Pastor's Reflection: 28th Sunday of Ordinary Time

One of the tremendous human inadequacies is our inability to give proper and adequate thanks to God. This Fundamental Question – which is at the heart of the Gospel this Sunday is best expressed in the Book of Psalms: What return shall I make to the Lord for all the good he has done for me? The same psalm goes on to answer the question in this way: The cup of salvation I will take up and call on the name of the Lord (Psalm 116:12). Notice that the psalm points to the Eucharist in saying, The cup of salvation I will take up The word Eucharist is a Greek word meaning "thanksgiving." At every Mass, Jesus takes up the cup of salvation through the priest and shows it to us. In every Mass, Jesus joins us to His perfect sacrifice of thanks. Today's Gospel contains all the essential elements of Holy Mass. It is about giving thanks and reminds us that the Mass is the perfect thanksgiving, the ideal "Eucharist."

Let's look and see how it is a Mass:

- **1. Gathering** Ten lepers (symbolizing us) have gathered, and Jesus comes near as He passes on His way. We do this in every Mass: we gather, and the Lord draws near.
- **2.** *Kyrie* The lepers cry out for mercy, just as we do at every Mass. Lord, have mercy! Jesus, Master, have pity on us!
- **3.** Liturgy of the Word In saying, "Go show yourselves to the priests," Jesus is referencing Leviticus 13, which gives detailed instructions on how the priests of old were to diagnose leprosy or its having been cured. At every Mass, we listen to the Lord Jesus, through the priest or deacon, proclaiming God's Word and then applying it to our lives.
- **4.** Liturgy of the Eucharist The Gospel relates that one of them *fell at the feet of Jesus and thanked him*. This is what we do during the Eucharistic prayer: we kneel and thank Jesus, and along with Him, give thanks to the Father. As noted, the word "Eucharist" comes from the Greek and means "thanksgiving." Only Jesus can provide perfect thanks to the Father, and we can only give adequate thanks by following Jesus' command to "Do this in memory of me." We have to be at Mass.
- **5.** *Ite, missa est* Jesus sends the thankful leper on his way, saying, *Stand up and go; your faith has saved you*. We, too, are sent forth by Jesus at the end of every Mass, when He speaks through the priest or deacon: "The Mass is ended, go in peace."

Within this Gospel, which very clearly instructs us to thank God, is the very structure of the Mass: What return shall I make to the Lord for all the good he has done for me? The cup of salvation I will take up and call on the name of the Lord (Psalm 116:12). It is the proper sacrifice of praise to God, and not our entertainment.

A Journey Through the Catechism 7: The Blessed Mother (CCC, 484-511, 721-726, 963-975)

The month of October is dedicated to the Most Holy Rosary (Also, Respect Life Month). This custom was especially promoted by Pope Leo XIII in the late 19th century, who urged Catholics to pray the Rosary fervently during this month for the needs of the Church and for peace in the world. Throughout this month, the Church invites us to draw close to Our Blessed Mother by praying the Rosary daily, meditating on the mysteries of our salvation, and entrusting our families, parish, and the world to her loving intercession. Fr. Mahan outlines five teachings about Mary that are essential for Catholics to believe:

Mary was predestined to be the mother of Jesus.

Mary was chosen by God from all eternity to be the mother of his Son. Through Mary, God keeps His promise made through the prophet Isaiah that "the virgin shall be with child and bear a son" (Is 7:14, Mt 1:24 cf. Lk 1:26ff cf. CCC, 488-499). God chose and prepared Mary with special graces, and he foresaw her cooperation with these graces to give her fiat, her consent to be the mother of Jesus.

Mary was conceived without sin in her mother's womb — The Immaculate Conception.

The doctrine teaches that Mary was preserved immune "from all stain of original sin" from the moment of her conception (CCC, 491 Lk 1:28). This was a singular grace and privilege, by virtue of the merits of Jesus Christ, Savior of humanity.

According to Christ's human nature, Mary is called Theotokos, the Mother of God.

The doctrine on the divine motherhood of Mary is rooted in Scripture when her kinswoman Elizabeth asks Mary, "How does this happen to me, that the mother of my Lord should come to me?" (Lk 1:43). Mary is called *Theotokos*, a term meaning "God bearer" or "Mother of God." We are called to be God-bearers, following the example of the Blessed Mother.

Mary remained a virgin before, during, and after the birth of Jesus.

Catholics believe in the perpetual virginity of Mary. "Christ's birth did not diminish Mary's virginity but sanctified it" (CCC, 499).

At the end of her life, Mary was Assumed body and soul into heaven – The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Christians have taught that at the end of her life, Mary was assumed into heaven body and soul, corresponding with the fact that, unlike other figures of the New Testament such as St. Peter and St. Paul, there has never been a claim to relics of the body of the Blessed Mother, nor of a tomb containing her body. The Church has recognized in the Book of Revelation a stunning image of the Blessed Mother in heaven: "A great sign appeared in the sky, a woman clothed with the sun, with the moon under her feet, and on her head a crown of twelve stars" (Rv 12:1). All these beliefs about Mary point to her Son and roots in Sacred Scripture.
