Pastor's Reflection: 15th Sunday Ordinary Time A

We live in difficult times for the Catholic faith, with deep concerns regarding what really constitutes Catholic teaching and morality. While there is certainly a need to uphold a moral way of life, today's Gospel cautions against a puritanical clean sweep that overrules God's patience and seeks to turn the Church from a hospital for sinners into a germ-free (and hence people-free) zone. The guidance comes in four steps.

I. WAKE UP: *"While everyone was asleep, his enemy came and sowed weeds all through the wheat and then went off."* Notice that everyone was sleeping when the enemy sowed weeds. We Catholics have, in fact, been in a deep moral slumber, simply wanting to "go with the flow." Some parents don't know enough about what their children are surfing on the Internet, or who their friends are. While the culture was melting down beginning in the late 1960s, Church leadership was concerned about tuning guitars, moving the furniture in the sanctuaries, and engaging in gender wars. It's time to wake up and go out to reclaim the culture for Christ and to re-propose the Gospel to a world that has lost it.

II. WISE UP: *"Master... Where have the weeds come from?" He answered, "An enemy has done this."* Part of the sobriety we must regain is the understanding that we have an enemy who hates us—Satan. We have been dismissive of his presence for far too long, as though he were a fairy tale. Satan is real; he hates anyone and anything that strives to do God's will. We need to learn his moves, designs, tactics, and tools, employing humility to battle pride, love to conquer hate. To wise up means to come to the wisdom of the cross, not the world.

III. WAIT UP: *He replied, "No, if you pull up the weeds, you might uproot the wheat along with them. Let them grow together until harvest ..."* Fraternal correction is an essential work of charity, but it must be conducted with patience and love. The Lord invites us not to be overly anxious to pull out weeds lest we harm the wheat: *"Let them grow together. Scripture says, God's patience is directed to our salvation (2 Peter 3:9). Wait. Place this in the hands of God. Give the sinner time to repent."*

IV. WASH UP: *Then at harvest time I will say to the harvesters, "First collect the weeds and tie them in bundles for burning; but gather the wheat into my barn."* There is a harvest. The Lord is no pushover; He does not make light of sin. In telling us to wait, He does not mean to say that judgment will never come, but His general advice is to leave it to Him. In the week ahead, let us be attentive to the Lord as he invites us to "wash up, get ready, and help others to get ready to render an account," Amen.

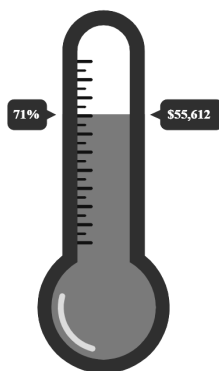

A Journey Through the Catechism 8: The Eucharist (CCC, 3122-1419)

What is the prominence of the Sacrament of the Eucharist in the Church?

Reception of the Sacrament of the Eucharist completes Christian initiation for baptized Catholics. The Body of Christ in the Eucharist is the very body of Christ that hung upon the Cross. The precious Blood of Christ in the Eucharist is the very blood that flowed from his side. “The Holy Eucharist flows from our Lord’s perfect sacrifice upon the Cross, from his very heart. The Holy Eucharist is the very heart of the Church, her source and her summit.

What is the meant by the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist?

Catholics not only believe in the Real Presence of Jesus in the Holy Eucharist, but we believe in His *substantial* presence – that is, He is really present in the substance of the consecrated bread and wine. (cf. Mt 25-31-46, CCC 1373). The priest, in the role of Christ, pronounces these words, but their power and grace are God’s. This is my body, he says. This word transforms the things offered” (CCC 204n. Cf Mt 26:27). Our Lord does not equivocate in His words: For my flesh is true food, and my blood is true drink. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him (Jn 6:53-56).

What is meant by the term *transubstantiation*?

The term *transubstantiation* refers to the change of the essential nature of the bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Christ during consecration at Mass. The prefix *trans* mean “to go across” or “to change,” as in the words *transform* and *transport*. *Substance* refers to the very essence of a thing or a person, as opposed to the accidental features such as shape and color. In the Holy Eucharist, the accidents of the bread and the wine remain, but by the power of the Holy Spirit and the power of the Word of God spoken over the gifts of bread and wine (“This is my body” and “This is the chalice of my blood”), the substance of the bread and wine is changed. (CCC 1373-1377). Always remember that the *whole Christ* is substantially and wholly present in both the Blessed Sacrament and the Precious Blood, whether we receive only a fraction of the sacred host or a single drop of the Precious Blood from the chalice.

What is the proper way to show respect for the Blessed Sacrament when entering or leaving a Church?

When entering or leaving a Church in which the Blessed Sacrament is reserved in a tabernacle, or when passing in front of a tabernacle marked with a veil or burning votive candle, it is fitting to genuflect with your right knee or to bow deeply as a sign of adoration. In her Eucharistic piety, which includes the reservation of the Blessed Sacrament in the tabernacle and the popular devotions of exposition and Benediction, the Church affirms her belief in the Real Presence (CCC 1379).
