

Sisson Marshall. A daughter unravels the mystery behind her WWII Veteran Father's acquisition of Heinrich Himmler's personally annotated copy of Mein Kampf.

Nazi leader Heinrich Himmler, head of the SS and Gestapo and




the architect and administrator of the concentration camps during World War II, oversaw the systematic murder of more than ten million Jews and other innocent people. The story of what happened to Himmler's personal copy of Adolf Hitler's Mein Kampf, the book that had inspired him, and the journey of the soldier who brought it home from war-torn Europe is now told for the first time. Based on her father's narrative of his experiences as a second World War infantry rifle platoon leader, his daughter traces his battalion's footsteps from D-Day to VE Day in this tribute to the 4th Infantry Division's 22nd Infantry Regiment during the war. 

outnumbered, the American soldiers repelled attack after attack and eventually forced the enemy to withdraw after suffering terrible losses. This book describes the buildup of Burt and the long night of deadly action, as seen through the eyes of three fictional young soldiers who lives are forever changed by that battle. The events are real; only the characters are imagined. Experience the vulnerability, the fear, and the everyday heroism of American soldiers just trying to survive an unrelenting ground attack. Many of you will remember the "4ID Update from Iraq" that Bob Babcock sent out daily during Operation Iraqi Freedom 1 in 2003-2004, and in the next three deployments. Rather than let that piece of 4ID history disappear, Bob has converted the updates from 2003-2004 into



four books that will become family heirlooms for those who lived through that year, either at home or on the battlefield.

Book 1, covering the alert in January, 2003, the delay from deploying through Turkey, finally arriving in Iraq in April, establishing 4ID and 1-22 in Saddam's hometown, bad mail service, and other challenges through July will be available in December, with the other three books covering the remaining months of OIF1, including the capture of Saddam Hussein, coming out in early 2025.

Steven J. Hubert

Steven James Hubert was born in

Raymond, Kandiyohi County, Minnesota on May 15, 1947, the son of Howard and Marian Hubert. He graduated from Lamberton High School in 1965. In 1967 he graduated from Minneapolis Vocational Auto Mechanics School.



Steve was drafted into the Army on November 14, 1967. He was single and his religion was indicated as Methodist. He took Basic Training at Fort Lewis, Washington, and graduated from the NCO Academy at Fort Benning, Georgia.

He deployed to Vietnam as a Sergeant E-5 with an Infantry MOS of 11B40 on October 7, 1968 and was assigned to Company D 1st Battalion 22nd Infantry 4th Infantry Division. He served in Vietnam Counteroffensive Phase V, Vietnam Counteroffensive Phase VI, and Tet 69/Counteroffensive.

Steven Hubert was killed in action on April 5, 1969 in Kontum Province, Military Region II. He and his Company were on Operation Wayne Grey, and Steve was killed during an assault on NVA positions near LZ Cider in the Plei Trap Valley, at grid reference YA811797, approximately 27 kilometers north of Plei Djereng airfield. He was one of eight men in Company D killed during the fight.

Steve was awarded the Bronze Star Medal with V device for his actions that day, in Headquarters 4th Infantry Division General Orders #1609 dated 10 May 1969. His citation read:

"For heroism in connection with military operations against an armed hostile force in the Republic of Vietnam. Sergeant Hubert distinguished himself while serving as a squad leader with Company D 1st Battalion 22nd Infantry 4th Infantry Division. On 5 April 1969, Sergeant Hubert's company was involved in counter-insurgency operations west of Kontum City when they suddenly came under attack by an unknown enemy force employing B-40 rocket, mortar and small arms fire. Sergeant Hubert immediately deployed his squad to positions from which they could more effectively engage the enemy. Then, seeing an enemy machine gun position, he maneuvered toward it with the intent of destroying it. While moving toward his objective, he was mortally wounded by sniper fire. His personal heroism, initiative and exemplary devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the

military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit and the United States Army."


He was also awarded the Military Merit Medal and Gallantry Cross with blackened palm by the Government of the Republic of Vietnam.

Steven J. Hubert is buried in Lamberton Cemetery, Lamberton, Redwood County, Minnesota. His name is engraved on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C. on Panel W27 Line 18.

Reunion, Spring 2026 Oklahoma City

Liberation of Moyon

Here is the after action report concerning the festivities of the 80th anniversary for the 22nd Infantry in France. We went from July 31st to August 4th to Château Lingeod in the south of the Manche department. We have reconstituted an S-3 command post, a troop room, a reporter post. During the stay we organized various ceremonies in various places such as the American cemetery of St James where we laid roses in memory of soldiers of the 22nd. We also went back to Maupertus at the airport for a wreath at our monument inaugurated last year. A conference was held in Moyon on the history of the 22nd's fighting in this sector during Operation Cobra. Finally, a historical tour was made for the family of Isaac Curtis **Philipps** who honored us with their presence

during this stay. We also reconstructed the German counter-attack within the S-3 with radio call, patrol dispatch, map notes, etc. On Saturday 3rd we inaugurated our 5th commemorative plaque in tribute to the 22nd Infantry.



This morning was the last event as part of the 80th Anniversary of the liberation of Moyon The Association 22nd Infantry Regiment France, chaired by **Loïc Parent**, had exhibited various military objects and **Julien Woestyn** presented the course of the 22nd Infantry Regiment from June 6 until the arrival in Moyon. A passionate narrative punctuated with videos and documents. Some

names from the long list of American soldiers who died in Moyon have been released.



The presentation was made in the presence of about fifty people, including John Tomawsky, grandson of Ernest Lavoie, killed in Moyon on July 29, 1944, and Mrs. Curtis, daughter of Isaac Curtis Philips, who fought in Moyon. Descendants of Guillaume de Moyon were also present, invited by Jean-François Pignet, president of the Association Guillaume De Moyon and specialist of the history of Moyon.



After the lecture, a coat of arms was dropped by John Tomawsky and Mrs.

Curtis at the plaque of the Regiment near the

Church, then the group went to the restaurant Carrefour Paris, where Jean-François Pignet offered everyone a commemorative poster. Thanks to everyone who contributed to the success of this birthday.


Tough Ruck 2025
