

Dear Parishioners and Visitors

Welcome to all children receiving Eucharist this weekend and their

immediate families. As parents you are the main educators of your children in the ways of faith. We want to help but we cannot hold the hands of faith for them like you. You as parents are the ones who are challenged by the Church and by God, I believe to direct the children to know in particular the son of God, Jesus Christ. He is the one who is "the way, the truth and the life". No doubt, almost all children are open to faith, but the more you introduce them to prayer (talking to God as a friend), to reading the Scriptures especially the Gospels, and to Eucharist within the Christian



Community then you go along way to help them be other Christs in this world. "Go out to all the world and preach the Good News". It is 'Good News' and don't get disheartened or drop the ball yourself as children need you to hold their hand of faith, to point the finger in the right direction and know Christ will bring you his peace and peace to your family. He is "the light of the world" and darkness cannot overcome it.

Many of you will notice that I have dropped the 1st reading of this weekend's normal readings. It concerns a big fight in the early Church in which a minority wanted to force "circumcision" on all new believers. Ultimately St Paul, St Peter and the leader of the Christian Community in Jerusalem the apostle James won this fight to make sure "circumcision" was not a requirement of every new male Christian. There is a time and a place for me to explain every reading but this normal one of the Easter cycle of the 6th Sunday Year C was not one which I deemed advisable at a 1st Eucharist gathering nor for me to explain at such!! Hopefully it will not be a 1st Eucharist weekend when this reading comes around again in 3 years' time!

Next weekend I will be celebrating the Masses at the Parish of St Joseph's, Newport and Spotswood. Their Parish Priest Fr Binh Le will be celebrating the three Masses here next weekend. Although this is part of the mission strategy of the Archdiocese to form stronger relationships with the Parishes around every area, it has also been agreed to by our Parish Council that I occasionally swap pulpits with Fr Binh. No doubt greater connections with Newport and Spotswood will evolve over the years, but we are taking it in small steps at this stage.



Sometimes Saints are God's answer to crisis in the Church. Therefore It is worth noting in retrospect that one of the biggest canonisation ceremonies ever seen in Rome happened exactly 400 years ago in 1622. The 16th century was a time of great crisis. The Church in western Europe was torn asunder by mainly the Protestant Reformation. When Luther began the Protestant Reformation in 1517, there was no doubt that the Catholic Church was in great need of reform. The pressing question was whether that reform would be orthodox or not, unified or not, Catholic or not. The saints of 1622 saw

to it that reform was radical, authentic, and missionary. History gives us perspective. While the challenges the Church faces today are significant, it is not 1517. For the 16th century was an astonishingly dire time for the faith; the Church was divided. It was from that bleak world that Philip Neri, Francis Xavier, Ignatius of Loyola and Teresa of Avila were called and to that same world they were sent. Of the 5 canonised in St Peter's Square in 1622 those four were giants of the 16th century, champions of the Catholic Reformation. Reading or googling any of their stories will surely leave an impression of great admiration. Just this week Pope Francis canonised 10 new saints in St Peter's Square. I doubt whether they will have the same profile for the centuries to come but some of them like Charles de Foucauld or Titus Bransma were extraordinary human beings. Let us never forget they are constantly an example of how to live a better life but they are also people we can turn to in our hours of need.

For several years I have known an Ethiopian family in Williamstown. They are a family with 3 children who have been most of the time in a Housing Commission high rise. Unfortunately, the father has serious health issues. As I have known the family, he appealed to me for help to sponsor 'a special care visa' in order to bring out another Ethiopian family from Ethiopia: like Australian family with husband/wife and similarly 3 children. We discussed this at the 'Way of the West' and through our Parish Finance Committee and have agreed to give the \$2,740 needed for the assisted passage of this Ethiopian family who will now permanently support their invalid relation when they come to Australia in the near future. This has been agreed to by our Immigration Department. As this has only happened very recently, I was interested to hear from Kevin Meese, Diocesan Director of Catholic Mission that Cardinal Souraphiel, Archbishop of Addis Ababa is coming in June to seek support for his ministry and outreach to the people of Ethiopia: his work is the main feature of this year's Propagation to the Faith Appeal in this important year of the 200th anniversary of the founding of the Society. After initial contact, Kevin emailed me back on Tuesday: "Hello Greg, Thanks for the news, and congrats on your parish's involvement in the sponsorship of the Ethiopian relatives. I hope there may be some people able to get to Werribee to meet the Cardinal - I'm sure he'll be very happy to know of your involvement.....Kevin Meese Diocesan Director.

I am not sure whether I will be able to get to Werribee myself on June 1st or not as I have 9:15 am Mass but there is a 9:00 am Mass at St Andrew's Werribee Greaves Street North Werribee followed by a talk in the Penola Hub across the road (at back of St Andrew's school). I am informed that the Hall gathering will be around 9:45am. It would be nice for some parishioners to head down there to hear and meet the Cardinal.
