

#### Fr. Garcia's Reflection: The 8th Sunday In OT Yr C

Dear Parishioners,

This will be my last column in the parish bulletin. Father Gabriel is coming home from holiday in Nigeria and it's time for me to move on to Lima, Peru for some retreats. As an expression of my gratitude to you dear St. Anselm parishioners I leave you with a few more thoughts on "active participation" in the sacred liturgy. When the Council of Trent (in the 1560s) drew up its decree on the Holy Eucharist, the bishops made three points (among others).

First, they asked the question: "Why did the Lord Jesus leave His Church the Sacrament of the Eucharist on the night before he died?" The Council answers that Jesus, who refers to Himself as the Bridegroom, knew that He would be "taken away" from His bride on Good Friday. He wanted to mitigate her sense of loss. Consequently, He determined to leave her a pledge or token of His charity which would revitalize her trust and strengthen their union "until His return." But what kind of **sign** would be strong enough to **reassure** her in this way? A book of wedding photos left on the coffee table? A signed marriage certificate framed on the wall? His wedding ring placed under her pillow? No, such souvenirs would not be enough.

As a second step in their argument the Council Fathers continue. The particular token He chose to leave His bride was the very act by which He ratified and consummated their love on the Cross. This visible, audible, and sacramental action ("This is my Body...my Blood... given up for you") would be prolonged throughout history and would allow His bride, the Church, access to His undying love for her.

Third: There was an added reason why the Bridegroom left with His bride the very act of His own self-offering on Calvary. It was so that **she** might join with Him in her **own** act of self-offering – simultaneously. His sacrifice in the Holy Mass would call forth her sacrifice as a response. What she sees Him doing, she does herself. This would allow the two to be one again...united... in self immolation for the glory of God and the salvation of souls.

I hope the reflection of the Council of Trent helps you answer the question: why the Holy Sacrifice is the center of Catholic worship. Since the Church is essentially in a spousal relationship with the Savior God, mutual self-giving (as befits husband & wife) is the means by which she joins with the Son in offering the Father fitting praise. When the Church offers herself to God as a sacrifice, in union with Christ, she is also on the deepest path of "active participation."

## A Journey Through the Catechism 2: What Does it Mean to Have Faith?

In our earlier section of A Journey through the Catechism series, we dwelt on Fr. Mahan words that "We are made for God," though scientists tell us that the universe is nine-ty-six billion light years in size. In this section, we will look at his answer to the question: What Does it Mean to Have Faith?

"God reveals himself to human beings and invites us to trust in him. Faith is our proper response to that invitation (cf. CCC, 142-143). We believe that there is a God, and we believe God. We listen to his direction for our lives, and we obey him. In fact, the words *obey* and *listen* are closely related in the Latin language. To obey God is to follow in the example set for us by the saints" (page 19).

According to Fr. Mahan, the biblical definition of faith is "the realization of what is hoped for and evidence of things not seen" (Heb 11:1). While faith certainly evokes a supernatural experience, it also speaks to everyday occurrences. We have faith that our loved ones will be there for us. We have faith that the signals at intersections will function properly and not be the cause of traffic accidents. This kind of everyday faith in little things boosts our confidence that we can trust God in the big things.

- Faith is believing in Jesus Christ, whom God sent by sharing in his Spirit (cf. CCC, 151, 152).
- Faith is a gift from God, a virtue that gives us the ability to believe in him (cf. CCC, 153).
- Faith is "contrary neither to human freedom nor to human reason" (CCC, 154). Faith is above reason, but does not contradict it (CCC, 159).
- . Faith (in Jesus Christ) is necessary for salvation (cf. CCC, 161).
- Faith is a gift from God, but we can lose this precious gift. We must be dedicated to persevering in faith until the end. Faith is nourished by the study of God's Word, prayer, and the practice of charity (cf. CCC, 162).

The teachings of the Catholic Church are summarized in a creed. The word creed comes from the Latin word credere, which means "to believe." An early creed during the persecution of early Christians was the phrase "Jesus Christ, Son of God, Savior." Structured by the persons of the Trinity, the creed for Catholics expresses belief in God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. The synopsis of the content of the faith contained in a creed allows us to proclaim our faith in union with the whole Church and to pass that faith on to others.

Believing in God means that you can trust that God will see you through every difficulty, every problem, every circumstance in life. How have you experienced God reaching out to you? How did you experience the initial stirrings of his calling you to a deep, personal relationship?
