Restorative Circles encompasses 3 main ideas of restorative justice; to repair, encounter, and transform by involving everyone that was most harmed by the criminal activity. In the Circle process, participants discuss the circumstances and impacts that the offense has had on the community, offender and victim. Parties try to come to a complete census as to the best way to resolve the conflicts that have been created because of the crime, leading to transformations of the offender and victim.

Target population:

Restorative Circles provides a diversion opportunity to mostly first-time offenders who accept responsibility for their actions. They are available to youths aged 11-17. Referrals will come from schools, law enforcement, SROs and Juvenile Court Counselors. Juvenile Justice referrals will take priority.

Program goals & direction:

- Provide an alternative to juvenile court
- Keep youth out of the system & clean records
- Promote accountability & responsibility
- Reduce subsequent delinquent behavior
- Facilitates peer mentoring
- Provides necessary guidance & structure
- Allows victims, offenders, & volunteers to understand restorative justice
