'BEING SINGLE AGAIN WAS A HUGE ADJUSTMENT'

Brigette Bard, 50, is the CEO of BioSure Global.

Like everyone who gets married, when my husband and I wed in August 1994, I thought we'd be together forever. We spent many happy years as a couple and had our three children, now 27, 24 and 22. But as the children got older, my husband and I started to go through spells of not speaking with one another.

When our eldest left home for



university, I felt a massive shift in my emotions. I suddenly felt incredibly lonely, despite still having my husband and other two children at home. I realised then that I'd been unhappy for years, but the children had distracted me from my own emotions. I'd become detached from my marriage, and in 2016 I filed for divorce.

Gaining confidence

Around this time, I was growing my own business, BioSure Global, a diagnostic company that had just launched the world's first approved HIV self-test. So I started to put all of my time and energy into that. Soon I realised that for years I'd been living two lives. One where, at work, I was driven and motivated. And another where, at home, I was miserable and no longer laughing.

The day I moved into my new home, a rented four-bedroom house, my first-ever place on my own, I felt liberated. Over the next couple of years my business grew and I also gained so much more confidence doing things outside of my comfort zone, like travelling to developing countries and meeting with heads of states.



Then, while at a rave with friends in March 2017, I met my new partner. And from the start of our relationship, we've been nothing but honest with each other.

When I think about my divorce, I don't have any regrets. Seven years on, BioSure Global remains as groundbreaking as ever, having just launched a unique nasal spray that helps block colds, flu and COVID-19. I'm so much more fulfilled now and that is the most important thing.

put a strain on our relationship. He worked long hours to support us and I felt lonely and stressed, juggling the kids with my part-time job as a marketing consultant. We spent little time together as a couple, had very different parenting styles, and felt



that it was better if we separated.

Once the divorce was finalised, I took time to think about what I wanted to do. I needed a decent income for me and my children, but I also wanted flexibility so I'd be around for them, so working for myself felt like an ideal solution. I'd always had an interest in property so, with some equity from a flat I'd bought in my 20s, I invested in property in the Cotswolds. In 2018, I bought The Loft, a unique, romantic apartment in Stow-on-the-Wold, followed by the charming Little Gem Cottage in Bourton-on-the-Water. Within five years, I'd bought and refurbished five luxury holiday cottages.

Empowering achievement

I was amazed at how everything took off so quickly and, with my confidence growing, in 2020 I set up another business, coaching other property investors on how to create a successful short-term rental business. In 2021, Unique Cotswold Cottages won a prestigious award as the Best Rural Start Up Business for the South West Region.

Creating a comfortable financial future has been hard work, but empowering. I wouldn't wish divorce on anyone, but if your marriage isn't salvageable, it's nothing to feel ashamed of. In fact, it really can be the making of you. I'm living proof of that.
