Description

Designed to provide an informative initiation into the discipline of illustration, this course includes information on the history of illustration, and instruction and demonstration of traditional and digital techniques. Students learn to be adept at variety of media and investigate the role of the artist as storyteller, problem-solver, symbol-maker, and social/cultural reporter.

Fulfills the sophomore IL core requirement; fulfills one book arts concentration required course.

Objectives:

Upon completion of this course:

• the student will demonstrate an improved craftsmanship skill. This will be achieved through experimentation with new mediums, styles and techniques

as well as learning the fundamentals of color, composition, line quality, and mood; how all of these elements impact an illustration.

- the student will demonstrate constructive work habits. These habits include organization skills, problem-solving skills, achieving focus, following the directions given for assignments, and meeting deadlines.
- the student will demonstrate improved verbal skills that communicate visual concepts, express ideas, critique artwork and present finished assignments.
- the student will demonstrate an understanding of past and current illustrators and illustration markets.
- students will have the opportunity to refine and develop their artistic talents toward structured illustration assignments.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- 1. The students will learn to demonstrate an expanded knowledge of illustration. For some students, this will mean learning the difference between creating art for him/herself and for a client while for other students, this will mean expanding a very narrow viewpoint of what can be considered illustration. Along with learning how to balance self-expression and individuality with marketable work, it is also a goal for the students to become more aware of past and present illustrators, as well as the current goings on of the illustration world.
- 2. The students will learn to demonstrate improved craftsmanship skills. This will be achieved through experimentation with new mediums, styles and techniques as well as learning the fundamentals of color, composition, line quality, and mood and how all of these elements impact an illustration.
- 3. The students will master good work habits. These habits include organization skills, problem-solving skills, achieving focus, following the directions given for assignments, and meeting deadlines.
- 4. The students will master forming constructive personal opinions about illustration. He/she will learn to think about his/her own work and the work of

their peers and how to state these opinions effectively, constructively, and concisely during critiques.

Student Requirements and Responsibilities

Your attitude is a vital factor when determining your effort and growth.

- Coming to class on time and ready to work is your responsibility as a student.
 Those who do not honor their responsibilities will be noted and their grade will be affected or asked to leave
- Students are required to finish their assignments at the deadline date and present them inthe format established by the assignment brief
- Students are required to participate in all Critiques
- Students are required to use their MICA e-mails and check the class's canvas
- Cell phones may only be used during the break * or in the hall
- There will be 6 assignments as well as studio exercises. Plan to spent 4-6 hours a week on assignment work.

Class Format -in person

- Class starts promptly at 8:30 am, attendance will be taken at that time. The
 first 3 hours will be dedicated to demonstrations, critiques and
 announcements and a warm up exercise. There will be one Lunch break lasting
 60 minutes 12:30-1:30 pm. The rest of the class will be used to continue
 working on the various assignments and/or class exercises and follow up
 critiques.
- At the mid-point of the semester the instructor will meet individually with each student to discuss the progress and further see how student's goals can be met within the course.

Classroom Etiquette

Based on the need to maintain a focused and respectful work environment:

- No Web surfing unless directly related to class work.
- No texting or cell phone usage in the classroom.

- No talking during class discussions, demonstration, lectures or critiques unless called on by the instructor.
- During our studio work time, you may listen to music with your headphones, however keep the volume low so you can hear as announcements and information that can be made at any time.

Attendance

Students are expected to attend all meetings of each class in which they are enrolled. They are expected to be ready to start work at the opening of class and to remain for the entire class session. Irregular attendance or habitual lateness will lead to lower grades and, ultimately, to probation or dismissal. Three late arrivals equal one absence. Students who miss more than 3 classes in a 15-week course (or 20% of class meetings) will earn a failing grade. It is the responsibility of students who arrive late to make sure that the instructor or GTI changes the roll book accordingly. Students who habitually return late to class after breaks will be marked late. 9/26/22 is the College's official withdrawal deadline. Exceptions will be made in the event of a Covid illness.

