Dear Friends of the Milton Lutheran Parish,

I hope this letter finds you all doing well and enjoying the cooler weather! Fall is my favorite time of the year. I just love to watch the leaves change, the animals prepare for winter, and of course the breezy temperatures. As we come into the fall season, we are anticipating some changes in the ministry at the Parish. I wanted to bring your attention to these changes so we can get ready.

- 1. **Prayer and Communion** Our last day for Prayer and Communion will be on September 24. After that time, we encourage people to contact the parish office if you would like to schedule prayer and communion with me. We can either set up a time for me to visit at your home or for you to come to one of the church's, and I bring communion to you.
- 2. **Parking Lot Worship Time** Starting October 4, we are changing the parking lot worship time to 4:00 P.M. to allow leeway for the diminishing daylight. People are still encouraged to visit with each other both before and after worship. You are also encouraged to set up a tailgate meal if you'd like to stay.
- 3. Live Streaming Worship- Starting this Sunday we will be live streaming worship from Trinity at 9:30 A.M. You can access the link for worship through the parish website, on the parish Youtube channel, or on Facebook. Because we are trying out new technology, it may take us some time to iron out the kinks. For that reason, we ask for your patience. If the worship service does not go live at 9:30 A.M. that means, we are having technology issues. Instead we will upload a recorded worship video later in the day for your viewing. Once we iron out all the kinks, we hope to offer live streamed worship each Sunday morning from Trinity.
- 4. **Cold Weather** With the cold weather comes more complications with providing outdoor worship. We have put together a team of people to consider our worship options and will be communicating a winter worship plan/schedule to you sometime in October. You can expect the above changes to be implemented throughout the month of October.
- 5. **Worship Leadership** We are looking for readers to read the scripture text for either the parking lot or live streamed worship services. If you are interested in reading, please reach out to Donna Riccio so she can put you on the schedule.

Upcoming Events:

Pet Blessing- Bring your pet with you to parking lot worship on Sunday, October 4, for a pet blessing. There will be a special time of prayer and a blessing for all pets during the service.

Campfire Worship- On Sunday, October 25, we will be celebrating Reformation with a campfire worship. Bring your chairs or stay in your cars. There will be campfires, singing, hotdogs, S'mores, and other campfire treats! Masks and social distancing are required.

First Reading: Jonah 3:10—4:11

¹⁰When God saw what the people of Ninevah did, how they turned from their evil ways, God changed his mind about the calamity that he had said he would bring upon them; and he did not do it.

^{4:1}But this was very displeasing to Jonah, and he became angry. ²He prayed to the LORD and said, "O LORD! Is not this what I said while I was still in my own country? That is why I fled to Tarshish at the beginning; for I knew that you are a gracious God and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and ready to relent from punishing. ³And now, O LORD, please take my life from me, for it is better for me to die than to live." ⁴And the LORD said, "Is it right for you to be angry?" ⁵Then Jonah went out of the city and sat down east of the city, and made a booth for himself there. He sat under it in the shade, waiting to see what would become of the city.

⁶The LORD God appointed a bush, and made it come up over Jonah, to give shade over his head, to save him from his discomfort; so Jonah was very happy about the bush. ⁷But when dawn came up the next day, God appointed a worm that attacked the bush, so that it withered. ⁸When the sun rose, God prepared a sultry east wind, and the sun beat down on the head of Jonah so that he was faint and asked that he might die. Second Reading: Philippians 1:21-30

²¹For to me, living is Christ and dying is gain. ²²If I am to live in the flesh, that means fruitful labor for me; and I do not know which I prefer. ²³I am hard pressed between the two: my desire is to depart and be with Christ, for that is far better; ²⁴but to remain in the flesh is more necessary for you. ²⁵Since I am convinced of this, I know that I will remain and continue with all of you for your progress and joy in faith, ²⁶so that I may share abundantly in your boasting in Christ Jesus when I come to you again. ²⁷Only, live your life in a manner worthy of the gospel of Christ, so that, whether I come and see you or am absent and hear about you, I will know that you are standing firm in one spirit, striving side by side with one mind for the faith of the gospel, ²⁸and are in no way intimidated by your opponents. For them this is evidence of their destruction, but of your salvation. And this is God's doing. ²⁹For he has graciously granted you the privilege not only of believing in Christ, but of suffering for him as

well—³⁰since you are having the same struggle that you saw I had and now hear that I still have.

Gospel: Matthew 20:1-16

Jesus said to the disciples: 1"The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out early in the morning to hire laborers for his vineyard. ²After agreeing with the laborers for the usual daily wage, he sent them into his vineyard. ³When he went out about nine o'clock, he saw others standing idle in the marketplace; ⁴and he said to them, 'You also go into the vineyard, and I will pay you whatever is right.' So they went. 5When he went out again about noon and about three o'clock, he did the same. ⁶And about five o'clock he went out and found others standing around; and he said to them, 'Why are you standing here idle all day?' ⁷They said to him, 'Because no one has hired us.' He said to them, 'You also go into the vineyard.' 8When evening came, the owner of the vineyard said to his manager, 'Call the laborers and give them their pay, beginning with the last and then going to the first.' 9When those hired about five o'clock came, each of them received the usual daily wage. 10Now when the first came, they thought they would receive more; but each of them also received the usual daily wage. ¹¹And when they received it, they grumbled against the landowner, ¹²saying, 'These last worked only one hour, and you have made them equal to us who have borne the burden of the day and the scorching heat.' 13But he replied to one of them, 'Friend, I am doing you no wrong; did you not agree with me for the usual daily wage? ¹⁴Take what belongs to you and go; I choose to give to this last the same as I give to you. 15 Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or are you envious because I am generous?' 16So the last will be first, and the first will be last."

Weekly Devotional- August 24-30

Questions:

- 1. Have you ever wanted someone punished for something you thought was wrong, but they were not? How did you feel? Were you able to see another side and show compassion? (Jonah 3:10—4:11)
- 2. Are there times when you find it hard to show compassion? When you are not "slow to anger"? Think about those times and how you could react differently. (Psalm 145:1-8)
- 3. Have you ever felt that you were mistreated in a workplace? Or just felt envious? How did you handle it? We can either be gracious and thankful for what God has given to us or we can gripe and complain and grumble that God has been gracious to others. (Matthew 20:1-16)
