Be present and aware of what are you identifying with in the earth's rhythm at this time. Imagine taking a walk with Jesus or Mary or another holy person. You might dialogue with them about your walk in faith, service and justice. In the spring and summer, consider:

- What in you has been planted, waiting to emerge?
- Where do you need hope and trust in new life?
- What new life or buds are you noticing?

In the autumn and winter, consider:

- What in you has come to fruition?
- For what harvest or abundance are you grateful?
- What do you need to let go of? What needs to die for new life to emerge?

Allow the natural setting you choose to pray in to form your prayer (e.g. the prairie, woods, forest, hill, meditation grove, garden, nursery, wetland, by a tree, etc.). Remain in the landscape for a period of time, and let the beauty, intricacy and mystery of the environment inspire you and draw your heart to the Sacred One. "Be still and know that I am God" - Psalm 47: 10

Meditate. Creation often opens us to the significant times in our life. For example, watching the leaves, buds and flowers emerge may remind you of the changes in your life and the promise of new life, love and growth – or draw you back to memories. Watching the wind blow through the grasses or new growth after the burn may inspire you to reflect on the strength and growth God has given you, and the beauty in our vulnerability and flexibility. "I will meditate on all your work and muse on your mighty deeds." -Psalm 77:12

Draw a tree. Let the tree symbolize yourself; for each part of the tree reflect on the following questions. Write your responses on that part of the tree.

- a. ROOTS: Who and what has given you nourishment and vitality in your life? Who and what "roots" you in the times of significant change?
- b. TRUNK: What are your strengths? What has channeled new life into you?
- c. LEAVES: What fresh growth from former seasons is emerging in you? How do you feel called to trust?
- d. BARK: Who or what protects you, comforts you?
- e. BUDS: What is your hope for the future?
- f. FLOWERS/FRUITS: What beauty and bounty has come to you? Who or what are you providing nourishment for?

In the solitude. . .

Be still and know that I am God. Psalm 47: 10

With the trees. . .

The righteous flourish the palm tree and grow like a cedar. They are planted in the house of the Lord. They flourish in the courts of our God. With the wildflowers. . .

Consider the lilies, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin; yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these. Luke12:27

With the wetlands and pond. . .

As a deer longs for flowing streams, so longs my soul for thee, O God. My soul thirsts for God, for the living God. *Psalm 42: 1,2*

With the prairie. . .

Let the field exult, and everything in it. Then shall all the trees of the woods sing for joy before the Lord, who comes. *Psalm 96: 12*

With the wildlife. . .

Hide me in the shadow of your wings. *Psalm 17:8*Even the sparrow finds a home, and the swallow a nest for herself
Where she may lay her young, at your altars, O lord of hosts. *-Psalm 84:3*

With the sounds of creation. . .

Make a joyful noise to God, all the earth; Sing the Glory of God's name, give God glorious praise. *Psalm 66*

- If the Psalmist, the prophets or Jesus lived in our region today, and spoke parables or prayers to you, what images in creation do you think they might choose as examples to teach us about God and living the gospel call to justice?
- Compose a prayer giving thanks to God for the diversity and wonder you have experienced in the ecosystems this season or today.
- What in creation has been a Blessing of God for you?
- How do you feel called to act to care for & protect all of Creation?

But ask the animals, now, and they shall teach you; the birds of the sky, and they shall tell you. Or, speak to the earth, and it shall teach you. Ask the plants of the earth and they shall teach you. The fish of the sea shall declare to you.
