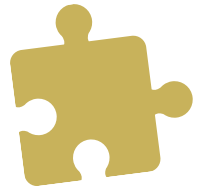

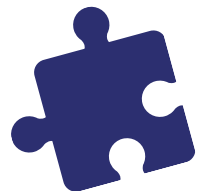

What Reentry Does?

Introduction

We'll meet with you within **72 hours** of arrival to identify what needs to be done while you await trial.

Referrals/Resources

- Will work with Probation, CPCS, and Drug/Mental Health Court
- Connect to community partners
- Apply to sober homes, TSS/CSS, and Long-Term Treatment Programs

What Reentry Does?

Introduction

We'll meet with you within **72 hours** of arrival, to identify needs to work on while incarcerated.

Will also meet with you **60-90** days before release to discuss your reentry plan.

- Complete necessary assignments
- Apply to sober homes and long-term treatment programs
- Connect to community partners

What is needed in order to apply for treatment/housing?

- Completion of a biopsychosocial
 - TB, recent physical, and medication list request
 - Separate program specific application
 - Description and understanding of case/charges
 - Some programs require an updated CORI
 - Referral sent from Reentry

Different types of treatment/housing

Sober Home

- Sober living offers a social-model peer-led community
- Catered to people who have completed an inpatient treatment program or are attending outpatient therapy
- They follow the National Association of Recovery Residences (NARR) standards
- Offers flexibility allowing an individual to choose the right environment for them
- Typically privately owned, requiring individuals to pay weekly or monthly
- Individuals self regulate their own recovery/reentry process

Halfway House

- Uses the terms Halfway House, LTRP, Recovery Home, 3/4 House, and Co-Occurring interchangeably
- Halfway houses serve as transitional living for those coming from institutions (Correctional or Inpatient)
- They tend to be state funded, paid through insurance
- Provides a structured environment with limited flexibility or independence
- Substance use recovery may not be the primary focus as some of these homes are more focused on reentry
- Typically, individuals are court mandated or parole approved

Different types of treatment/housing continued

Acute Treatment Services (ATS)

- ATS programs are commonly referred to as inpatient detoxification programs
- These programs operate in free standing and hospital-based settings
- Medically treats withdrawal symptoms in persons who are dependent upon alcohol and/or other drugs

Transitional Supportive Services (TSS)

- 24-hour short-term residential treatment up to 30 days
- Services are provided to primarily bridge the gap between ATS/CSS or incarceration and residential rehabilitation
- Programs provide intensive case management in order to prepare clients for long-term residential care
- Also, known as a “holding” after incarceration

Clinical Stabilization Services (CSS)

- 24-hour treatment, usually after ATS for 10-14 days
- Range of services including nursing, intensive education and counseling, relapse prevention and aftercare planning
- Linkage to aftercare, relapse prevention services, and self-help groups, such as AA and NA, are integrated into treatment and discharge planning
- Clients are accepted from settings including detoxification programs, residential programs, outpatient, as well as self-referral

Structured Outpatient Addiction Program (SOAP)

- Provides treatment for addiction or co-occurring mental health disorders
- Operates 5 days a week for the length of 6-8 weeks.
- Some offer rooming solutions

Financial Assistance/Employment	Provide financial education, budgeting assistance, employment referrals, and resources for vocational/educational training	Reentry
Transportation	Connecting to community programs that can provide transportation vouchers	Reentry
MAT/MOUD	Referral to another department	Medical
Inside Job Assignments	Job assignments are primarily for facility management and operational efficiency, not for reentry preparation	Classification
Unit moves	Referral to another department	Classification
Extra Clothing/Pillows/Blankets	Referral to another department	Considered Contraband
