from the neighbors about seeing the butterflies. “Five years ago, when I showed up here, creation care was nowhere on our radar,” he said. “It has become a focus of this congregation, and it’s amazing to see people’s passion grow.”

Bolstered By Relationships – A story of Faith....

Jesús Escamilla knows the power of relationships. Over 15 years, he’s seen God provide for his congregation through faithful partners across the church and within his community.

“What God wants, if you believe and trust in how he wants to do it, it will get done,” said the pastor of San Gabriel Lutheran Church in Alvarado, Texas.



Escamilla came to San Gabriel in 2006, when future congregants were holding Bible studies weekly in worshippers' homes. To worship, they drove more than 30 miles north to San Miguel Lutheran Church in Fort Worth. He joined the Bible studies, then became the faith community's official worship leader a year later, ministering in homes for both Bible study and worship. In time, the growing faith community needed a

building in Alvarado.

A deal with a local supporter allowed the congregation to begin renting a plot of land, where it worshiped outdoors and eventually built makeshift indoor worship space. "Everyone was dusty, but they didn't care because they had a place to worship — their own place," Escamilla said. They drove more than 30 miles north to San Miguel Lutheran Church in Fort Worth. He joined the Bible studies, then became the faith community's official worship leader a year later, ministering in homes for both Bible study and worship. In time, the growing faith community needed a building in Alvarado

Over time, partnerships with local congregations allowed San Gabriel to build a permanent church. Gifts from Calvary Lutheran Church in Richland Hills allowed San Gabriel to put in flooring, and pews were donated by St. John Lutheran Church, a closing congregation in nearby Grand Prairie. Later, St. John's council gifted funds that helped San Gabriel take ownership of its land.

But like so many congregations, San Gabriel struggled to maintain a sense of community during the worst days of the COVID-19 pandemic in the United States.

The church closed and pivoted to virtual worship on Zoom and Facebook, with Escamilla, lay leaders and a small contingent of choir members recording services in person at the church.

[congregations] working together to help a community that was struggling. We have this wonderful community that is working together to work with what the Lord wants us to do.”

With virtual worship, collecting offerings became a challenge. Some congregants sent money through the digital-payment network Zelle or even left their offerings in the church mailbox, but many couldn’t contribute monetarily. So the church began hosting weekly food sales to raise needed funds and provide members with a way to give back.

Escamilla believes that San Gabriel has been built up by the generosity of others — church members, nearby ELCA congregations and, through Mission Support funds, the ELCA Northern Texas-Northern Louisiana Synod.

Since then, the church has grown, adding a fellowship hall that serves as a community hub for the area's largely Mexican immigrant population.

Accompaniment in a time of crisis

Lutheran Disaster Response raises \$1.3 million for care efforts in Eastern Europe

On Feb. 24, Russian forces invaded Ukraine, initiating a humanitarian crisis. Lutheran Disaster Response (LDR) is accompanying ELCA companion churches and ecumenical partners in their efforts to provide support, supplies and care to people affected by the war. So far, LDR's Eastern Europe crisis response has raised \$1.3 million.

According to the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees, Filippo Grandi, more than 2 million people are seeking

refuge in neighboring countries, including Hungary, Poland, Slovakia, Romania and Moldova. There are major humanitarian concerns for both internally displaced people and refugees.

Russia has launched air strikes across Ukraine, including on the capital of Kyiv and other major cities. Airports are shut down, and few railway lines are operational. At least 636 civilians have been killed in the conflict to date, and damage to civilian infrastructure has left hundreds of thousands of people without water or electricity. Ukrainian men of military age (18-60) are forbidden to leave the country, so most of those fleeing the violence are women and children.

Through the Lutheran World Federation (LWF), LDR is supporting member churches including the German Evangelical Lutheran Church of Ukraine, the Evangelical Church of the Augsburg Confession in Poland, the Evangelical Church of the Augsburg Confession in Slovakia, the



Evangelical Church of the Augsburg Confession in Romania and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Romania.

These churches are distributing basic necessities such as food, water and toiletries, as well as providing pastoral and psychological care.

These churches are distributing basic necessities such as food, water and toiletries, as well as providing pastoral and psychological care and assisting members of Roma communities and foreign nationals. Additional responses through partners in these countries and others in the region are expected in the coming weeks and months.

A grant to some of these companion churches through the LWF was approved March 9. This grant will allow LWF over a six-month period to establish a coordination structure to support member churches in the response. Through it, the LWF will strengthen the capacity of member churches to fulfill the immediate and long-term needs of refugees and internally displaced people, and to report back to partners effectively.

“Covenant of the smaller Lutheran churches in central and Eastern Europe, ecumenical and other partners has long been a regional priority for the ELCA,” said Elizabeth A. Eaton, presiding bishop of the ELCA, in a message. “In this time of crisis, we accompany our partners with concrete support for their humanitarian efforts through Lutheran Disaster Response.”

Eaton continued, “The ELCA is also accompanying those who are responding to the needs of foreign nationals who were in Ukraine when the fighting began and who are trying to cross the border to safety, as well as the partners who focused their ministry on providing holistic support for under-documented and undocumented individuals impacted by this violence in Ukraine.”

Gifts made toward LDR’s response are used in full to assist those impacted by the war in Ukraine.

Please join us as we pray for our brothers and sisters who are running from conflict in Ukraine. We will continue to accompany them and work with our partners to provide assistance in the midst of this crisis. Recipes Old & New

Easy Crock Pot Ham

Ingredients:

3-to-4-pound Pre-cooked Ham

½ Cup. Brown Sugar

¼ Cup Coke (not diet)

1 Teaspoon Dry Mustard

1 Teaspoon Horseradish

Instructions: Thoroughly combine brown sugar, mustard and horseradish. Moisten with enough coke to make a smooth paste; reserve remaining coke. Rub entire ham with mixture. Place ham in crock pot and add remaining coke. Cover and cook on for 1 hour then turn to low for 6-7 hours. For a 5 pound ham cook 8 – 10 hours.

Avocado Panzanella

2 Cups mixed color ripe cherry tomatoes
1 garlic clove , crushed
1½ tbsp capers , drained and rinsed (optional)
1 ripe avocado , pitted, peeled and chopped
1 small red onion , very thinly sliced
1 loaf ciabatta or crusty loaf of bread
4 Tbsp extra virgin olive oil
2 Tbsp red wine vinegar
small handful basil leaves

Instructions: Halve or roughly chop the tomatoes (depending on size) and put them in a bowl. Season well and add the garlic, capers, avocado and onion, and mix well. Set aside for 10 mins. Meanwhile, tear or slice the ciabatta into bite size chunks and place in a large serving bowl or on a platter. Drizzle with half the olive oil, half the vinegar and add some seasoning. When ready to serve, pour over the tomatoes and any juices. Scatter with the basil leaves and drizzle over the remaining oil and vinegar. Give it a final stir and serve immediately.


