Pastor's Reflection: 4th Sunday of Easter, Year C

The Lord says in today's Gospel, "My Sheep hear my voice..." What does the Lord mean by using sheep as a sign for us?

- THE SIGN OF THE SHEEP: (a.) Sheep are WAY-WARD—Sheep wander off and don't know how to return to the sheepfold unless the Shepherd goes and brings them back. Dogs and cats can find their way home, but not the old Sheep. We, like Sheep, need the sheepfold of the Church and the Shepherd, who is Christ, ministering through teachers of the faith. (b.) Sheep are WITLESS—We train dogs, birds, horses, and even lions. But the sheep cannot be trained! Sure, humans have been to the moon, but too many of us don't recognize the value of daily prayer, Church attendance for our souls. We think we have a better way that God's way. (c.) Sheep are WEAK—A sheep cannot protect himself. The mule can kick, te cat can scratch, the dog can bite But without the Shepherd and the sheep dogs, the Sheep is history. And so, it is with us were it not for the care of Jesus the Good Shepherd. (d.) And Yet, Sheep are WORTHWHILE animals. In Jesus' day, many men counted their wealth by sheep. Shepherds made sacrifices in Jesus' day to breed and protect these valuable animals. And so it is with us. The lord paid the price of our redemption with his own precious blood (1 Peter 1:18-19). Sheep WALK together—Sheep flock together and thus are safer. We are called to be part of a flock and to be in the care of a shepherd (John 10:16). (f.) Sheep are WAY—Sheep have the remarkable quality of knowing their master's voice and instinctively fearing any other voice and fleeing from it. Sadly, Christians can so easily be drawn to the enemy's voice and feast on it.
- II. THE SAFETY OF THE SHEEP—Jesus says, they hear my voice; I know them, and they follow me. No one can take them out of my hand. The safety of Jesus' flock is all predicated on listening to His voice. If we want protection and safety, we must know only Jesus' voice and stop running after false shepherds and voices. Every ancient city had walls and gates to protect its citizens. But that citizen was a fool who thought he could enjoy the city's protection by journeying outside its protective walls. It simply doesn't work that way.
- III. THE SALVATION OF THE SHEEP—The text says, I give them eternal life, and the shall never perish. Note that, for the flock of the Lord, there is the gift of "eternal life." But eternal life refers not only to the capacity to "live forever and never die." It does mean this, but it begins now. And "eternal" refers not only to the length of life but to the fullness of it. In this sense, eternal life is now as we become ever more aware of an experience that "If anyone is in Christ, he 5:17). new creation!" (2 Cor is a

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A Journey Through the Catechism 4: The Life of Christ (CCC 571–682)

In the last episode of this series, we reflected on Fr. Mahan's powerful reminder that Christianity is not a human invention or a moral myth. It is not simply a philosophy, a set of rules, or a ritual practice. Rather, at the very heart of our faith is a person—Jesus Christ. He is not a symbol or idea, but the Eternal Word of God made flesh, born into a specific time and place in fulfillment of ancient promises. Jesus came to dwell among us, to teach us how to live, to suffer and die for our sins, and to rise again, offering us the hope of eternal life.

As the Catechism states, "The Resurrection of Jesus is at the very heart of our Catholic faith" (CCC 638). The Cross—the central symbol of Christianity—is recognized across the world. While it represents a cruel and torturous method of execution, it also proclaims the greatest love the world has ever known.

St. Paul boldly declares, "We proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those who are called, Jews and Greeks alike, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God" (1 Cor 1:23–25). What appeared to be weakness and failure was, in truth, the triumph of divine love. On the Cross, Jesus bore the weight of all sin and death—and through His Resurrection, He conquered them. The Cross, then, becomes the center of the Good News (cf. CCC 571), proclaiming victory: goodness over evil, life over death, and the freedom of God's children over slavery to sin.

St. Paul also teaches plainly: "Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures" (1 Cor 15:3). Jesus is the true Lamb of God. His sacrificial death brings eternal salvation, just as the blood of the Passover lamb once brought deliverance to Israel (cf. Is 53:3–4; CCC 601). The Catechism reminds us that Jesus offered the supreme expression of His love at the Last Supper, the night He was betrayed: "Jesus gave the supreme expression of his free offering of himself at the meal shared with the twelve apostles" (CCC 610).

From that night onward, the Church has faithfully obeyed His command: "Do this in memory of me." At every Mass, we are mystically brought to Calvary. We stand at the foot of the Cross and participate in the one, perfect sacrifice of Jesus—offered now in an unbloody manner (cf. CCC 1367). In the Eucharist, we are united with Christ in a most intimate way—Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity.

Through Baptism and the Sacraments, we are drawn ever deeper into this mystery, called to live not just with Christ, but like Christ. This means living our faith daily—not only in worship but in action—especially in caring for the poor and vulnerable. In doing so, we live the very life of Christ (See, pages 59–71).
