

Dear Parishioners, Parents and People of Good Will,

Although we cannot join each other in public worship at this time, I have tried to convey a sermon each week through fathergreg.online (to be entered at the address bar). Nevertheless, it should not be too long before we get back to some sort of normality. On this traditional Mother's Day Weekend, I thought I would like to convey a few thoughts.

Mothers

This weekend we salute the women in our lives whose task and mission it was to bring us to human maturity. Some of us, even in old age, have an interior mother who still in some mysterious way – even from the grave, is nurturing this work within us!



Although I loved both my mother and father equally and also respected them equally, a different dynamic occurred when my mother looked like dying after a bad stroke. I had the good fortune to have my father die in my arms from either a very sudden heart attack or stroke (doctor was not sure) but I only cried for about 15 seconds! However, when I heard my mother was on death's door the tears ran down my face for quite a considerable time – as I said, probably a different dynamic exists and no one can fully explain it.

Part of the main dynamic of a mother is her love – many would describe it as unconditional love. I think one story I read several years back puts a nice touch on this unconditional love: it is the story of a girl who had some very beautiful dolls! When someone came to dinner at her house the little girl said to her guest: "Do you like dolls?" The guest said, "Of course sweetheart I love dolls." "Would you like to see mine?" "That would be wonderful," the guest said. The little girl led her guest to her room where she brought out all of her dolls. The guest asked: "Which doll is your favourite?" The little girl hesitated a moment, and then picked up a well-worn, tattered rag doll. It was missing a button eye, its seams had obviously been sewn up many times, its dress was faded and frayed. She hugged the doll close and showed it to her guest. "This is Annie. I love her most of all." The guest was surprised that, out of all the beautiful dolls she had, the little girl would pick this old, tattered rag doll. "Why do you love this one so much?" The little girl said, "Well, if I didn't love her, no one else would." Continued.....

This is what mothers do so well. They love all sorts of people, and they are supposed to, because God has very high expectations of them!



Maybe it is worth noting what St. John wrote in what is called the 'First Letter of John' in the New Testament. 'Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God, everyone who loves is born of God and knows God.'

Although it will be somewhat different this year, I hope it can still be a good **MOTHERS DAY for all this weekend**. I have always been looked after well by the many different women in my life. My good genetics were helped by my own mother looking after me well in my first year of life. Then, when my mother was sent to a specialized Cheltenham hospital for a year with TB, I ended up being looked after by the Josephite Sisters at Broadmeadows Babies Home. It did not do me any harm! Further on, the Josephite religious sister in Grade 3 at St. John's West Footscray was so beautiful in every way that it further increased my love and respect for women. As a young man before joining the priesthood just before my 24th birthday I went out with several women. I liked all of them but never fell in love! However, these good women and many ever since in several parishes have helped me to always think highly of women. I know some men have had some bad experiences with women, but I do not share their animosity, hatred or regrets. Accordingly, I consider myself a most blessed man and I, like many men I know hate to see women being disrespected, and like many men I also know that we abhor violence against women. Accordingly, to you mothers who in our Parish do such a great job, please accept the well wishes of the men of our Parish. We respect you and we appreciate you.
