



National Museum of the Vietnam War, Mineral Wells, TX

On June 25, 2022, I had the honor of being the keynote speaker at the dedication of THE NATIONAL MUSEUM OF THE VIET NAM WAR in Mineral Wells, Texas. Also in attendance was a wonderful friend, **Jim Nelson**, who served in my infantry unit C 2/22, 25<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division. Jim was there because his epic painting of the Battle of Soi Cut [FSB Burt] is featured prominently in the Museum.

#### **Operation Sam Houston**

Operation Sam Houston began in the Central Highlands of the Republic of Vietnam on January 1, 1967, continued until April 5, 1967, and was carried out by the 2<sup>nd</sup> Brigade of the 4<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division. Though many elements of the Division were involved, this article will focus on significant activities of 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion 22<sup>nd</sup> Infantry during that operation.

The sign says "Our Business is Fighting" Units of 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion 22<sup>nd</sup> Infantry that took part in the Operation were Headquarters Company and three rifle Companies: Company A, Company B, and Company C. While 1/22 Infantry was engaging in several fights with elements of the North Vietnamese Army, at the same time, other Battalions in 2<sup>nd</sup> Brigade were also battling with that enemy Army in nearby areas as well.

Intelligence indicated enemy forces had crossed into South Vietnam from Cambodia and were staging in an area west of the Nam Sathay River. Operation Sam Houston really got going in mid-February, when the Division crossed the river, established a number of firebases, and began actively patrolling the area around those bases.

On February 12, 1967, Company B 1/22 Infantry crossed the river, began patrolling west of it, and thus began the 22<sup>nd</sup> Infantry's part of the Operation. On February 15, 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion 22<sup>nd</sup> Infantry was airlifted to their new firebase location at YA613602 in the Plei Trap Valley, receiving sniper fire, resulting in one U.S. WIA. The next day, February 16, Company A 1/22 Infantry was moving west of the firebase when their point element engaged enemy forces in a vicious firefight and became pinned down.

As the fight continued and escalated, Company A set up a defensive perimeter and began using close artillery support. Air strikes were called in, utilizing napalm and Cluster Bomb Units on the North Vietnamese. Company C 1/22 Infantry moved to the aid of Company A, and the enemy broke contact and withdrew to the northwest. Enemy losses confirmed by body count were 33 KIA. Friendly losses were 21 KIA and 29 WIA. One of the American dead was the Commander of Company C, who was killed while leading his men into the fight.

On March 2 Company B 1/22 Infantry, moving through sparse vegetation, came under fire from a heavily wooded hill. Artillery and air support was called in, while the Company laid down a withering fire upon the enemy position. The tactics were successful, and the enemy withdrew. Two enemy KIA were found, while several large blood trails indicated more NVA were killed or seriously wounded. Company B lost two WIA in the engagement.

Moving through heavy jungle on March 5 Company A encountered 12 NVA, killing two of the enemy. The Battalion firebase on March 9 received 60 mortar rounds fired at the base, resulting in one U.S. WIA. On March 10 Company A found a weapons and equipment cache at YA603655, and then a large bunker complex at YA598589, but made no contact with the enemy.

On March 12 1st Battalion 22nd Infantry received 52 rounds of mortar fire in four separate attacks, resulting in 14 U.S. WIA. The next day Company A was sent out of the firebase to search for the enemy mortar positions. Unable to locate the positions, the Company halted for the night, and during the night heard mortar rounds leaving their tubes. The rounds sounded like they were to the northeast of the Company. The next morning the Company began moving to the northeast and ran directly into NVA forces.

In heavy fighting and with much difficulty, the Company was able to form a perimeter and call-in air, artillery and mortar fire. The

battle continued into the late afternoon, when the NVA broke contact and withdrew. Enemy losses were 29 by body count. Company A lost 17 KIA and 27 WIA in the engagement. The next day company A found 25 more enemy bodies, and Company C found five enemy KIA and one WIA, all of these enemy casualties resulting from the fight with Company A on March 14.

