# Trinity Times November 2025





It will soon be Thanksgiving Day. People will gather in churches to give thanks to God for all the blessings in their lives. Most of us will gather around tables to feast on turkey, sweet potatoes, mashed potatoes, cranberry sauce, turnips, squash, apple pie, pumpkin pie, and more. And there will be lots of food left over. We have leftovers after everyone has eaten the very best first. When it comes to delicious, easy post-Thanksgiving meals, leftovers are great.

When it comes to thanking God, however, leftovers won't do. The Old Testament makes it clear that the proper way to give thanks for God's provision and protection is to give off the top, not from what is left over. From a bountiful harvest, one offered to God the first fruits; from a herd of newborn lambs, the healthiest and comeliest. Traditionally, the offering was a tithe. According to the book of Deuteronomy, a tenth of seed, grain, wine, oil, and livestock was to be offered annually – the choicest tenth.

While many think that tithing is an antiquated concept, I find it a good spiritual discipline. Because I believe that all I have comes from God, I also believe that how I prioritize the use of my time and money is an expression of my gratitude to God, my devotion to God, and my trust in God. When I prepare my monthly budget, my tithe heads the list. As I order my week, the activities related to my service to God are given top priority. I try to give back to God the first and best. And I have always found that there is enough time and money for everything else.

In this month of Thanksgiving, your church asks you to consider your stewardship of these resources. There will be no specific appeal each Sunday, but each sermon will lightly touch upon some aspect of stewardship: the richness of our spiritual inheritance from God (All Saints Day, 11/2); how faith moved Zacchaeus to give half (!) of his possessions to the poor (11/9); that Christ issues to every Christian a third-class ticket that includes a call to serve (11/16); the reason we rejoice always and give thanks to God (11/23). We will consecrate our commitments of time and money during the worship service on Thanksgiving Sunday, November 23<sup>rd</sup>.

Time and money are highly prized commodities of modern society. They are what we have to offer back to God in expression of our thankfulness, faithfulness, and trust. The tithe is a biblical and generous thank offering to God, but it can also be a truly difficult and sacrificial commitment. It is up to each of us to decide how much to give, and the answer will differ for each person and family. But if God is first in our giving and living, then whatever we offer to God will not be leftovers, but the first and best.



They are a living document, updated through the efforts of the General Board of Church and Society, to ensure they remain relevant and inclusive.

#### The Food Pantry Is Looking for Additional Volunteers to help Bag Food

- On the last Tuesday of each month at 10 am in the parish hall, non-perishable food is
  bagged for the food pantry distribution. Only in November and December is that date
  moved up in order to get ahead of the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays. Each
- volunteer typically bags food for six households. The food has been set out on tables,
- and all that needs to be done is to fill two or three bags per household. Sometimes we
   need help to bag produce if people can spare the time, but if they can't, they head
- home.
- In the last year or so, the number of our available volunteers has dwindled. Two
   people have moved away, three are often absent, taking care of family members, and,
- sadly, one person has died. Some months there are plenty of bags left over from a
   distribution, so few volunteers are needed, but in others, many hands are needed. We
- are hoping to have a volunteer list of baggers that will include enough members so that
   we have reserves to draw on during the holiday season when we have large turnouts.
