Riverwalk Guild Minutes August 11, 2022

The meeting began with Patty Blanton from Sew Original in Boone. She presented a show of various English paper piecing, hexagon fabric works. English paper piecing uses paper pattern shapes with fabric pieces cut a  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch larger than the paper piece. The fabric is ironed down around the paper pattern, creating a fabric piece. In this case, the shapes were all hexagons. Participants were given instruction and materials (milliner's thin needle and silk thread) to make 2 or 3 hexagon pieces joined together.









Sheri Elderfield opened the meeting and introduction was made for Anne Bertleson, our newest member. A motion was made by Leslie Laws to approve the minutes and treasures report of the July 14 meeting. Stephanie Smith seconded and the vote approved the minutes.

Cindy informed the guild that the Avery Chamber of Commerce After-Hours event would not be held at the Newland Christian church. The Chamber invited the guild to attend their annual dinner on November 15 to sale tickets for our charity quilt. If anyone chooses to dine the charge is \$50.00 per plate.

Discussion was held about the Land Harbor Fish Fry on Saturday, August 13 from 4:30 on. The price is \$12.00 per plate. The guild will have tickets there to sale for the charity quilt. Cindy and Tiffany will be there as well as others.

Tiffany Melchers reported that Crossnore School for children has 64 children that we are providing quilts to. The school has offered us an opportunity to tour the facilities.

Cindy led discussion about selling tickets at the Wooly Worm Festival October 15 and 16. A space will cost \$200.A vote was taken to have the Guild pay \$100 on the space and participating members would pay the other \$100. Those participants will sell their own goods and sell tickets for the guild charity quilt. Cindy made the motion and Georgia seconded. The vote was passed and a sign-up sheet was prepared.
