God mounts the throne to shouts of joy: a blare of trumpets for the Lord.


SECOND READING:

FEAST OF ASCENSION SERMON:

In the first reading given for this Feast of the Ascension, Luke informs us of an eyewitness account of the Ascension of Jesus back to Heaven. The following illustration of the life of Lech Walesa may go some way in helping us appreciate the meaning of this particular Feast of the Ascension on the Church's calendar.



Lech Walesa worked for years as an electrician in the Gdansk shipyards in Poland. During those years he and his fellow workers

founded the movement which became known as 'Solidarity'. Walesa became its leader. This brought them into conflict with the rulers of that former Communist country. Eventually the workers won out. The communist regime collapsed and democracy returned to Poland. Then, on December 9, 1990 something happened which a few years



prior to this would have been unthinkable. Walesa, the shipyard worker, was elected the first President of a free and democratic Poland! It was a great honour for Walesa. His fellow workers were delighted. They too felt honoured because of their association with him. However, there was sadness too! They knew that it would change forever the way they related to him. They knew that they were losing him. Nevertheless, they were hoping that he would not forget them and that he would help them from his new and more influential position.

In a similar scenario, during the years of his public life, Jesus ate and drank in the company of those he most mixed with during his daily life. In many ways he was just like one of them. Did the Ascension mean that he had left them and ended all his intimacy and familiarity with them? Yes, and No. Jesus would no longer be physically present to his disciple friends but he hadn't left them entirely.



He had simply taken on a new role, assuming a new position!

After many years of humble labour and dangerous struggle, Walesa achieved the great honour of being elected president of his country. After his years of struggle on earth,



Jesus was crowned with glory by his heavenly Father, and became Lord of all creation. For those who have faith, Jesus is closer to them than ever, and now even in a better position to help them.

The Gospel ends with Jesus' promise to remain with his disciples always, right to the end of time. The Ascension of Jesus is his liberation from all

restrictions of time and space. It does not represent his removal from the earth, but his constant presence everywhere on earth. During his earthly ministry he could only be in one place at a time. If he was in Jerusalem, he could not on Lake Galilee, if he was on Lake Galilee, he could not be in Jerusalem. The early Christians under the influence of the Holy Spirit understood that Jesus was still very much present with them and in them, even if not in the same way as before. They believed he still shared their lives, and that death would mean being united with him 'in glory' for ever and ever. In the meantime, he was relying on them (and now for us) to make sure that the Gospel would be preached and lived. This may take some courage on our part to be a witness to him and proudly inform others when questioned or queried: "Yes I am a Catholic Christian and proud to be one." Our courage and faith is helped by Him stating at the time and in the Gospel today: "I am with you always, until the very end of time."
