**BAPTISMS** are generally administered on Easter Eve, Pentecost, All Saints' Sunday and the first Sunday after Epiphany. Pre-baptism classes are scheduled and held seasonally. A person of any age may receive the sacrament of Holy Baptism. The application form for baptismal candidates is available online under the WORSHIP tab.

**THE SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE** requires a minimum of 90 days notice to our office and requires premarital counseling. An initial conference with the clergy should be scheduled by the couple to review the process and any special circumstances before commitments may be made. Please contact Jo Wood to schedule.

**FUNERAL OR MEMORIAL SERVICES** for communicants of the parish are customarily held in the church and may include the celebration of the Holy Eucharist.



# Celebrating Ordinary Time


## *Spiritual Growth in Daily Life*

For almost half the year, our church calendar is full of major feast days and celebrations. Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, and Easter all seem to rush upon us in quick succession. However, as we enter into the summer months, we enter into the period of the church year referred to as *ordinary time*. This extended season of the church year is called *ordinary* because it is not related to any particular feast or major celebration. Compared to the great festivals that commemorate the Incarnation, Resurrection, and Ascension of Jesus, the remainder of the year seems, well – rather *ordinary*! This period of time is also referred to as the “green season,” since the liturgical color remains green for months on end.

However, this long liturgical season into which we are about to enter is also a time for us to reflect upon the *ordinariness* of our faith. Clearly, our faith in Christ and the transforming power of the Spirit are anything but ordinary, but we live out that faith in the ordinariness of everyday living. Tending to children, cleaning the house, ironing the clothes, putting away the groceries. This is the stuff of everyday life. These are the tasks that occupy a great deal of our time and energy. Too often our faith becomes church-centered. We associate our faith with Sunday morning worship, retreat weekends, ministry events, and the host of other activities connected to the church. Although all of these church-centered activities are vitally important to our spiritual growth and development, the reality is that most of our life is spent in *ordinary time* – the day to day living of life.

Jesus often connected faith to everyday life. Most prominently, Jesus taught in the form of parables, which have been defined as “an earthly stories with a heavenly



meaning.” In his teaching, Jesus compared the kingdom of God to a mustard seed, a fishing net, and a batch of dough. He pointed to the “birds of the air” and the “lilies of the field” as examples of God’s provision and grace. Jesus took the most common elements of any meal – bread and wine – and used them as symbols of his own body and blood. Over and over again, Jesus points to “the stuff of everyday life” as an illustration of God’s presence and power in the world. Jesus reminds us that the kingdom of God is among us and we can experience spiritual growth in the *ordinariness* of daily life.

One of the most famous examples of “spiritual growth in daily living” is found in a small booklet entitled *The Practice of the Presence of God* by Brother Lawrence. In the monastic community where Lawrence lived, much emphasis was placed on the traditional disciplines of prayer, study, and work. These are, of course, important elements of the spiritual life! But Brother Lawrence wanted to experience God in the midst of what he called the “common business” of life – tasks such as washing the dishes, mopping the floors, weeding the garden, and changing the sheets. Lawrence developed a habit of intentionally talking to God and “lifting up his heart” while he was going about his daily business. He

firmly believed that “we ought not to be weary of doing little things for the love of God, who regards not the greatness of the work, but the love with which it is performed.” After several months of “practicing the presence of God” in the midst of daily living, Brother Lawrence experienced a deeper level of joy, peace, and purpose in his life. He wasn’t focused on doing great things, but on doing small things with great love.

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As we enter into the long days of summer and begin this extended season of *ordinary time*, let us be reminded that growth in the spiritual life is often experienced in the midst of the *ordinariness* of our daily lives. Mountain-top experiences and moments of profound spiritual awakening are often few and far between. But we can *lift up our hearts* to God as we go about the “common business” of lives. We can be intentional about *practicing the presence of God* even as we complete the mundane tasks of daily life. And as we experience God in the *ordinary*, we come to know more deeply the peace that truly passes all understanding.

#### LET GO AND LET GOD

Fr. Doug spends a quiet moment offering the petitions of parishioners to God. Prayers are written on paper scraps and collected in a wooden box in the Narthex. Anyone may contribute a concern, a thanksgiving, or a prayer knowing that it will be prayed for and then burned, the smoke rising skyward, carrying the burden with it.

the keen interests that many of our students have in the arts and sciences.







