

PASTOR'S PEN



When Nick and I first got married we bought our first house. It was a small little starter house in an older neighborhood in Lincoln. It was not a terrible neighborhood but also was not the best. We had this older couple that lived next to us. They seemed like nice people and we got along okay. That is until the 4th of July.

You may not know this about Nick but he LOVES the 4th of July. There is nothing that makes him happier than getting to shoot off fireworks, especially if he can do it for others. So, since we were one of the first couples in our friends group to buy a house, we naturally threw a huge party for all of our friends. Imagine what a party with a bunch of early to mid-twenty year olds on the 4th of July might look like, and for sure that is what was happening. We were having a fantastic time, I don't remember there being music but there probably was, there for sure were outdoor games, we had a hot tub, and we were shooting off fireworks. At maybe 10 that night our neighbor came out to complain about our noise and our fireworks. He felt that stuff was falling all over his camper and he and his wife were planning on leaving on vacation the next day and he wanted us to keep it down and stop blowing things up. This might be hard to imagine but I can say that I was not really receptive to his complaint. It certainly was not my best moment. But the party went on and the next day we cleaned up our mess and moved on.

Our neighbor, however, did not move on. He held on to his anger through his vacation, he came home and cut the cucumbers we had growing up the fence we shared. It was infuriating and sad. I went and tried to talk to him, to apologize for my behavior on the 4th, to try to come to a compromise, a way to co-exist but the damage had been done and there was no way to move forward with friendship. It has been 13 years since we moved from that house and still the memories of those interactions creep up on me.

Please do not hear this story as me stating that I did everything right and our neighbor did everything wrong. That is totally not the case. We were both to blame and we both handled different parts of that relationship poorly but the older I get, the more I am bothered by the inconsiderate nature of people at times. Sure, there are times when we are not aware that we have done something to offend someone but certainly there are times where we know we have/are being inconsiderate and we do it anyway. I am not sure why this is. I have definitely done this, I am not proud of myself for those moments and I really do try not to but still it happens. But when we are inconsiderate, when we are not making an attempt to be kind, we are not making the world better. We are actually doing the opposite and who really wants to live in a world where that is the standard.

How do we deal with people that despite being asked continue to do the inconsiderate action? Romans has this to say ""Repay no one evil for evil, but give thought to do what is honorable in the sight of all. If possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all. Beloved, never avenge yourselves, but leave it to the wrath of God, for it is written, "Vengeance is mine, I will repay, says the Lord." To the contrary, "if your enemy is hungry, feed him; if he is thirsty, give him something to drink; for by doing so you will heap burning coals on his head." Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good" Basically the Bible says kill them with kindness and lead by example. Try to be a better person, to put on Christ and show them what it looks like to be considerate, to be kind and to be caring. These are certainly traits that this world uses more of. Let us lead the way.
