## Pastor's Reflection: Epiphany of the LORD 2026

In the Epiphany story, we see the call of the Gentiles, their enthusiastic response, the significance of the star they seek, the gifts they bring, the dramatic interaction with Herod, and their ultimate rejection of Herod in favor of Christ. These elements ultimately serve to cause them to "return to their country by another route." They journeyed from being mere magi to becoming, by God's grace, wise men. Let us follow their journey in stages:

**The CALL that COMPLETES** – The individuals in the story are labeled magi (μάγοι (*magoi*) in Greek) and are from the East. They are *Gentiles* who have been called. Up until this point in the Christmas story, only Jews had found their way to Bethlehem. This call completes the Church, which needs both Jews and Gentiles. God calls them through something in the natural world: a star. What is the "star" that God uses to call you? Perhaps it is Scripture, but more typically, God uses someone in our life to reach us: a parent, a family member, a friend, a priest, a religious sister, or a devoted layperson. Who are the stars in your life through whom God called you?

**The CONSTANCY that CONQUERS** – Despite the reigning King, Herod, knowing nothing of the birth of this new King, and even the religious leaders, the magi persevered in their search; they did not give up! Many today have found their way to Christ even though parents, clergy, and others who should have led them to Jesus were either asleep, ignorant, or just plain lazy. Constancy is often what it takes to overcome the darkness and discouragements of the world.

**The CONDESCENSION that CONFESSES** – In faith, the Magi set out and continued to follow the star's call. On arrival, they "prostrate" themselves before Jesus. The Greek word used - προσεκύνησαν (*prosekunēsan*) - means "to fall down in worship" or "to give adoration," and is used twelve times in the New Testament. The Magi manifest faith! The beginning of wisdom is the fear of the Lord. And these Magi are well on their way from being mere magi to being wise men!

**The COST that COMES** – There is a cost to discipleship. The Magi are moved to give three symbolic gifts that show some of what true faith includes. **Gold** symbolizes all our possessions, saying, "I acknowledge that everything I have is yours. **Frankincense** is a resin used in incense and symbolizes the gift of worship and prayer. **Myrrh** is typically regarded as a burial ointment. Surely this prefigures Jesus' death, but it also symbolizes our own, as when we say to Jesus, "My life is yours."

**The CONVERSION that is CLEAR** – *Warned in a dream not to return to Herod, the magi departed for their country by another way.* Here is essential evidence for faith: conversion. It is not enough to simply be "happy" in Church; we must change direction (*conversio*). Epiphany means "manifestation." How is our faith made manifest in our deeds and conversion?

## **Catechesis on Parish Vision and The Eucharist**

Beloved parishioners, in this New Year 2026, I am humbly inviting you, to pray with me over the passage of **Habakkuk 2:2-3** towards a vision of evangelization in our parish. Our Family Life and Relationship Ministry and the Children's Choir will be initial channels of evangelization to invite people into the life of our parish, while deepening our meditation on the Eucharist through catechesis and the sacred liturgy to nourish our daily lives.

The Vatican Council II document, *Lumen Gentium* #11 and the Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC1407) teach that "The Eucharist is the heart and the summit of the Church's life, for in it Christ associates his Church and all her members with his sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving offered once for all on the cross to his Father; by this sacrifice he pours out the graces of salvation on his Body which is the Church." The Eucharist nourishes the souls of the faithful and perfectly signifies and admirably realizes the unity of the People of God.

Here are a few apparent reminders: Canon 912 of the Code of Canon Law rightly states that "**any baptized person not prohibited by law can and must be admitted to holy communion.**" Canon 916: "A person who is conscious of grave sin is not to celebrate Mass or receive the body of the Lord without previous sacramental confession unless there is a grave reason and there is no opportunity to confess; in this case, the person is to remember the obligation to make an act of perfect contrition which includes the resolution of confessing as soon as possible" (Cf. CCC 1415). In his first letter to the Corinthians, Saint Paul also said, "Therefore whoever eats the bread and drinks the cup of the Lord unworthily will have to answer for the body and blood of the Lord...For anyone who eats and drinks without discerning the body, eats and drinks judgment on himself" (1 Cor. 11:27, 29).

The Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist is a central dogma of the Catholic faith: "The power of the words and the action of Christ, and the power of the Holy Spirit, make sacramentally present under the species of bread and wine Christ's body and blood, his sacrifice offered on the cross once for all" (CCC 1353). Because the Roman Catholic Church believes and teaches that when we receive Communion, we participate in the body and blood of Christ, not just symbols of them, the faithful must profess this faith each time they receive the sacrament with an "Amen." The Priest says, "The Body of Christ, to which we respond Amen." By this Amen (which every Catholic who receives the Eucharist knows), *we espouse publicly the faith and moral teachings of the Catholic Church* and desire to live accordingly. **It is the reason why non-Catholics aren't permitted to receive Holy Communion at Mass.**



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
