
#### **Framework**

This case study examines the growing trend of partnerships between European football clubs and African academies or clubs, with a focus on talent development. We analyze key examples such as the collaboration between **FC Metz and Generation Foot in Mali, and Ajax Cape Town** in South AFrica. We explore common traits of these partnerships, their impact on African football development, and provide recommendations for optimizing talent identification and nurturing processes.



# Trade Strategy

The tightening financial landscape in football, marked by media rights plateaus and stricter regulations, is pushing even giants like Barcelona towards a 'Moneyball' strategy of buying low and selling high. While smaller clubs, particularly in **Belgium**, have traditionally excelled at this approach, the potential decrease in broadcast revenue could intensify focus on talent development and shrewd market moves across the board. This shift might create an intriguing scenario where clubs of vastly different sizes, such as Gent and Barcelona, find themselves competing for the same undervalued players in a more crowded market.




# Top Player Trading Clubs

LOSC Lille stands out as the most successful club in transfer strategy, directly scouting talent in Africa with signings like Baleba and Bissouma. The Red Bull network, including RB Salzburg and RB Leipzig, aggressively pursues young talents such as Karim Konate and Oumar Diakité, leveraging their extensive club network for development. AS Monaco employs a multi-faceted approach, allowing players to take intermediate steps through clubs like Metz, utilizing RB Salzburg as a talent source, and benefiting from their relationship with Cercle Brugge as a feeder club, exemplified by players like Kevin Denkey and the Camaras (Lamine and Mohamed).



# **Expatriate Landscape**

African nations contribute significantly to the global pool of expatriate footballers, accounting for 14.3% of the total, with Nigeria (421), Ghana (339), and Ivory Coast (230) leading the continent. While individual African countries generally have fewer expatriates than top European and South American nations, the data reveals a concentration of talent from West Africa and widespread representation across the continent. This trend highlights Africa's role as a major talent exporter and suggests potential for further investment in youth development and local leagues to strengthen domestic football ecosystems.






Number of expatriate players worldwide

## **Top Destinations**

African expatriate football players show a significant upward trend from 2023 to 2024, with the top 10 African countries increasing their overseas representation by 142 players, led by **Nigeria and Senegal**. France emerges as the primary destination for African talent, while the diversification of destinations like the **USA and Czech Republic** suggests a broadening appeal of African players across different leagues and continents.





# Quality of Opportunity

African clubs in top leagues show a reluctance to give significant minutes to young players, with only **Stellenbosch FC** in South Africa allocating more than 10% of playing time to U21 players. This trend, coupled with high average squad ages nearing 29 in some leagues, may drive talent-seeking clubs to look beyond established African teams and leagues. Additionally, the vast population in countries like **Nigeria** offers a deep talent pool, making it an attractive source for discovering promising young players outside traditional club structures.



# Club Trained Players

Egyptian Premier League clubs show strong commitment to developing local talent, with **ENPPI Club** leading at 97% club-trained and 45% association-trained players, far above league averages. While giants **Al-Ahly and Zamalek** nurture homegrown talent well, smaller clubs like Ismaily SC also excel in this area. This league-wide focus on cultivating Egyptian talent contrasts with some larger African clubs, such as **Mamelodi Sundowns**, which tend to rely more on external recruitment.

## Case Study 1


Ousmane Diomande's rapid rise from a €400,000 prospect to a €40 million-valued defender at Sporting CP in just one year highlights the effectiveness of African talent scouting and development. His journey from Ivory Coast through Midtjylland to becoming a target for elite European clubs like Arsenal and Real Madrid exemplifies the lucrative pathway for African players in modern football. Diomande's case underscores the potential for massive returns on investment in young African talent, with a bigmoney transfer seeming inevitable in his future.

Carlos Baleba's journey from Cameroon to Brighton further exemplifies the rapid rise of African talent in European football. His swift progression from Lille's team to a €30 million Premier League transfer in just one year showcases the accelerated development path for exceptional African players. As Baleba continues to impress in high-profile matches, he is likely to become another lucrative transfer success story, highlighting Brighton's effective strategy in developing and selling African talent.








# PARTNERSHIP EXAMPLES

## FC Metz-Generation Foot

The partnership between FC Metz and Génération Foot, established in 2003 and recently extended to 2033, has been a significant success, producing top talents like Sadio Mané, Ismaila Sarr, and Pape Matar Sarr. Since 2013/14, 20 players have transferred directly from Génération Foot to FC Metz, representing 25.6% of all departures, while other players have moved to various European clubs across France, Belgium, North Macedonia, Malta, and Poland. This partnership has not only provided FC Metz with valuable players and transfer income but has also contributed to the development of Senegalese football, with six players from this pathway recently starting for Senegal's national team in an AFCON match.



#### Key Players

Ismaila Sarr was sold by Metz for €17 million in 2017 (club record sale at the time) ,Pape Matar Sarr was sold for €16.9 million in 2021, Sadio Mané was sold for €4 million in 2012, but later transfers totaled over €100 million

#### National Impact


6 players from this pathway started for Senegal in a recent AFCON match, showing the quality produced.

#### Details

Metz built a training facility in Dakar in 2014 to develop players aged 15-18 before they can move to Europe at 18. The partnership has been renewed for another 10 years, showing its ongoing value.

# AJAX AMSTERDAM - AJAX CAPE TOWN

Ajax Amsterdam's 21-year partnership with Ajax Cape Town ended in 2020 due to insufficient talent production at the desired level for European football. While the venture did produce some high-quality players who succeeded locally and internationally, such as Steven Pienaar and Thulani Serero, the overall output did not meet Ajax Amsterdam's expectations. The partnership's decline was marked by Ajax Cape Town's relegation in 2017-18 and subsequent failure to regain top-flight status, highlighting the growing disparity between the two clubs' ambitions and results.

#### **Details**

The partnership did not produce as many high-profile transfers to Europe as initially hoped. Most departures were to other South African clubs. The relationship ended in 2020

# Other Partnerships

Football clubs are employing various partnership models to enhance talent development and global reach. These range from strategic alliances like Cape Town Spurs F.C.'s collaboration with Core Sports Capital to comprehensive networks like Right to Dream's academies. Whether through multi-club ownership, talent development schemes, or direct partnerships with European clubs, these initiatives primarily focus on cultivating young talent in Africa, especially West Africa, to create pathways to top European leagues.



#### **Advanced Search and Filtering**




