

PASTOR'S PEN



I attended the funeral the other day. I was trying to think when the last time I had attended a funeral rather than performed a funeral was. It has been a while and in all honesty, I am really okay with that fact. Every time I get to preside over a funeral service, I feel honored that I get to be a part of this time in a family's life. It is an honor to be a part of a celebration of a life, whether it is at the beginning of their life with a baptism or the end of their life with a funeral. These are events that tie us together, whether we attend the same church or any church at all. People come to celebrate these events that are centered around our connections with God.

As I was at this particular funeral, however, there was a portion of the service that reminded us in attendance that if we were not members of this church or had not "properly prepared" ourselves, we were not welcome to receive communion. Now I understand what the thought behind being prepared to receive the gift of communion is. I understand that there should be some reverence to what is being presented. When we receive communion, we are saying that we want a relationship with God. We are saying that we know that Jesus is our LORD and that we want to more closely follow his way. This is not something that should be taken lightly. However, it is also not something that we can judge others on their preparedness.

The more of this life that I live, the more I see how often we work to keep others out, rather than invite them in. We set up exclusive clubs or put parameters around things to make sure that we are only including a certain type of people. Whether it is rules about what people look like, or their talent levels, or their beliefs or where they live. We as humans have done this all of time. Some scientists say we have to do this because if we don't put people into categories, our minds would get overwhelmed with the vastness of it all and we would not be able to function. Maybe that is true, but is there not even one place where we can say it does not matter where you came from, who you are, what you have done, you are welcome?

When I read the Last Supper account, and the Gospels in general, the thing that often strikes me as interesting is that Jesus did not care if the people that he was with were rich or popular or came from a certain area. What he cared about was surrounding himself with people that were in need, that were hungry for God, that were open to receiving new information that sometimes went against what society had taught them. Jesus does not put parameters on who could come to him, in fact when the disciples try to stop children, Jesus rebukes them and tells the children to come. When the Samaritan woman meets Jesus at the well, she is not turned away but included. When the sick man is lowered from the roof begging for healing, he is not turned away but healed. Jesus was not looking for the perfect candidates, he wasn't looking for the most educated, he was looking for those that had spirits ready to receive wherever they were. It is one of the reasons I love the United Methodist Church. We celebrate an open table communion. It does not matter who you are or where you have been just if you have the hunger for something more, bigger and greater than what you have seen so far. He wants your spirit to be hungry for a relationship with him. So, the question is, are you hungry? Do you desire a love that is greater than anything you could imagine, a forgiveness that knows no bounds when asked for, a guide that wants to literally walk every step of this crazy journey with you? Then you are invited to come and receive the gift of communion, a symbol of the love and sacrifice that Jesus made for each and everyone of God's children. No exceptions!
