

The EPIPHANY of the LORD -Year A

When you have found him, bring me word, that I too may go and do him homage." After their audience with the king they set out. And behold, the star that they had seen at its rising preceded them, until it came and stopped over the place where the child was. They were overjoyed at seeing the star, and on entering the house they saw the child with Mary his mother. They prostrated themselves and did him homage. Dear Parishioners

After just starting work in the Taxation Department, I was invited as a 19-year-old young man to join a group of the old boys of our secondary college to come and discuss in 1967 the very recently completed

'Documents of the Vatican Council' each Thursday night. Although at the time the Vatican Documents were too intellectually deep for my teenage mind, over the years I have realised the incredible brilliance of those documents and what a gift they were to the Catholic Church at not only that time itself but still today. They were very progressive and gave the Church in the modern world a sure path to follow. Two of the better theologians of the Catholic Church at the time were two quite brilliant German theologians, one named Joseph Ratzinger and the other Karl Rahner. Joseph Ratzinger went



to eventually to become Pope Benedict XV1 and Karl Rahner was also invited specifically by Pope John XX111 to help as an expert theologian in the putting together of key documents, for the final voting of the bishops of the world, all gathered in Rome for 2 - 3 months a year over a four-year period from 1962 -1965.

Just before he died in 1984, Karl Rahner realised some shift in secular pressure on Catholics and Christians throughout our world. Accordingly, he made the statement that there would soon come a time when each of us would either be a mystic or a non-believer! What is implied in this statement at the beginning of this new year of 2023! At one level it means that anyone who wants to have faith today will need to be much more inner directed than in previous generations. Why? Because up to our present generation in the secularised world, by and large, the culture helped carry the faith. We lived in cultures within which faith and religion were part of the very fabric of life. Especially back two generations ago it took a strong, deviant action not to go to church on a Sunday. Today we know the opposite is truer.


Now a days, it takes a strong, inner anchored act to go to church of a weekend, whether you be Catholic, Orthodox Christian, Anglican, Uniting Church - whatever! One could easily say we have few supports for our faith, certainly not the media or even social media as we might call it, in its many diverse forms. Thus, as I see it and many others would no doubt see it, the culture no longer carries the faith and trust in religious institutions. Simply put, we knew how to be believers and church goers when we were inside communities that helped carry that for us, communities within which most everyone seemed to believe, most everyone went to church, and most everyone had the same set of moral values. Nowadays when there is a hump in the road if our faith is not strong then it is easier to go off track than stay on track. That is why as I see it when covid hit our Melbourne Archdiocese and it was time to come back to church, the 30% drop off of attendance in the average parish separated 'the men from the boys' as the old saying goes. Bluntly put those with lesser faith than the average church going person found it easier not to get



back into their former habit of going to Church. This is only my personal opinion and I am not saying it is for every one of those 30% throughout our Archdiocese who stopped going to Church – there would be several other categories such as age and sickness that has stopped people in their tracks not just fall off of their prayer life as I believe has happened in the former category. To be committed believers today, to have faith truly inform our lives, requires finding an inner anchor beyond the support and security we find in being part of a vast majority who at the very least are apathetic towards an institutionalised religion. Consequently, many of us now live in situations where to believe in God and church is to find ourselves without the support of those closest to us, spouse, partner, family, friends, colleagues. I am definitely sure they are the ones missing out but as another old saying goes: 'you can take a horse to water but you can't make it drink'. When all is said and done I can only give my own good example to others, mostly that example by the lifestyle I live, usually by actions but sometimes by words! I find it good to be proud to say what I believe if there is the sensible time to say it whether publicly or privately. Why should I or you be ashamed or being a follower of Jesus Christ, to have other practising Christians as my friends and to have such people as Saints whom I admire to not only give me an example of what qualities I would like to have in my life but also to be able to talk to them. After all we as Catholics believe, don't we, in 'the communion of saints'! I believe it more and more as I state in the Creed every Sunday.

In conclusion, following my earlier track Karl Rahner as one of the best Catholic theologians of the 20th century says we might need to be mystics otherwise we can easily fall down a hole and gradually become a non-believer. I think what Rahner was basically getting at some years ago possibly anticipating a change to a more accelerated secular culture is that if we as Christians to be effective now, and in the future we need a deep inner anchor that sustains us. Part of this anchor of course would be a certain time to pray during the week, the hearing at the very least of the Scriptures on a weekend and the ability to know the importance of receiving 'the eucharist'.
