Pastor's Reflection: Baptism of the LORD 2026

The Sacrament of Baptism is "The washing of regeneration and renewal by the Holy Spirit." The Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC 1213) says, "Holy Baptism is the basis of the whole Christian life, the gateway to life in the Spirit (*vitae spiritualis ianua*), and the door which gives access to the other sacraments. Through Baptism we are freed from sin and reborn as sons of God; we become members of Christ, are incorporated into the Church and made sharers in her mission: 'Baptism is the sacrament of regeneration through water in the word.'"

CCC 1214 This sacrament is called *Baptism*, after the central rite by which it is carried out: to baptize (Greek *baptizein*) means to "plunge" or "immerse"; the "plunge" into the water symbolizes the catechumen's burial into Christ's death, from which he rises up by resurrection with him, as "a new creature."

CCC 1215 This sacrament is also called "*the washing of regeneration and renewal by the Holy Spirit*," for it signifies and actually brings about the birth of water and the Spirit without which no one "can enter the kingdom of God."

CCC 1216 "This bath is called *enlightenment*, because those who receive this [catechetical] instruction are enlightened in their understanding . . ." Having received in Baptism the Word, "the true light that enlightens every man," the person baptized has been "enlightened," he becomes a "son of light," indeed, he becomes "light" himself:

Baptism is God's most beautiful and magnificent gift. . . . We call it gift, grace, anointing, enlightenment, garment of immortality, bath of rebirth, seal, and most precious gift. It is called *gift* because it is conferred on those who bring nothing of their own; *grace* since it is given even to the guilty; *Baptism* because sin is buried in the water; *anointing* for it is priestly and royal as are those who are anointed; *enlightenment* because it radiates light; *clothing* since it veils our shame; *bath* because it washes; and *seal* as it is our guard and the sign of God's Lordship.

At our Baptism, Christians make a commitment to let the light of Christ increase in the world through their lives, and to help diminish the darkness of evil, as we heard in the readings. Hence, the priest asks us, **'Do you believe in God?'** and we answer, **'Yes.'** **'Do you reject Satan,'** and we also answer **YES.**

John's ambition was simply to get out of the way so that Jesus could become first in the hearts of his own disciples. The ambition of every Christian should be to let the light of Christ be seen through us and the darkness of sin to be diminished. That is what happens to us at Baptism. We take on a new name as Children of God who reject Satan and all his empty promises. May we renew our promises of Holy Baptism to accept God and reject Satan in all we do, promoting the will of God, not our own ideas, Amen.

Catechesis on Parish Vision and The Eucharist

Beloved parishioners, in this New Year 2026, I am humbly inviting you, to pray with me over the passage of **Habakkuk 2:2-3** towards a vision of evangelization in our parish. Our Family Life and Relationship Ministry and the Children's Choir will be initial channels of evangelization to invite people into the life of our parish, while deepening our meditation on the Eucharist through catechesis and the sacred liturgy to nourish our daily lives. The Vatican Council II document, *Lumen Gentium* #11 and the Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC1407) teach that “The Eucharist is the heart and the summit of the Church's life” The Eucharist nourishes the souls of the faithful and perfectly signifies and admirably realizes the unity of the People of God.

Here are a few apparent reminders regarding Catholic belief in the Eucharist: Canon 912 of the Code of Canon Law rightly states that **“any baptized person not prohibited by law can and must be admitted to holy communion.”** Canon 916: “A person who is conscious of grave sin is not to celebrate Mass or receive the body of the Lord without previous sacramental confession unless there is a grave reason and there is no opportunity to confess; in this case, the person is to remember the obligation to make an act of perfect contrition which includes the resolution of confessing as soon as possible” (Cf. CCC 1415). In his first letter to the Corinthians, Saint Paul also said, “Therefore whoever eats the bread and drinks the cup of the Lord unworthily will have to answer for the body and blood of the Lord...For anyone who eats and drinks without discerning the body, eats and drinks judgment on himself” (1 Cor. 11:27, 29).

The Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist is a central dogma of the Catholic faith: “The power of the words and the action of Christ, and the power of the Holy Spirit, make sacramentally present under the species of bread and wine Christ's body and blood, his sacrifice offered on the cross once for all” (CCC 1353). Because the Roman Catholic Church believes and teaches that when we receive Communion, we participate in the body and blood of Christ, **not just symbols of them**, the faithful must profess this faith each time they receive the sacrament with an “Amen.” The Priest says, “The Body of Christ, to which we respond Amen.” By this Amen (which every Catholic who receives the Eucharist knows), **we espouse publicly the faith and moral teachings of the Catholic Church** and desire to live accordingly. **It is the reason why non-Catholics aren't permitted to receive Holy Communion at Mass.**
