## Fr. Gabriel's Reflection-13th Sunday Yr B

Beloved Parish Family of St Anselm,

The book of Wisdom tells us that God, who formed us in His imperishable image, did not intend for us to die. Rather, death came about through the envy of the devil. This is obviously a commentary on the story of Adam and Eve in the garden – how they tried to find their happiness and fulfillment by making their own rules rather than doing what God told them to do or not to do. They thought God wanted to prevent them from being happy instead of trusting that God had their best interests at heart. When the devil convinces us, we need to do things our way and not God's way to find happiness, we find death instead. The miracles in today's gospel show rather what can happen when we put our trust in Jesus – we find peace, healing and happiness.

While our government says it will be providing health care for many more people, our Gospel reminds us not to forget that God too is interested in our well-being. In the first miracle, a synagogue official throws himself at the feet of Jesus, begging him to heal his daughter, who is near death. Jesus goes off with Jairus and cures the daughter. In the second miracle, a woman afflicted for twelve years, had spent all she had seeking cure without any improvement. Yet, unwavering in her faith and courage, moves through the crowd to touch Jesus.

Notice that the little sick girl said to be twelve years, just as the woman suffered from the flow of blood for twelve years as well. In the culture of the time twelve years was thought to be the marriageable age. The "little girl," then, has died before she could become a wife and mother. The woman had suffered an illness that prevented her from bearing children. Jesus not only rescued these women from death but restores to them their bodies, one racked with disease, the other deprived of life itself. Bringing forth children was seen in Judaism as an imitation of the lifegiving power of God and a fulfillment of the command to make the earth fruitful.

The Jesus who emerges from these stories is one who is compassionate in the face of human suffering and who makes the needs of the sufferers the norm for his action, to the disregard of social taboos and conventions. He talks to a woman in public and violates the stringent taboo against touching a corpse.

Faith, especially as embodied by the bleeding woman, can exist in the face of seemingly hopeless situations. God invites us to deep faith in Him in times when every hope seems lost. As a Church, it is a challenge for us to enhance our ability to give and sustain life in the face of war, disease, abuse, and poverty.

In the week ahead, with the faith of the parents in the Gospel, let us pray for our sick loved ones (perhaps invite the priest to anoint them), and ourselves, trusting in Jesus' promise that even death cannot keep us apart. Amen



#### The 2025 Church Restoration Campaign

Dear Parishioners,

For over 115 years, we have gathered in St. Anselm Church to celebrate life events: Baptisms, First Communions, Reconciliations, Confirmations, Weddings, Funerals, and school activities. This beautiful facility now needs our assistance. As with all physical structures, our church requires considerable repairs and maintenance beyond the scope of the daily, monthly, and yearly projects.

Approximately 6 years ago our Finance Council invited a group of parishioners and professionals skilled in the areas of architecture, construction, and facility maintenance to evaluate the needs of our church structure. Due to Covid 19, we have been on hold for the past 4 years. The results of this study showed that there are significant repairs that should be addressed. The most critical repairs are: The bell tower and the bell tower concrete foundation; waterproofing paper behind the stucco throughout the church exterior walls which has disintegrated over multiple decades leading to excessive water damage and rot to the wood frame structure.

It is estimated that the total repairs will cost approximately \$3,500,000. We initiated the capital campaign over 5 years ago, typically called the "Silent Campaign". Covid-19 put a hold on all fundraising efforts. In 2021 a long-time parishioner passed away and donated \$1,000,000 to St. Anselm Church. As of June 2024, we have \$2,000,000 committed to the Restoration Campaign (57%) Our goal is to raise the balance which is 1,500,000 (43%).

Our Catholic faith, this Church, and this Parish, require a commitment from each one of us. Giving money in the Sunday collection or electronically is indeed an obligation for the sustainability of our parish community. In humility, I ask each family to decide what their commitment will be. Can each of us seek to reallocate monies within our personal budgets to go towards St. Anselm's and its longterm sustainability?

You are a blessing to this faith community. The parish thanks you and needs your support.