# Growing in Grace

## *An Update on our Strategic Plan*

Just over eight months ago, we officially launched Phase One of our Strategic Plan. During this time, we have been focused on the implementation of this new plan as well as the development of the resources and leadership we will need to make this plan a reality. Here is a brief overview of what has been accomplished so far:

### **Our Vision and Mission**

As a church and school, our vision is to be “a vibrant spiritual and educational community resource, radiating God’s love for everyone, everywhere!” This new vision reflects our calling to be a vibrant and life-giving community. God is calling us to be a place where everyone can discover the depth of God’s love and wideness of God’s mercy. This new vision also reflects God’s call for us to be outward focused, to be missionally engaged with our local community. We are called to be a resource – to connect with our neighbors and to create ministry partnerships with those around us. In order to make this vision a reality, we are focused on the following three goals:

### **Goal One: Intergenerational Community**

We believe that God is calling us to create an “intergenerational community that meets people wherever they are on their faith journeys.” Over the past eight months, we have been working to create a master communication plan for our church and school, and this first edition of the new quarterly *Tidings* is part of that master plan. A new Parent’s Fellowship Group has been established to foster community among our youth group parents. The Pastoral Care team continues to grow, and new Eucharistic Visitors and Hospital Ministers have been trained. A new ministry for seniors called OWLS has been meeting regularly for several months. And additional Bible study and spiritual formation opportunities have been created to meet the growing needs of our congregation. These are just a few of the initiatives that have already been accomplished this year.

## **Goal Two: Thriving and Joyful Learning Community**

Our school is continuing to develop under the leadership of our Head of School, Dr. Rosemary Marshall. Several new fellowship opportunities have been created to foster a deeper sense of community among parents and alumni. Creative fundraising, careful budgeting, and other significant steps have been taken toward greater financial sustainability and growth. This summer, the school is expanding the number of weekday camps that will be offered in order to respond to the changing needs of our local community. In the classroom, enhancements have been made to the curriculum and enrichment activities in order to strengthen our commitment to academic excellence. Many steps are being taken to ensure a strong and healthy future for our school and church communities.

## **Goal Three: Unified and Growing Community**

Finally, the third goal pertains to the relationship between our church and school. The development of a truly collaborative partnership between the church and school has been a priority of this strategic planning process since the beginning. As we look to the future, we feel it is imperative that the church and school have a sense of shared mission and common purpose. To move us closer to this goal, we have been working on collaborative programs such as our annual Christmas program, which this year featured our adult choir, youth music ensemble, students, and staff – and we even had a surprise performance by Fr. Doug and Shannon! We have also been hard at work developing a comprehensive security plan, which will greater unite church and school with regards to safety and emergency response. Most importantly, a Master Campus Planning team has developed a series of draft proposals for the future expansion and development of our property and buildings. These proposals have been presented to the vestry for consideration and a final master plan will be approved in the coming months.

## **What's Next?**

This coming fall, we will be holding a congregational meeting to provide updates regarding the progress of our strategic plan and our plans for the upcoming year. Please check future communications for more information about this meeting. Also, the strategies and initiatives for Phase One of our strategic plan can be found on our church website. Take a look and see where God might be calling you to help make this vision a reality!

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## **Music Ministry: Take Note!**

The Strategic Plan includes development of our Music Ministry and there have already been some exciting developments including the hiring of an Assistant Choir Coordinator, Debbie White, to assist Music Director Timm Johnson-Reynolds. An adult choir ensemble has formed to enhance worship. We have welcomed soloists and accompanying musicians for special services and a Youth Band and Choir has formed from our own Youth and Sunday School programs, to provide a musical outlet and an opportunity to play a more significant role in worship for our young parishioners.



Choir takes the summer off and will reconvene in September. However, if you are interested in music through Choir, Ensemble, or any other group, please talk to Timm or Debbie. They will be here throughout the summer months.

We have three leaders who have been tasked with overseeing the specific goals we have established for the church and school. These leaders will be working with our various ministry leaders and volunteers to ensure that the projects and initiatives are running smoothly.

# Abundant Love = Abundant Sharing

Easter is a time for sharing God's abundant love with others, and throughout the month of April, we did just that!!

On April 1, the first through fifth grade students from our Good Shepherd Episcopal School went gleaning with CROS ministries. Seventeen carloads of students, parents and teachers, drove out to Jupiter Farms, where they picked 2,000 pounds of peppers. It was also an opportunity for the children to learn more about struggling families in our community – and about the value of good nutrition.

