

Dear Parishioners and Visitors

It is not always easy to respond to the Spirit of God. Often it means one has to go in a direction which is not entirely comfortable or where others may misunderstand our true motives. Indeed, there will always be those who are over critical and if we worry too much about "the peanut gallery" or clowns of this world as some would call them, then we would all stay frozen in time. In our ancient religious past, Jeremiah certainly knew that as we hear about him today. Yet as strong and determined as he was, he still needed to be encouraged to keep going on the right track as God had called him to be a beacon of light amongst a sinful people. He persists and persists even though more than rotten apples are thrown at him in his pursuit of his own inner voice. In the Gospel, Jesus follows that same inner voice that even means his own townspeople turn against him! More than rotten tomatoes are thrown his way.

I always find there is something inside you, whether you want to label it as an inner voice, conscience, God or the promptings of the Holy Spirit, and some may label it is as love of neighbour - it is still something we all hear in our own prayer or reflective time in one form or another. This means we will go down tracks that are different to other people but still hopefully define us as a follower of Jesus Christ as that is the tradition we, who come to St. Mary's Church follow or believe in. We have come to understand that Jesus is our friend and the "Holy Spirit" will lead us in truth. My own track would be quite different to other people as I at this time feel that call in various directions. On one hand I feel the call to try with many others such as our St. Mary's Parish Council to run a vibrant parish but on the other hand I also am not confined by that as the Spirit also calls me (and you) to walk down other roads with a variety of different people and organisations. Outside of some easier irons of my irons in the fire, my non-parish challenge is as Chairperson for the last four years of the Australian Catholic Clergy Remuneration Assistance Fund (ACCRAF). This smallish committee tries to raise money from priests or priests' funds in other dioceses to help priests in a diocese like Broome have an adequate stipend to live on. This has proven a very difficult challenge with covid as priests' funds have far less surplus money, especially our New South Wales dioceses which have taken a battering, and usually have been our best supporters.



Anyway, we all plug away within our own challenging circumstances with the help of the Spirit and can always be mindful of our recent second scriptural reading two weeks ago: "There is a variety of gifts but always the same Spirit; there are all sorts of service to be done, but always to the same Lord; working in all sorts

of different ways in different people, it is the same God who is working in all of them. The particular way in which the Spirit is given to each person is for a good purpose.....all these are the work of one and the same Spirit, who distributes different gifts to different people just as he chooses." (1st Letter of St. Paul to the Corinthians ch. 12).

Outside the Catholic or Christian Churches, the same Spirit of God cannot be confined and works in others for a good purpose. A brilliant example of this and a true example of our 2nd reading ("..and the greatest of these is love") is the work of



Dr. Daniel Nour as "2022 Young Australian of the Year." What a mature young man of 28 years of age and such incredible compassion. At just 26 years of age, and despite working full time as a young doctor at Royal North Shore Hospital, he launched a medical service for the homeless called "Street Side Medics." Now with 145 volunteers and four mobile clinics across NSW, the service provides medical assistance to those experiencing homelessness. The service is completely free and doesn't require a **Medicare card.** Dr. Nour remains founding director of "Street Side Medics," and volunteers his afternoons to make sure everything continues to run smoothly. "One state (NSW) is simply not enough. To anyone that can help, I urge you to reach out and together let's change healthcare for those most vulnerable, our brothers and sisters experiencing homelessness." Dr. Nour's calling is not my calling and probably not your calling but the Spirit keeps moving in so many different people in so many different ways, so that others are loved. St. Paul states all of this in perspective in our 2nd reading when he states: "In short, there are three things that last; faith, hope and love; and the greatest of these is love." I hope as I write this that the Ukraine situation has not turned pear shaped. I know the Pope dedicated "Australia Day" or known just as January 26th to our wider world audience as "a day of peace praying for Ukraine." Likewise, the Tonga situation is very catastrophic. Accordingly, I remind everyone that if you can help financially through our aid agency Catholic Caritas, an online donation can be easily completed by connecting to the Catholic Caritas website. Every \$50 donation makes a difference!
