## THE SPIRIT OF CHRISTMAS

**Spirit of Christmas: A general feeling of emotional beneficence associated with Christmas**

**Beneficence: actions that promote the well-being of others.**

There are many of us busily preparing for Christmas, just to be sure that everything is right, in order, and beautiful for the traditional time we spend with friends and family. And I know that most of us, if not all, are reflecting on the “reason for the season”—God’s precious gift—a Savior for the fallen world.

But what are we doing for our neighbors? Maybe we send them a Christmas Card. Maybe we make them some Christmas treats and wrap them up in a pretty box. Maybe we share verbal greetings of goodwill and shouts of “Merry Christmas”, “Seasons Greetings”, and “Happy Holidays” when we pass them on the streets.
