

Dear Parishioners and Visitors,

Fittingly as we know the coldness now of winter, there will take place this weekend the 'St Vincent de Paul 'winter appeal'- towards the end of Mass.

Sometimes in life one needs to take some time out and hopefully through that rest and refreshing period be better equipped in the long run for the people we wish to serve. Consequently, last April 2018 I applied to the previous Archbishop for 'Sabbatical Leave' to hopefully take place much of the last half of the 2019 year. Fortunately for myself, I have been permitted 'Sabbatical Leave' from August 19th 2019 onwards, and since this is combined with one's normal annual holidays I intend to be back on deck Saturday November 30th.

On the 42nd anniversary of priesthood I will arrive in Cork, Ireland August 20th (Feast of St Bernard). I will then enjoy a 'Murphy's stout as this down south is Murphy territory and not 'the Guinness' territory of Dublin and other more northern parts! One has to be diplomatic and as they say 'when in Rome do what the Romans do'. The Catholic side of the family moved from Cork to Australia about 1850 during the 'potato famine' in Ireland. One of them from 'the Drake family' was my great great grandmother. I will be the first 'Drake/Trythall' member to go back "home". Then 5 days later I will fly over to England to stay 3 days in Penzance in Cornwall. The 'Trythall village' used to be 5-10 kilometres away and all that seems to exist these days is what is known as the "Trythall School" – a small alternative primary school of 69 children. As far as I know I will be the first Trythall to go back there since my great great Grandfather left there in 1836 as a tin miner to go tin mining in South Australia. All my father's background stock in Cornwall are protestants, mainly Methodists and Church of Christ. It may be a shock to some if they come across not only a Catholic priest but the last of the Trythall's from Australia spanning 183 years. "Trythall" was looking ok until I became a priest!

The main part of the sabbatical that I very much looking forward to will be taken up with a 1000 kilometre walk from Vezelay(just north of the centre of France) down to the Spanish border to St Jean Pied de Port (people often walk 750 kilometres from there to the famous Santiago de Compostella – but not me!) I like to travel (walk) along the prettiest routes and still quite famous pilgrimage tracks from Vezelay or Le Puy en Velay. I did the 750 kilometres in my first year here in Williamstown in 2010 plus an extra 50 walking out of my way by missing certain signs!

My starting point - Vezelay has a great history in France. It is where St Bernard preached the 2nd crusade to the Holy Land. It is where King Richard the Lionheart of England and the French King, Phillip 11 met there to go on to the 3rd crusade to the Holy Land. From Vezelay onwards there are several Unesco World Heritage Sites and I will pass at least 5 of them as I start off on my adventure from Vezelay, 1000 kilometre to the Spanish Border to the French town of Le Puy en Velay.

After the long walk I will go by train to Bordeaux for 3 days, then by train to Toulouse for 2 days, then by train to Avignon. I will be staying 4 days in the famous Avignon where 7 Popes resided for a period of 67 years as it was not physically safe to stay in Rome at the time. I will stay in Montmartre for 3 days in Paris and then go straight from there to meet my priest friends in Byron Bay for my and their annual holidays. I anticipate being very fresh and glad to come back to work in St Mary's Parish at the end of all this. There will be one retired priest who will fill in for me at weekend Masses for just over a third of my time away, the Columban priests for another third of the time and another three Sundays the seminary staff from Corpus Christi will supply for me.

Although limited in number there are still some of "the Swag" left for the taking, reading and reflecting.

Talking about time to reflect! Surely the Victorian assisted dying legislation commentary by the Victorian Catholic bishops is worth reflecting upon some more. There are still some copies on the back tables. I know my mother had a bad stroke and it was only a year later that she died. However, that in many ways was graced filled, helped me to have a wider understanding and the spiritual journey to the end was priceless in hindsight. No one likes taking your own mother to the bathroom on Christmas day or knowing there is a very difficult last month for your loved one! However, the journey is usually not done without support such as by some incredible doctors, nursing, palliative care staff out there. They are worth their weight in gold. Personally I believe I became a better human being through the process and the chance 'to give back' some love was more than a privilege. I would go through it again even though it pained me somewhat at times. People need to know that they are valued right to the end. I can understand some people thinking differently but I would disagree with them for several reasons that are not always easy to convey on paper. Every situation is different and we don't need to always prolong life to an unnatural degree but good palliative care helps them to die at the 'right time'. Let us please not shorten life to the 'wrong time' and dismiss the importance of continued loving care even to the end. Life is sacred -all the way. Fr Greg 28/6/2019
