CHAPTER I

Detective Mindset

Be a super detective: Learn how to use your eyes and ears to notice important things and solve mysteries. Think like a detective: Use your clever brain to solve puzzles and find hidden clues.



Activity I: Super Detective Eyes

Materials needed: none

Instructions: Find a quiet place and close your eyes. Open your eyes and look around the room. Try to find as many interesting things as you can. Look high, low, and all around. Count how many things you noticed and see if you can remember all of them. Challenge yourself to find even more things in the room and repeat the activity.

Activity 2: Mystery Picture Puzzle

Materials needed: paper, colouring pencils or crayons Instructions: Draw a simple picture with various objects or characters on a piece of paper. Colour the picture using different colours. Give the coloured picture to a friend or family member. Ask them to close their eyes while you make one small change to the picture. Show them the picture again and ask them to spot the change. Switch roles and let your friend make a change for you to find.







Activity 3: Observation Game

Materials needed: small objects or toys Instructions: Place several small objects or toys on a tray or table. Ask a friend or family member to look at the objects

for about one minute. Cover the objects with a cloth or a towel. Ask your friend to write down or tell you as many objects as they remember. Remove the cloth and check how many objects they remembered correctly. Switch roles and let your friend challenge you to remember the objects.

Activity 4: Drawing Challenge

Materials needed: paper, colouring pencils *Instructions:* Choose a simple object or animal to draw, like a dog or a flower. Close your eyes and imagine the object in your mind. Open your eyes and try to draw the object from memory without looking at any references. Once you've finished your drawing, compare it to a picture of the object. Celebrate your detective efforts and try drawing more objects from memory.

Activity 5: Detective Storytelling

Materials needed: none

Instructions: Use your imagination to create a detective story with a mystery to solve. Think of a character who is a detective (it can be you!) and a problem they need to solve. Tell the story to your friends, family, or toys, making it as exciting and mysterious as possible. Get creative and think of clues, suspects, and a solution to the mystery.

CHAPTER 2

Finding Clues

Detective Gadgets

Discover cool gadgets like a magnifying glass and torch that help you find hidden clues.



Look for Evidence

Learn about footprints, fingerprints, and other exciting things that can help solve mysteries.



Talking to Witnesses

Find out how to ask questions and get information from people who saw something important.



Detective Gadgets

Magnifying Glass: Imagine having a magic glass that makes things look bigger and helps you see tiny details that your eyes might miss. A magnifying glass is like a superhero's tool for detectives. It zooms in on clues, just like a detective's special eyes!

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Torch: A torch is like a mini-sun that fits in your hand. It's perfect for exploring dark and mysterious places. With a torch, you can shine a bright light on hidden secrets and chase away the shadows, just like brave detectives do!



Binoculars: Binoculars are like amazing eyes that can see far, far away. When you look through them, everything gets closer, and you can spot things that are hiding in the distance. It's like having super eyesight, perfect for spotting clues that are far away!



Notebook and Pen: A notebook is like your secret memory bank. You can write down all the important clues and observations you find during your detective adventure.



Compass: A compass is like a tiny navigator that always knows which way is north. It helps you stay on the right path and not get lost during your mission. With a compass, you'll always know which direction to go to find those hidden clues!



Detective Badge: A detective badge is like a shiny medal that shows everyone you are a real detective. It's a symbol of your bravery and detective skills. When you wear it, you feel like a hero ready to solve any mystery that comes your way!



Look for Evidence



Every person has unique footprints. They are never exactly the same!

Did you know that we can also make footprints in the sand at the beach? It's like leaving a special mark wherever we walk!





Footprints can tell us about the size and weight of a creature. The bigger the footprint, the larger the animal might be!

Activity: Footprint Gallery

Materials needed:

large sheets of paper or cardboard, washable paint or finger paints in various colours, paintbrushes (optional), wet wipes or a basin of soapy water for easy clean-up

Instructions:

- Lay out the large sheets of paper or cardboard on the floor or a flat surface. This will be your 'gallery' space.
- Dip your foot (or shoe) into the washable paint. You can use one colour or multiple colours for a more vibrant effect.
- Now, carefully step onto the paper or cardboard to create your footprint art. You can experiment with different angles and positions to make it more fun!
- If you wish, you can use paintbrushes or fingers to add additional details to your footprints, like turning them into animals, flowers, or any imaginative creatures you come up with.
- Once the prints are complete, let them dry for a while.
- Celebrate the creative footprints! Hang the artwork on the wall or display it around the house to showcase your unique creations.

Look for Evidence



Our fingerprints are so special that even identical twins have different fingerprints!

