FR. GREG'S TRAVEL DIARY

No problems with dogs trying to attack me this week - only many bigger dogs barking at me as they protect farmers and little villages properties. Most days no food places available as one goes through many small hamlets or villages. However, the grapes, wild berries and figs are providing some good energy as I pass many farms, crops and vineyards during the normal 8 hours of actual walking. After 600km the steam train is still on its tracks but who knows what is around the corner as several people I pass are having serious problems with their legs or blisters. One lady I passed two days ago has decide to terminate her journey as she had 4 blisters on each foot - ouch!!

Thankfully I seemed to have made the right decision to stay two nights in important places along the route such as those with UNESCO heritage accreditations like Limoges last Monday:

Monday 16th September: As a former National Serviceman I found the "Museum of the Resistance" in Limoges a real tear jerker. When you read the stories of the head of the French resistance in the 2nd World War, Jean Moulin or the beautiful Violette Szabo and understand what they put up with in regards to German Gestapo interrogation you bow your head in humility for their courage.

The UNESCO heritage site of the Cathedral of St Etienne in Limoges shows a remarkable unity of Gothic style even though it was completed through 6 centuries -13th to 19th.

Also worth consideration in Limoges was the significant railway station called "Gare Des Benedictines" designed beautifully by architect Roger Gonthier and completed in 1929. It is often used in movies. In 1152, the region fell under English domination with the marriage of the extraordinary Eleanor of Aquitaine to Henry 11 of England. One of their son's Richard the Lionheart was enthroned in Limoges Cathedral, Saint Etienne some years later.

Tuesday 17th September: As it was a fairly hilly section for most of the day I left early at 7am as it was a week of 30 degree temperatures in the afternoon and all the walkers are finding the afternoon heat and hills a difficult combination. As my host at St Martin Le Vieux had limited English and my French was barely up to scratch I had to bring up all sorts of conversation pieces and it somehow got us through as I mentioned: Jean Moulin, Maurice Chevalier, Jean Val Jean, Klaus Barbie, Gerard Depardieu, etc. Very rural property out the back of nowhere.

Wednesday 18th September: Another bigger day at 37kms to accommodation. As another hilly day I at first walked like a man possessed, a man on steroids(!), a man on a mission (from God!) But by end of day I was not so perky as needed to walk into semi darkness at end of day as had two hour problem in middle of the day. I had the problem of needing to top up my internet/wifi European SIM card. In semi big town I walked around for 2 hours trying to get the French people to understand that I needed to top up card but most of them through my poorish French kept thinking I was wanting my mobile phone recharged! In the end I was sent to the Post Office but finally only the young bar lady (born in England) helped me to continue my proper communication connections.

Thursday 19th September: I had real trouble finding my next accommodation at Thiviers. One man informed me place was 3rd turn on left but as it turned out to be the 2nd turn on left in a hidden side of town I ended up going nearly 8 kilometres out of my way!! At least family were very nice although the only person really knowing their address was at Tourist bureau. ...continued

Friday 20th September: After 2 kilometres came across group of 3 grandmothers who have been doing for the last 7 years a part of this famous Vézelay route. They do a week at a time to eventually try to get to Compostella in Spain. Miriam was very easy to converse with as she is Irish background married to a Frenchman. I left them after an hour as they stopped for a break. In the end I was in "truffle territory" as Sorges is the centre of the Truffle. For an extra 3 euro I could get in the evening "a truffle desert". It was well worth it - absolutely magnificent.

Saturday 21st September: I set out for one of my favourite locations: Perigueux. On the road I stopped at a spot half way during the day: Peter, Arthur and Jean. Peter: a German 23 year old who spoke very good English and told me his new employee (1st job after doing 4/5 years mechanical engineering degree) has allowed him nearly two months to walk from Vézelay into Spain before finally starting this job with very good company. Arthur: 23 year old - very impressed by his 3 French Priests in his Dijon area and finishing his 5th year engineering degree and in Catholic youth group. Jean: a Belgium with now a leg problem and as a man in his 60's I don't like his chances of finishing many more days. Many are like him with the best of intentions but end up with physical problems usually of the lower leg or bad blisters. These 3 like me had never met before but somehow decided to walk together over a day or two.


I arrived in Perigueux and lady host told me she has just retired as Catholic secondary teacher in Perigueux.

Much could be said about Perigueux but maybe next week. The place was really jumping when I arrived there on the Saturday night: decorations in streets, music and people everywhere. The 17 members of the choir singing beautiful French songs in the Cathedral at 11am Mass on Sunday 22nd September were just dynamic. From their first song they brought tears to my eyes. The women were mostly very dark with African background and the two men drummers kept perfect timing. As I said "tears in the eyes stuff" simply beautiful!
