
UNITED WOMEN IN FAITH CORNER

I am sure that I gave some kind of response like that is nice and continued doing what I was doing. Easton went outside and then came back in telling me I should come see the cat. Begrudgingly I went. I know that makes me sound like a terrible mom but if you are a parent, you know the trials of trying to complete any task while your children are home. They always need you for something that is probably not that significant and in my mind that is where this current cat situation lies. No need to insert that I know that I will one day wish for this time back with my kids, where they need me for things, I already feel that way and it is not a part of this story. Anyway, I went outside and sure enough the twins found a cat, not just a cat but a cute little black kitten.

Most of you probably don't know this about me but I am not a huge fan of cats.