Fingerprinting is used by detectives and police to solve mysteries and catch the criminals. It's like having our own detective superpower!





Our fingerprints stay the same throughout our entire lives. Isn't that amazing?

Activity: Fingerprint Friends

Materials needed:

white paper, washable ink pads or non-toxic finger paint in various colours, markers or coloured pencils (optional), wet wipes or a basin of soapy water for easy clean-up

Instructions:

- Gently press your index finger onto one of the ink pads or dip your finger into the paint.
- Press your finger on the paper several times, creating little colourful circles all over the page. You can experiment with different colours and patterns.
- Once you have a collection of fingerprints, turn those fingerprints into fun characters or creatures. You can use markers or coloured pencils to add eyes, mouths, arms, legs, and any other details you like to bring the fingerprint friends to life.
- When you are finished, let your artwork dry for a while.
- Celebrate their fingerprint friends! Display the artwork on the fridge or create a mini fingerprint art gallery to show off their imaginative creations.



Talking to Witnesses

Talking to witnesses helps us find out important information in various situations. Whether it's finding a lost toy, understanding what happened in a game, or resolving a disagreement. It's an important skill that helps us learn and make the world a better place.

What is a Witness?

A witness is someone who saw or experienced something important. They can provide information about an event or situation.

Why Talk to Witnesses?

Talking to witnesses is essential because they can help us understand what happened in a situation. Their information can be like pieces of a puzzle that help us solve mysteries or find out the truth about something.

Being Polite and Patient

When talking to witnesses, it's essential to be polite and patient. We should ask questions kindly and wait for them to share their story in their own time.

Listening Carefully



Listening is crucial when talking to witnesses. We need to pay attention to what they say so we can understand the whole story. Take notes or record the interview on your mobile phone or other voice recorder.

Ask Open-ended Questions

Open-ended questions are questions that can't be answered with just 'yes' or 'no'. They help us get more information from witnesses. For example, instead of asking, "Did you see anything?" we can ask, "What did you see?"

Everyone's Point of View Matters

Imagine if we all looked at the same picture, but each of us saw something different. That's what happens when we talk to witnesses! They saw the same event, but from their own special angle. And guess what? All the things they tell us are like puzzle pieces. Putting them together helps us see the whole picture and understand what really happened. So, everyone's perspective is important and helps us figure out the truth!

No Making Things Up

It's important to tell the truth when we are witnesses too. Making things up or guessing can lead to confusion and might not help solve the problem.

Thanking Witnesses

After talking to witnesses, it's nice to say thank you. They are helping us, and showing gratitude is a good way to be kind.

Use your mobile phone to record the conversation.

Secret Codes

Secret codes use special symbols, numbers, or letters to hide secret messages. But don't worry, you can crack them with your super detective skills! Look for patterns, swap letters, or use a secret decoder to reveal the hidden message. So, let's try some code games below:






MORSE CODE

Morse code is like a secret language made up of dots (short beeps) and dashes (long beeps). It was invented by a clever man named Samuel Morse a long time ago. People used it to send messages using telegraphs and later, radios.

For example, the letter 'A' is represented by a short beep followed by a long beep, like this: 'dot dash'. And the letter 'B' is 'dash dot dot'. Each letter and number has its special code!

Imagine sending coded messages to your friends! You can even use flashlights to send Morse code signals in the dark. How cool is that?

So, if you want to have some secret fun, learn Morse code below, and start sending mysterious messages to your friends or family. It's like having your own secret code. Have fun!



CHAPTER 4

Detective Teamwork

When we work as a team, it means we are like a special group of friends joining forces.



Each of us has different skills that make us unique and special. Imagine having to crack tricky codes, find lost treasures, or follow mysterious clues - all of this becomes easier when we work together! Teamwork also means we talk and listen to each other, share ideas, and support one another.



Activity: Team Building Obstacle Course

Materials needed:

Open space (indoor or outdoor), any objects to create obstacles (chair, box, pillow, etc.), blindfolds (optional)

Instructions:

- Set up an obstacle course using the objects available to you. Place them in a line or random pattern to create challenges for you and your friends to navigate through.
- Divide the friends into teams of 2 or 3, depending on the number of players.
- Each team takes turns guiding their blindfolded teammate(s) through the obstacle course. The blindfolded player(s) must listen carefully to the instructions from their team members to safely navigate the obstacles.
- After each turn, rotate roles, so every child gets a chance to be blindfolded and guided through the course.
- Make sure the teams work together, communicate effectively, and support their blindfolded teammate(s) during the game.
- You can also add variations to the game, like setting a time limit for completing the course or making the obstacle course more challenging as the game progresses.
