Fr. Gabriel's Reflection-14th Sunday Yr B

Beloved Parish Family of St Anselm,

While the Bible contains stories of trustworthy and false prophets across the centuries, those who hear their messages have not always appreciated the former. Sometimes prophets predicted the future, but most of the time, their task was to remind God's people of how God wanted them to live. The prophet Ezekiel lived about 600 years before Christ and had to warn the people of the national disaster if they did not change their ways. God cautions Ezekiel that as a prophet, he would not have an easy job of it, much like Jesus, the greatest prophet of all, who was rejected by his people when he came to preach in his hometown of Nazareth.

A prophet speaks on behalf of God, as God's messenger, and on behalf of those who have no one to speak for them, giving a voice to the voiceless (the widow, the orphan, the poor, the stranger in the land). A prophet is not primarily a *fore-teller* but a *forth-teller* who proclaims with insight the evils that afflict society and can ultimately spell its downfall, reaching back into the deepest roots of a religious tradition and summoning people to be faithful to them, as the Hebrew prophets did evoke the exile from Egypt and the Sinai covenant.

Jesus' rejection by his family, recounted earlier in Mark (3:20-21, 31-35), is mentioned by all Gospels. Why did Jesus' relatives and townsfolk reject him? Jesus probably did not fulfill their hopes for a nationalistic messiah (Luke 24:21, Acts 1:6) but proclaimed instead forgiveness of enemies and acceptance of the Gentiles. Because of their closed minds, "he could not perform any mighty deeds there." The word of God, besides comforting us in our troubles and offering us hope to face the future with trust in God's providence, is also meant to *challenge us to a life of conversion and repentance*.

Today's readings remind us of the risk of silencing the voice of prophecy based on the revelation in the Sacred Scriptures and instead inventing our prophecies. In the 1940s, Jesuits were forced to leave some University communities because of their outspoken criticism of racism in this country. A more pervasive instance today is to label those with a faith based on the Catholic Creed as fundamentalists. Whereas, relativism, which is letting oneself be tossed by every wind of teaching, looks like the only attitude acceptable to today's standards. Such amounts to a 'dictatorship of relativism' which does not recognize anything as certain and which has as its highest goal one's own ego and desires.

Importantly, any prophetic preaching must measure itself against the saying of Jesus Christ: "My teaching is not mine" (Jn 7:16). We are to preach not private theories and opinions, but the faith of the Church, whose servants we are. If we do not preach ourselves and are inwardly so completely one with Him who called us to be his ambassadors, then our preaching will tell people what God wants them to hear, and not what they want to hear, Amen.

Catechesis on the Parish Pastoral Council

Last month, I constituted our Parish Pastoral Council (PPC) to assist me in leading the Parish community in discerning the present and future Parish direction. The success of this endeavor requires not only education but the formation of myself, council members, and the Parish at large.

Among other things, the role of the PPC consists of the following:

- To assist the Pastor in his leadership role of planning, organizing, initiating, promoting, coordinating and reviewing the evangelization, worship, religious education/formation and service activities within the Parish.
- To assess adequately the needs of the whole Parish and its members and to develop and implement a pastoral plan that will promote the common good of the Parish.
- To foster unity and a sense of community in the Parish and to coordinate all parish activities in a manner that will best serve the interests of the Parish.
- To promote programs and activities in the Parish as recommended by the PPC, the archbishop, or archdiocesan offices.

The Second Vatican Council has identified the following essential elements that form the essence of Parish life: Evangelization, Worship and word, Community Service and Stewardship Leadership.

These elements constantly interrelate in Parish life, nurturing and supporting the other. Focusing on these elements, I hope for the council to be primarily charged with assisting in the development of St. Anselm as a mission-focused Parish, placing at the heart of the parish a consciousness of zeal for the mission of Jesus Christ.

Our PPC will be the umbrella body for all devotional groups, associations and ministries in our Parish of St. Anselm. With a primarily advisory role, I will consider the opinions and recommendations of the PPC, even as ultimately, per Canon Law, all decisions about the operation and direction of the Parish need to carry the Pastor's agreement and approval. By revisioning the parish through the direction of the PPC, it is my prayer that the entire Parish joins together to fulfill its unique role within the local and universal Church.
