April/May Mission Project - Bridges of Hope, Pine Ridge Reservation

In honor of Native American Sunday in April, our mission project for April and May will be to collect cash donations to support the Bridges of Hope ministry program on the Pine Ridge Reservation in Allen, SD. Bridges of Hope, led by pastors Tim and Kim Wardell of the Pass Creek Church of God, provides food, clothing, diapers, counseling, home repairs and more to Indian families in need. The mission of Bridges of Hope is to "Help Without Hurting" and the Wardells strive to teach the importance of working and helping others.

The ministry offers a 13-week summer VBS program run by volunteer teams from other churches. They are currently raising funds to build a bunk house for VBS volunteers. Bridges of Hope has a <u>Lakota Trading Post</u> that sells Native American art and jewelry so local residents can share their talents while earning money and offers another work program providing short term employment to Indian families. Kelli Brewer recommends Bridges of Hope as a program that accomplishes much on Pine Ridge Reservation with the resources and donations they receive.