On March 16 Company C engaged an NVA force and killed 7 enemy soldiers. In this

action Company C lost 2 KIA and 5 WIA. The next day an ambush patrol from 1/22 Infantry killed two NVA at YA613602. For the next two weeks the Battalion patrolled an area dotted with Montagnard villages northwest of Pleiku and took 34 detainees in for questioning.

On April 2 Company B received automatic weapons fire in the vicinity of ZA088524 resulting in one U.S. WIA. The Company also located two tons of rice and 60 pounds of salt at ZA098528. On April 5 Company C found 500 pounds of rice at ZA107562, and at the end of that day Operation Sam Houston was over.

Operation Francis Marion began the next day, on April 6, and lasted until April 30. It was essentially a continuation of Operation Sam Houston and extended the area of activities to the south. During that period there were no major contacts with the enemy by 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion 22<sup>nd</sup> Infantry. Sporadic contact resulted in one KIA from Company C.

The service started at 9am, but the clock sounded 9 bells at 0855 hours, causing me to reflect on our military experience and the saying "if your 5 minutes early, you're late".

As the service ended, and Kevin's flag draped casket was loaded into the inspection-ready shiny black hearse, you could hear machine gun fire from the Firing Ranges along Dixie Road/Ralph Puckett Way right behind Building 4. I pictured Kevin laying in peace in his casket with a smirk saying, "just how I wanted it ... 6-9 round bursts."

As we drove along Dixie Road EVERY car stopped and in a few instances, Rangers got out of their vehicles and stood at attention.

I noted all the Medals of Honor and Distinguished Service Cross awardees the ranges are named for and for a moment in time I realized the magnitude of heroism our force has demonstrated serving our nation.

As we traced the Ranger Battalion compound you could smell the Georgia clay and the tall Georgia pines, a combo locked in my senses, and I suspect every other infantryman, from the first time I set foot on Fort Benning.

We traced Lawson Army Airfield where C130s were taxiing to take jumpers up for probably their first exit ever from an airplane



in flight, and I thought about Kevin lying peacefully under the flight pattern for basic

Airborne trainees forever ... or as long as our Army trains Soldiers to become Paratroopers.

Finally, we crossed the Chattahoochee River and Uchee Creek to get to Kevin's final resting place. The Chattahoochee is just one of those landmarks that defines your existence as an Infantryman, whether because you dropped a HMMWV in it in an airborne operation or because you drank beer next to it. Way down yonder ...

We laid him to rest with young Rangers from 3rd Battalion, 75th Ranger Regiment providing honors.

It was a bad day, but it was a good day. See you in Valhalla **Kevin Elder**, I love you brother.





So a dutiful son set out on a mission, hoping to arrange his dad's vision. With Google and phone, the son called all around, and soon the clerk's wife confirmed he had found, The country boy and foxhole buddy who had left the farm, Friends during war, brothers in arms.

The clerk and carrier their voices each heard And for years they talked and memories were stirred. But they would never see each other face to face again Better to let the mind's eye wander, than meet as old men.

So I went to see the carrier before the clerk passed away I just wanted to hear some stories before the end of his days. Years later the carrier followed the clerk to the storied golden shore And maybe their names were called out together once more.

#### **D-Series Winter Challenge**

The 2023 D-Series Winter Challenge has began and today we feature 2-22 Infantry as they were the first of seven teams within the Brigade to step off and conquer a physically demanding nine-mile course under extreme conditions designed to enhance the Division's Alpine skills, physical fitness, mental toughness, competitive spirit, and it's link to unit history.



Congratulations to all 63 Mountain Tough Warriors who stood up and rose to the challenge!

The competition is held to commemorate the hardships and trials the original 10th Mountain Soldiers went through to prepare

for combat. The name "D-Series" is a reference to the culminating winter training event that the Soldiers went through in March-April 1944 to prepare for combat in the mountains of Italy.

Soldiers are evaluated along the way with skill checks which are designed to test proficiency and knowledge. Events consist of a stress shoot, medically treating a hypothermic casualty, installing tire chains on a military vehicle, a ski challenge, knot tying, rappelling, a weapons station, employing Ahkio sleds as a member of a squad, and finishing with a history test on the D-Series.

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