Grading Criteria

Grades will be based on a combination of attendance, maintaining your schedule, professionalism, quality and completion of work, class participation, motivation and personal growth. Punctuality, and attendance are essential professional practices. Each assignment will be graded using a rubric, to improve your grade you may redo the piece and submit it no later than December 5st with the original rubric sheet. Illustration Department Grade Definitions

A, A+, A-: Superior

Honor grades indicating excellence. Earned as a result of a combination of some or all of the following as outlined in this syllabus: superior portfolio, consistently accurate and prompt completion of assignments, ability to deal resourcefully with abstract ideas, excellent in-class participation and critiquing skills, superior mastery of pertinent art skills and aesthetics, and excellent attendance and punctuality. Probable continued success in sequential courses in the Illustration Department.

B, B+, B-: Above average

Honor grades indicating competence. Earned as a result of a combination of some or all of the following as outlined in this syllabus: high quality portfolio, accurate and prompt completion of assignments, ability to deal well with abstract ideas, commendable mastery of pertinent art skills and aesthetics, above average class participation/critiquing skills, and excellent attendance and punctuality. Probable continued success in sequential courses in the Illustration Department.

C, C+, C-: Average

Standard college grades indicating successful performance earned as a result of a combination of some or all of the following as outlined in this syllabus: satisfactory portfolio, generally accurate and prompt completion of assignments, ability to deal with abstract ideas, fair mastery of pertinent art skills and aesthetics, average class participation/critiquing skills, and regular attendance and punctuality. Sufficient evidence of ability to warrant entering sequential courses in the Illustration Department.

D, **D+**: **Substandard** but receiving credit (ALL Assignments MUST have been completed)

Substandard grades indicating the student has met only minimum requirements as outlined in this syllabus. Earned as a result of some or all of the following: low-quality portfolio, generally inaccurate or late assignments, inadequate grasp of abstract ideas, barely acceptable mastery of pertinent art skills and aesthetics, irregular attendance, and/or repeated tardiness, poor or no class participation/critiquing skills, insufficient evidence of ability to make advisable the enrollment in sequential courses in the Illustration Department.

F: Failure

Non-passing grade indicating failure to meet minimum requirements as defined in this syllabus earned as a result of some or all of the following: non-acceptable portfolio, inaccurate, missing, unfinished or late assignments, turning in assignments done for another class ("Double Dipping"), plagiarizing assignments, failure to cope with abstract ideas, inadequate mastery of pertinent skills, repeated absence from class and/or tardiness. Does not satisfy requirements for entry into courses where prerequisites are specified in the Illustration Department.

Policy

MICA will not tolerate plagiarism, which is defined as claiming authorship of, or using someone else's ideas or work without proper acknowledgement. Without proper attribution, a student may NOT replicate another's work, paraphrase another's ideas, or appropriate images in a manner that violates the specific rules against plagiarism in the student's department. In addition, students may not submit the same work for credit in

more than one course without the explicit approval of all of the instructors of the courses involved.

Consequences

When an instructor has evidence that a student has plagiarized work submitted for course credit, the instructor will confront the student and impose penalties that may include failing the course. In the case of a serious violation or repeated infractions from the same student, the instructor will report the infractions to the department chair or program director. Depending on the circumstances of the case, the department chair or program director may then report the student to the appropriate dean or provost, who may choose to impose further penalties, including expulsion.

Appeal Process

Students who are penalized by an instructor or department for committing plagiarism have the right to appeal the charge and penalties that ensue. Within three weeks of institutional action, the student must submit a letter of appeal to the department chairperson or program director, or relevant dean or provost related to the course for which actions were taken. The academic officer will assign three members of the relevant department/division to serve on a review panel. The panel will meet with the student and the instructor of record and will review all relevant and available materials. The panel will determine whether or not to confirm the charge and penalties. The findings of the panel are final. The panel will notify the instructor, the chairperson, division, the student, and the Office of Academic Affairs of their findings and any recommendations for change in penalties.
