his voice, as he calls his own sheep by name and leads them out.

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Dear Parishioners, Parents and People of Good Will, Although we cannot join each other in public worship at this time, I have tried to convey a sermon each week through fathergreg.online (top of address bar), certain other suggestions through the same medium and through this newsletter some general information along with a different aspect or mini-sermon on the scripture readings for the particular Sunday at hand. I know parishioners have been appreciative of the above, although it is not the ideal for all of us. Nevertheless, it should not be too long before we get back to normality as we are thankfully getting closer to that time.



As the month of May is traditionally devoted to Mary, Pope Francis had this to say last Saturday: "Contemplating the face of Christ with the heart of Mary, our mother, will make us even

more united as a spiritual family and will help us overcome this time of trial......the restrictions of the pandemic have made us come to appreciate all the more this 'family aspect', also from a spiritual point of view. You can decide according to your own situations whether to pray individually or in groups.....it is easy also on the internet to find good models of prayers to follow." Pope Francis wrote two prayers to Mary that can be recited at the end of the Rosary, prayers he said he would be reciting "in spiritual union with all of you." Pope Francis' prayers also include specific intentions for those who are sick, for those who care for them, for scientists seeking cures

and vaccines and for government leaders who must find a way to protect their people. In the Gospel given for the Fourth Sunday of Easter, although the importance of a shepherd of a flock of sheep is mentioned, it is only in the next few lines in the scriptures that Jesus says emphatically: "I am the Good Shepherd." With this Sundays' gospel in mind and the latter



words particularly in mind, I would like to add the following as a mini-sermon for this weekend, even though I will be preaching a different one on this same theme on fathergreg.online.

In the early history of the Church, as depicted in the Fr. Greg

Acts of the Apostles, Paul and Barnabas are proven to be extraordinary shepherds of the sheep entrusted to them. They climbed hills and mountains all over Turkey in their first missionary journey together to spread the word of God and his Gospel of Good News. I thought I was a good long distance walker but I'm not a patch on these two men! They even got flogged almost to death a few times in their persistent and determined endeavours to be good shepherds to the flock entrusted to them spanning many countries. In the history of the church, we have no lack of role models who are similar to Paul and Barnabas. Many years ago I bought a book called 'Treasury of Women Saints.' This proved to me beyond doubt, the extraordinary lengths both men and women went to in order to listen to the voice of Jesus and be 'good and kind shepherds' to so many thousands over the years. I am starting this bulletin on the Feast of Catherine of Siena who lived during the 14th century and was a member of the Dominican Order. In her journeys around Europe, she was manifest in many spectacular conversions of very prominent people of her age. She was not afraid to inform at least two Popes during her lifetime to change some strategies in order to be better shepherds of their people. In the end, despite her criticisms Pope Urban VI invited her to Rome where she became a great source of inspiration and wisdom to him, at a most difficult political time for the papacy itself. Consequently, I urge others to read a life of the history of the Popes in order to fully appreciate the incredible difficulties many endured to fulfil their jobs successfully as the successors of Peter, and be (in most cases) very good chief shepherds of their people. There will always be exceptions to this rule as Christ himself intimated. As I have said, there are many fine examples of both men and women who have been good, if not great shepherds for their people, bringing them protection from evil and leading them to far greener **spiritual pastures.** Over the centuries, among these great shepherds have been Kings, Queens, Popes, Bishops, Priests, Brothers, lay people and I am sure many hundreds of women religious who have more than played their part to make both the Catholic Church and Christianity still a serious contender for good in our world.
