#### A MESSAGE FROM OUR DIRECTOR ON THE LOSS OF A FAITHFUL FRIEND

Sometimes it's really difficult to put my feelings into words. I often procrastinate posts like this...and maybe I've ended up skipping them all together many many times because I don't stop long enough to allow myself to process. It's just hard to find the time to write something worthy. It seems like it's often the sweetest souls who get dealt the worst hand.

Cheryl came into Faithful Friends from Gilchrist Animal Services on May 3rd, 2019. The shelter director has known me for 15 years and anyone who knows me at all knows I have quite the soft spot for momma dogs. It took me nearly a week from the time I was made aware of Cheryl's predicament to figure out where I could squeeze her. She looked pretty much like a black blob in the photo I was sent, but when I saw her in person, my heart melted. This pregnant, white-faced, stumpy-legged, barrel-shaped old gal was just my cup of tea.

Cheryl's first impression set the bar high, but she never failed to impress me with her sweet, calm, affectionate disposition. She soon gave birth to the Star Wars Litter and was an excellent mom. Despite her constant attention and plentiful supply of milk, one of her puppies was struggling...and so he (the famous Lando) came home with me for bottle feeding. Cheryl always got so excited when I would bring Lando back to her for visits as he grew stronger. Cheryl was one of those "one in a million" dogs. The kind that anyone would be lucky to have. Just easy. Well mannered, happy, calm, but somehow the right amount of goofy, too.Three months after her intake, once she managed to wean her puppies, Cheryl was spayed and placed up for adoption. She was adopted at her second adoption event to a nice family. They loved her very much.

Unfortunately, although Cheryl appeared healthy at the time of adoption...on the inside, cancer was taking over Cheryl's body. Cheryl's family didn't have much experience with pets. They thought that Cheryl had gotten into poison ivy and was having a rash/reaction to it on her abdomen. What they were seeing was actually two large, ulcerated mammary masses. Her family reached out to us to return her to Faithful Friends because they could not afford to care for her, but did not indicate she was having any medical issues. When she came back, it was clear that Cheryl needed immediate veterinary care. She hurt and she was tired. She made the trip to West End Animal Hospital. Radiographs revealed bone cancer. All over. Her leg, her chest, her spine. Dr Schirmer called me to give me the bad news. There would be no saving Cheryl.I asked for the best pain med cocktail possible and picked Cheryl up from the clinic. With her meds on board, Cheryl was actually comfortable for the first time in weeks (or months). I hoped to give her a day or two in comfort (with lots of meds) because it just killed me to think she had been suffering. Cheryl rode shotgun with me that day. She ate bacon cheeseburgers and peered out the window. But mostly she nuzzled her sweet face into my hand as I pet her for hours telling her what a good girl she was and how much I loved her. We ended up having to say goodbye that evening. Thursday. It was a very tough day. This dog, who wasn't even "mine," left pawprints all over my heart. I spend a lot of time with the momma dogs who come through the rescue. I truly think they are the best dogs ever.

I hope that I can communicate more effectively in the future to our adopters that we are always here for our Faithful Friends. That there is no shame in asking for help. That we don't judge here - that our compassion doesn't just end with our animals...that it extends to the people they love, too. RIP Cheryl. You were very loved by all who met you.