On April 10, a team of volunteers from Good Shepherd made their monthly trek to St. George's mission in Riviera Beach, where they prepared and served a nutritious meal to nearly 200 homeless and hungry men, women and children. For nearly 30 years, Good Shepherd has joined with other churches and organizations in Palm Beach County to provide daily meals for those who depend on this mission for their very survival. The Outreach & Mission Committee devotes one-third of its annual budget to provide food and administrative support to this vital program of our Episcopal Diocese.



During Holy Week, we prepared and distributed Easter baskets to several of our own Food Pantry clients, who depend on us to help make their holidays a bright and festive time for their families.

And finally, the week after Easter, we concluded our annual Lenten Collection. This year we chose CROS Ministries' summer camps as our recipients, and on their behalf, we want to thank everyone who contributed to this effort. We thank the Sunday School (and the parents!) who purchased supplies for the camp's many craft projects. We thank the members of our congregation, whose

donations will make it possible for the camp to purchase much-needed equipment, including microwaves to heat snacks and meals, and tablets which will allow the campers to participate in the School Districts' iREADY Reading Program. Additional funds which were collected will be allocated to field trips, which give the campers a chance to see beyond their limited horizons. And finally, we give thanks to the Crafty Ladies, who cleaned out their closets and storage areas and donated some wonderful craft supplies which will enable campers to develop additional creative skills.

We have asked a lot over these last few months, and we honor the extraordinary generosity of the response. We also respect the limits which life and necessity impose on all of us. This congregation has gone above and beyond in showing God's abundant love for our brothers and sisters, and for that we give heartfelt thanks.


# 3 Great Reads




### Here If You Need Me




### Paul: A Biography

# Engaged and Influential: Youth Group

*We thank you for setting us at tasks which demand our best efforts, and for leading us to accomplishments which satisfy and delight us. – from A General Thanksgiving, p 836, The Book of Common Prayer.*

As the end of the program year approaches, we look back to the accomplishments of the parish youth during the past several months and look forward to forthcoming youth activities during the busy month of June. The Youth Group chose as their theme for this year *resilience*: the ability to bounce back in the face of adversity. This choice was in part a nod to the sustained strength of the youth program during an extended “interim” period; even in the face of continuing uncertainty about the direction of the program, the youth group continued to exist and thrive. As interim leader, I would point moreover to the group’s ability to express themselves in new ways, particularly regarding their influence in the life of the Good Shepherd community itself.

The signature event of the past quarter was the *Chez Youth Group* elegant dinner, held on March 30, in which the youth prepared and served a plated three-course dinner for 80 members of the Good Shepherd community. The dinner featured restaurant-quality dishes made from scratch – from cleaning raw shrimp to melting chocolate over a

double boiler – and I believe that it will be long remembered by all who participated, youth and diners alike. Over and above the success of the evening, which raised more than \$3,000 toward this year’s Youth Mission Trip, the event elicited a growth in the character and confidence of our adolescents and young adults; through attention to detail and teamwork they were able to accomplish something that surprised and delighted fellow members of the Good Shepherd community. These same qualities, albeit less dramatically, have been a common thread in youth activities during early 2019, from their carwash fundraiser to their service at *Passport to Paradise*, Good Shepherd’s annual auction and dinner, to their leadership on Youth Celebration Sunday.

June is a busy month for youth engagement, and after a week off after school gets out, we look to three consecutive weeks of activity. The second week of June features

Good Shepherd’s Vacation Bible School, *Roar! Life is Wild, God is Good!* Many of our youth annually participate at VBS as station assistants and youth team leaders, which provide



avenues for them to work alongside parish leaders and show Christian love to the children who attend.

The following week, I will be accompanying a group of 14 youth to *Kanuga Youth Week* in the mountains of western North Carolina, a week providing for Christian fellowship, reflection and spiritual growth. Then, the next week, the youth and several youth leaders travel on a Youth Mission Trip to Marathon, FL. There we will have various opportunities to work with our hosts at St. Columba Episcopal Church to positively impact a community still recovering structurally and emotionally from the ravages of Hurricane Irma in late 2017: assembling cabinets for new apartments bought to provide affordable housing to displaced members of the community, sorting and stocking donations to their *Next to New* thrift and furniture stores, and stocking and setting up stations for their July summer camp for local children. We've also offered our cooking expertise to provide the St. Columba community and those they serve an *ágape* meal should they wish.

