From the shinning cloud the Father's voice is heard. This is my beloved Son, hear him.



Dear Parishioners and Visitors

For the over 100 now in our Parish who have picked up the "Remember" Lenten program material, I hope you find some gems either in the section on 'Artwork Spotlight,' 'Breaking Open the Word' or the last First Sunday of



Lent section from Mother Hilda Scott entitled 'Spiritual Direction.' Maybe it is just personal to me, but I found the latter section particularly enlightening when, in the wider context of 'Temptation' she said: "It seems to me that Jesus could say no because he had in fact already said "yes" to his father. One can never find a no when what we have said yes to still holds its integrity within our hearts....Why not make this a time (Lent) to go about saying yes to all the good things there are - to the commitments

in our lives. Then we will find it very easy to say no to that which will inevitably derail and destroy us....Ask yourself as you look back over your life: when have you said ves? What vesses still hold, and how have they grown?"

Maybe you enjoyed and found it more worthwhile reflecting on the 'Art Spotlight' wherein we were challenged to look more deeply at a painting in the Sistine Chapel by Sandro Botticelli (1445- 1510) entitled "The Temptations of Christ." In 'Breaking Open the Word' there may have been further gems as the writer explains how Jesus did not take the easier path but the better path in order that we might freely choose Him. The religious priest writer finished on a logical path (in regards to Jesus not just falling into the devil's temptation) by letting people see Him perform amazing stunts when stating: "He does not want our faith in him to be so dependent on spectacular miracles, dramatic displays of power and frequent signs. That sort of faith is shallow and weak, constantly in need of reassurance. Jesus wants us to have a faith that will stand firm through the good times, through difficult times and through ordinary moments in life."

Having moved on somewhat from last week, our Lenten material again delves into the "The Transfiguration" for the Second Sunday of Lent. The same three authors handle the same three sections under "Art Spotlight," "Breaking Open the Word" and "Spiritual Direction." As the weeks go by, you might find one of those writers appeals to your way of thinking and reflecting more than the others. I think it is sometimes better, even if it is briefly, to look at all three, as for instance the third author Mother Hilda appealed to me more than the others but partly because the others helped in some way to my appreciation of her last article on 'Spiritual Direction.' Anyway, I really hope you find some more gems this week. For those who do not have the material, I will again photocopy some extra copies which I will leave for you on the back tables.

Sr. Patricia is shifting to a new 'Josephite Order' religious house at Clayton in the next few weeks. You may remember Sr. Patricia took over as our Pastoral Associate in 2013 from Sr. Helen. Patricia spent many hours of work from 2013 - 2020 at the Williamstown hospital and visiting several homes to give communion to the sick as well as providing liturgy help at the weekend Masses, and looking after our



state/private school religious program. She has worked hard and generously and we wish to say a nice goodbye and good travels by conducting a morning tea in the Parish Centre immediately following the 8:30am Mass next Sunday, March 20th. All are welcome. Thank you, Sr. Patricia. Among our many priorities, Child Safety ranks highly. Accordingly, when it is safer to do so we will resurrect our Children's Liturgy of the Word (hopefully next term) and make sure things are in place to keep the children safe. For instance, under our risk management procedures, we require two adult supervisors in charge and if a child needs to go a short distance into the toilet areas of the Parish Centre, one of the adult supervisors needs to check that the facilities are vacant. We take the security of your children seriously and try to put the correct risk management processes in place.
