children of God because they are the ones who will rise. That the dead will rise even Moses made known in the passage about the bush, when he called 'Lord' the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob; and he is not God of the dead, but of the living, for to him all are alive."

FR. GREG'S TRAVEL DIARY

Friday 4th October: Not always lucky at night time for meals, but last night had a beautiful two course meal in a family home recommended by booking.com at Saint Sever. Fortunately I decided to back-track a kilometre to see inside the Saint-Sever Abbey Church. It looked rather ordinary from the outside but was absolutely stunning on the inside. The Church was founded at the end of the 10th century and in 1998 listed as another Unesco World Heritage Site.

I had a 28 kilometre journey on my hands that day. Unfortunately, I was in some trouble booking-wise. I received a message that person at original boarding place needed to make an urgent trip away and I was left with another rearranged place in the very small, nearby town of Beyries. I got into the town of Beyries and did not have much of a clue where to go next. As a mother was about to head off in her car, after picking up her child from the bus stop, I made my move to ask for assistance. This wonderful lady, Marie- France tried to help me with this road I designated as 'chemin de la lande'. It was a road alright but there was only one house on it! The townspeople in Beyries scratched their heads on where I was meant to go but when I mentioned the name 'Marie- Carmen', then Marie-France said she not only knew her, but had her phone number in her contact list!! She rang her for me and as Marie-Carmen was still an hour from returning from her social work job, Marie-France offered to take me home to her place. Her husband arrived home 10 minutes later and was very kind and offered me a beer. We had some nice conversation as a result. They were just such a delightful couple with two children. Then Marie-France drove me to the place which was another kilometre or two on the outskirts of the village. I met so many angels like this on my 995 km pilgrimage walk - it was very humbling.

Saturday 5th October: This is a day I am not sure whether I should remember or forget! As it was going to be 35 kilometres to the very pretty medieval village of Sauveterre-de-Béarn, I made what I thought at the time was the wise decision to go only the 31km to Barraute-Camu the smallish village just before Sauveterre. Also, I felt as there were two tricky hills on the way, then Barraute is certainly far enough in one day. After about 13km there was a major town Orthex with a beautiful 13th century bridge to cross. Fortunately, as I was making good progress, I decided to have an early lunch and filled myself up with a wonderful big dish of duck salad. This may have proved to be a winning move, as there were two very tricky hills to climb over during that day. Unfortunately, 10 kilometres down the track there had been a great deal of rain and I was soon up to my ankles in mud as there were two small streams to cross. One descended down a steep hill then one had to force oneself up the hill on the other side, then one descended again and the same situation evolved. It was quite hard going to say the least. I was thankful when semi flat ground presented itself again. After 30 kms I was now approaching my intended destination of Barraute-Camu but ten minutes later found out that the crossing of a river called Le Gave d'Oloron on my map was no crossing at all! I now had to find a way of crossing this very steadily flowing river - 100 metres wide! As I studied the map further, the only way was to go another four kilometres up stream to the town I had not intended to go to in the first place, Sauveterre-de-Bearn! Here I am approaching dusk, walking the 35 kms I had not intended to walk, walking another kilometre over the bridge and town with a walk over the river of four kms then back along a semi-major road with glaring car traffic lights the last two kms and trying not to be killed as I walked beside a road one shouldn't be walking beside!

As I was two hours late to my accommodation, the couple hosting me had almost finished their meal, and when they asked if I had eaten, I was too embarrassed to say that I hadn't and said to them I would be alright if they gave me some butter. Continued.....

After a shower, I had this magnificent meal of a bread baguette I had in my backpack from day before. I found some jam inside the kitchen in the outhouse accommodation they had for guests. I was the only one there! I enjoyed my shower immensely and I really enjoyed that bread, butter and jam. It was like winning tattslotto! What a day though - doing 40kms instead of 30 - mud up to my ankles - no bridge over river as I discovered to my amazement - headlights glaring into your face.... All in all what I went to France for: surprise and adventure!! Still smiling. All the best to you all. Fr. Greg




ANNUAL MASS OF REMEMBRANCE 2019 WEDNESDAY 4TH DECEMBER AT 7.30PM

PASTORAL WORKER—St. Mary's, Williamstown Parish—PART-TIME

St. Mary's Williamstown would be an excellent choice for a person wanting to be an important part of an already dynamic Christian Community. Accordingly, we are seeking a suitably qualified person for this role commencing 1st February, 2020. This is a part-time position, two days per week, but also entails being present for a weekend Liturgy, with the requirement for additional hours during the Christmas, Easter and Confirmation periods. The normal 20 hours per week may be extended by mutual agreement. The successful applicant will work with the Parish Priest, and



with the administration staff of the parish, as well as liaising with the school staff, particularly the RE Coordinator. We want an applicant who believes in moving our parish along a 21st century model, keeping in mind the principles of Vatican II. The remuneration will be in accordance with a Pastoral Worker position but is dependant upon the qualifications of the applicant. The position involves:

- 1. **LITURGY**—Assisting with creative liturgy for the weekend masses, coordinating with the music ministry teams, providing the coordination of music at particular masses, providing the Prayers of the Faithful. Certain liturgies during the year would need to further the causes of asylum seekers, Aboriginal reconciliation and Christian marriage,.
- 2. GOVERNMENT/PRIVATE SCHOOL PROGRAM—Coordinating a program to be delivered by trained catechists for Reconciliation, Eucharist and Confirmation.
