
The Little Free Pantry is located between Hufstader Chiropactor and Village Hall. There is now a **Free Library** located at the G.A.R. Museum.

Fourteen women worked at Midwest Mission in Pawnee, IL 3 days in OCTOBER. We carpooled leaving Murdock at 8 am & arriving about 4:30 pm on Monday October 7. The dorm is comfortable & we are blessed to have a woman in our group that cooks for us. She spoils us. We had beautiful weather that week. Women from Grand Island, Milligan, Lincoln, Omaha, Council Bluffs, & Elmwood-Murdock were Jesus' hands & feet Oct 7-11. Some of the tasks completed include counting rice meal bags & rolling 60 bags together, making personal dignity kits, cleaning & inventorying equipment returned from an offsite event that made rice bags, sewing blankets, verifying cleaning kits, prepping bleacher boards to make school desks, building school desks, sorting items, and working in the bike shop. Some of our group went on a very informative tour of the 3 warehouses & the campus. During break times, the full-time staff talked to us about their jobs, how Midwest Mission works, & who they work with. They have 12 employees: 9 full time & 3 part time. It is amazing the amount of humanitarian items that they ship to help those struggling in the United States & internationally. Every item leaving Midwest Mission is touched by a volunteer. We, as volunteers, are enriched in many ways when we support Midwest Mission. 1 Peter 4:10-11 "Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms." Our group always has a lot of laughter & great fellowship. Thank you to Ramona Oehlerking and Phyllis Buell, who went for the first time with me to Midwest Mission.

There is room on the next trip which is April 7-11, 2025.

Happy November,

It is hard to believe that we are almost done with 2024, a mere short 2 months until Christmas! But for now the focus should not be on Christmas but on Thanksgiving. I know that I have talked before about how Thanksgiving is my favorite holiday. It remains to be the truth.