In closing, I wish to thank the members of the Good Shepherd community for their sustained support and encouragement to

the youth (and their interim leader!). I ask you to continue to pray for our youth, particularly as we say goodbye to a strong graduating class of five smart and talented young women who are off to college next year. A particular shout-out to Grace Long, who has helped me during this interim period, and who has served as youth representative to the Vestry for the past two years. And I need to name check our Youth Group leaders who faithfully spend their Wednesday evenings helping the youth to grow into the full stature of Christ: my wife Letty, Richard Dunstan, Richard Morie, Jessie Spinnenweber, Ian Taylor, and most especially Beth Bohnsack, without whom my job would be impossible.

# Sunday School Matters

An Essay by Merike Seely

I was recruited to teach Sunday School at Good Shepherd in 1998. A voice told me to do it. Not nearly as dramatic as a burning bush or an angel from on high, this voice came to me in the ladies room of the church office building—from the next stall. “You should teach Sunday School,” the voice said. Then, a brief silence. “Okay,” I hesitantly replied.

What else could I say? Our Associate Priest, Wendy Williams, was doing her job as chief recruiter of Sunday School teachers. She had a gentle demeanor and an ingenious strategy. I couldn’t say no. And, in retrospect, I’m incredibly glad that I didn’t.

At first, I felt like a fish out of water. It seemed as if the four-year-olds might see right through my “teacher” facade. They would intuitively know that I hadn’t read the whole Bible. They seemed to confound me with unanswerable questions like, “What does God look like?” Or, “Did my dog go to heaven?” These are great questions. And twenty-one years later, I still can’t answer them. That is the mystery. The certainty is in the source of the questions.

Kids grapple with existential issues just like adults. Who will take care of me? Will I be loved? What if I fail? As Christians, we hope to address those concerns through the lessons of the Bible. As Sunday School teachers we pore over curriculum catalogs and research the best classroom resources and coloring pages. We read books about Sunday School lesson plans and stay up late cutting and tracing for Sunday morning. This is all good. We are prepared. Then we go into the



classroom and we set up a road to Bethlehem. It’s a strip of purple felt and there is a three-dimensional cardboard model of a city rising up at the end. There are little standing palm trees, prophets, and approaching the city, a family. A king is coming.

The children are gathered around. The story begins. And then, one little girl quickly crawls around the edge of the display to get a better view. The Velcro of her sneaker catches the edge of the felt pulling it wildly around in a flourish, sending palm trees and prophets flying in all directions. Squeals of disbelief fill the room. Children are scrambling to collect the assembly of characters. The road to Bethlehem is still attached to her shoe, being dragged surely to Jericho by this point.

And that was the precise moment when the lesson began. We were no longer watching the story, but living it. We were carefully replacing the road, putting the prophets in order, slowly and delicately replanting the trees with pinkies extended. We skillfully rebuilt the city. No one blamed

anyone. There were no tears. We talked through the entire process of helping each other with our task. We were resilient, cooperative, caring, and most of all, loved.

This is why Sunday School matters. If we desire to raise up disciples of Jesus, we need to give them permission to imagine and ponder the big questions. Why did this happen? How will we get past this? Things don't always go the way we plan. They didn't for Abraham and Sarah, or Jonah. They sure didn't for Mary. Things happen that are unlikely. We may not see it coming. But together, with each other and our faith in God, we get through it. These are the meaningful connections that Sunday School makes which are often difficult to find in secular education. Some questions may not be answered satisfactorily, and some will never be answered, but that is why our spiritual journey is life-long.

Wondering is a great way to get kids to think about the big questions. I once wondered with a class about where the sand in the vast desert came from. A five-year old boy gave it some thought and seriously said that, "the desert was the sand that came out of God's pocket." What a parable for the enormity of God! (If you are a parent of a boy, you will appreciate the truth in that association.)

So, parents, let your children come to Sunday School. They may not leave class able to explain a biblical concept or quote a verse, but they will know that they are loved and welcomed as a part of a larger fellowship. They will know that they are important. They will know that we all make mistakes, that we have the capacity for forgiveness, and that we are never alone. They will come to understand that we are all learning, no matter how old we are. And, teachers truly learn as much as the children. So if you ever hear a voice asking you to teach Sunday School, just say "Okay." I know you will be glad you did.


