Pastor's Reflection: Feast of Corpus Christi

On the Feast of Corpus Christi, we meditate on the Lord's desire to feed His people and the shocking indifference many have to this fact, including those who receive the Eucharist but consider it a social meal of inclusion. Let's consider today's Gospel in three ways.

I. Desire that is Discerned – Jesus has been teaching the crowds all day by the lake, and the crowd is now hungry. And this is a general diagnosis of the human condition: we are hungry. We are a veritable sea of desires. We desire money, fame, food, drink, popularity, intimacy, family, security, affirmation, and more. Yes, we are hungry. And herein lies an insight for evangelization. Amidst all this hunger, God is calling us. Sadly, while every advertiser in downtown San Rafael knows how to tap into people's desire and draw forth loyalty, we Christians have little insight. For the people of this world are shrewder in dealing with their own kind than the people of the light (Lk 16:8). This could also describe us today.

II. Directive for the Disciples – The Lord told the disciples, "Give them some food yourselves." The Apostles, of course, are staring right in the face of Jesus Christ, yet think it impossible to feed this crowd. Yes, this is also a picture of many in the Church today, who believe nothing can be done to reverse the cultural decline or bring people back to the Church. Jesus will not allow all our negativity to crush His desire. The Lord insists, "Give them something to eat yourselves." In other words, "Draw them to the Eucharistic table! Draw them to me!"

III. Determination to Deliver — The text says of the disciples: They did so and made them all sit down. Then, taking the five loaves and the two fish, and looking up to heaven, he said the blessing over them, broke them, and gave them to the disciples to set before the crowd. They all ate and were satisfied. Note well that the Lord is determined to feed these people and insists that His disciples help him do it. And this is the Church. Jesus is the Great High Priest of every Liturgy. He takes our meager offerings and then multiples and transubstantiates them. But He works this ministry through His priests, and in an extended sense, through the whole Church.

Do we see this as central to our mission? Is the Liturgy really at the heart of our parish life, or are liturgies hurried so that we can get to our next activity on time? Why not ask the Lord to engender within you the same desire that He has to feed others and make you a magnet to draw people to Him? Who are the "fifty" the Lord has put in your charge? Gather them and have them seated at Mass next Sunday.

A Journey Through the Catechism 5: The Holy Spirit and the Birth of the Catholic Church at Pentecost (CCC 683-810)

The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches that the Church is instituted and structured by Christ to provide a means of grace through the sacraments that guide us to our eternal destiny (CCC, 871-879). Catholics are often asked to defend that statement by sharing where such teachings about the Church are found in the Bible.

Perhaps the better question would be, "Where is the teaching about the Church not found in the Bible?" Throughout the Old Testament, the Church is prefigured by the special place God has for the people of Israel, holding them as the apple of his eye (cf. CCC, 761-762, Zec 2:8). Our Lord calls together his twelve Apostles from diverse backgrounds and talents and forms them through his teachings and miracles to be the leaders of the nascent Church. After the day of Pentecost, the Apostles would travel to the ends of the earth, proclaiming the Good News and building up the Church through the sacraments. "Through the Church's sacraments, Christ communicates his Holy and sanctifying Spirit to the members of his body" (CCC, 739).

Jesus institutes His Church for you, so that you might be

- Born anew through the Sacrament of Baptism
- Strengthened in faith through the Sacrament of Confirmation
- Nourished for service through the Sacrament of the Eucharist
- Absolved of sin through the Sacrament of Penance
- Consoled and healed in the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick
- At the service of communion in the Church through the Sacrament of Holy Orders or the Sacrament of Matrimony, or in a life of consecrated service to the Lord

Jesus institutes the Catholic Church and promises to guard her through thick and thin so that you might bear the fruit of the Spirit in abundance (cf. CCC, 737, Jn 15:8, 16). The Church is for you, and the Church is able to accomplish her mission because of you. Salvation is not a self-help project. We are saved through the Church as members of the Body of Christ (cf. CCC, 738).

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
