First Reading: Acts 1:1-11

Before he is lifted into heaven, Jesus promises that the missionary work of the disciples will spread out from Jerusalem to all the world. His words provide an outline of the book of Acts.



[Luke writes:] ¹In the first book, Theophilus, I wrote about all that Jesus did and taught from the beginning ²until the day when he was taken up to heaven, after giving instructions through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen. ³After his suffering he presented himself alive to them by many convincing proofs, appearing to them during forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God. ⁴While staying with them, he ordered them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for the promise of the Father. "This," he said, "is what you have heard from me; ⁵for John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now."

⁶So when they had come together, they asked him, "Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?" ⁷He replied, "It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. ⁸But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." ⁹When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. ¹⁰While he was going and they were gazing up toward heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. ¹¹They said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up toward heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven."

Second Reading: Ephesians 1:15-23

The risen and exalted Christ reigns over the entire universe. The author of Ephesians prays that we are given the wisdom to know the power of the risen Christ and the empowering hope that the knowledge of this inheritance provides.

¹⁵I have heard of your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love toward all the saints, and for this reason ¹⁶I do not cease to give thanks for you as I remember you in my prayers. ¹⁷I pray that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you a spirit of wisdom and revelation as you come to know him, ¹⁸so that, with the eyes of your heart enlightened, you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance among the saints, ¹⁹and what is the immeasurable greatness of his power for us who believe, according to the working of his great power. ²⁰God put this power to work in Christ when he raised him from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly places, ²¹far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and above every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the age to come. ²²And he has put all things under his feet and has made him the head over all things for the church, ²³which is his body, the fullness of him who fills all in all.

Gospel: Luke 24:44-53

On the day of his ascension, Jesus leaves his disciples with a commission, a blessing, and a promise of the Holy Spirit.

⁴⁴[Jesus said to the eleven and those with them,] "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you—that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled."⁴⁵Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, ⁴⁶and he said to them, "Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, ⁴⁷and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. ⁴⁸You are witnesses of these things. ⁴⁹And see, I am sending upon you what my Father promised; so stay here in the city until you have been clothed with power from on high."

⁵⁰Then he led them out as far as Bethany, and, lifting up his hands, he blessed them. ⁵¹While he was blessing them, he withdrew from them and was carried up into heaven. ⁵²And they worshiped him, and returned to Jerusalem with great joy; ⁵³and they were continually in the temple blessing God.

Jesus and his Grace



As Christians we are all aware of the healing miracles that Jesus performed- the healing of the leper, the paralyzed servant, the blind man, the servant with the withered hand. He performed multitudes of miracles of healing.

But what about what to me is the bread and butter of Jesus and his teaching? The miracle of his compassion. The miracle of his grace. The times he stopped to touch a child's head, to speak to an old woman, his compassion in his treatment of Mary Magdalene. Everything we know about Jesus points to his unerring compassion. Imagine when he was traveling and preaching the gospel. Many verses speak of the crowds. Mark 5:24 says "And He went off with him; and a large crowd was following Him and pressing in on Him." The crowds would be surrounding him, asking him for a miracle, asking him to touch them, asking him for a word. Don't you feel claustrophobic just reading it?

So why do we as Christians spend more time speaking about our religion than we do showing our compassion and grace? When Jesus fed the thousands he did not first check to see if they would be his disciples. He did not require them to come to him to be saved, he simply filled their need. Feeding the poor does not define a Christian, it is part of being a Christian.

So I think what we as a church, and as Christians should be doing is showing our grace and compassion. We don't need to spout the bible to be a Christian, we need to show we are a Christian by our actions, our kindness, our speech, our tolerance of others different then us. As the hymn says "They will know we are Christians by our Love."

Questions for Reflection:

When you look at the life of Jesus what does God's Grace look like to you? What are some ways that you show God's grace the same way that Jesus did? What are some ways that you could grow in showing God's grace and compassion?

The following quote should be on our hearts:

We're called to be kind, and we cannot be authentically kind without being compassionate. Let this be the prayer of our hearts; that God's compassion would take up loose space in ours.

Kindness always has about it the ability to reduce the burdens of others. Let this be our test as to the gauge we use in alleviating the burdens of those within our circle of influence.
