First letter of Peter 1.3-9


GOSPEL ACCLAMATION:

GOSPEL: JOHN 20.19-31

On the evening of that first day of the week, when the doors were locked, where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood in their midst and said to them, "Peace be with you." When he had said this, he showed them his hands and his side. The disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." And when he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained." Thomas, called Didymus, one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples said to him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, 'Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands and put my finger into the nailmarks and put my hand into his side, I will not believe." Now a week later his disciples were again inside and Thomas was with them. Jesus came, although the doors were locked, and stood in their midst and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and

see my hands, and bring your hand and put it into my side, and do not be unbelieving, but believe." Thomas answered and said to him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you come to believe because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed." Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples that are not written in this book. But these are written that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through this belief you may have life in his name.

EASTER SERMON: (not in person but with you in spirit - FG)

At primary or secondary school some of us would be classified as slow learners. This is how I saw myself, as a slow learner in many aspects of life, not only at school! Yet some of the slowest learners that were with me, particularly in secondary school, have



performed well above average in their managing of a family or in their work/ life balance.

It is both common sense and experience that we need in life rather than just raw intelligence, as some people, although they appear slow at first, finally as we say "get it." Doubting Thomas may have been in that category. Often he does not seem to know what Jesus is really talking about – "Lord we don't know where you are going, so how can we know the way!!"

Not only does Thomas not seem to know what Jesus is talking about, he seems at times to be in the wrong place at the wrong time. That is why he has become such an important figure for us -sometimes we don't get it either, and our faith might not have matured as much as others who have come from a greater faith family. However, in reality we may be focusing too much on our

weaknesses or Thomas' weaknesses. Yet when the bold and sometimes stubborn Thomas gets it, he really gets it. Legend has it that after Jesus had ascended to the father that Thomas went as far as India to preach the "Good News."

Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here; see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it into my side. Stop doubting and believe." Thomas said to him, "My Lord and my God!"


Many in India testify to that 'Thomas tradition' and their thankfulness to him for the passing on of the faith, especially in southern India.

Another prime example of Thomas 'getting it' is when Domitian was the Roman emperor, which was at the time John's gospel was written. When a Roman citizen greeted his emperor, Domitian personally he would have said in Latin: "Dominus et Deus" – "My Lord and my God!" Yet in the end when Jesus appears to Thomas after his resurrection from the dead, Thomas finally wakes up to himself and he gives to Jesus the same title: "My Lord and my God." Of course you and I can't place our hand in the side of Jesus, as Thomas did, and experience first-hand Jesus' resurrection from the dead. But we can place our trust in the testimony of the scripture. We can do even more. We can use God's gift of reason to confirm what the Scriptures tell us. We too, can then fall to our knees, as Thomas did, and say to Jesus: "My Lord and my God." Jesus in turn will say to us as he said to Thomas: "Have you believed because you have seen me? Happy are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe."
