



Rector Search Q & A

Q When will we call our next Rector?

A The estimate for Good Shepherd is about one year from the time the former rector left. Because we went through this process about five years ago, and we are considered a healthy parish, we are familiar with the requirements and recommendations for a successful search. That said, it should be noted that the timing can change depending on factors such as candidate availability, interview schedules, and overall response to our opening.

Q Will the people of the parish get to decide on the candidate?

A No. The parish elected a Vestry to appoint a Search Committee, a group that works confidentially and with oversight of the entire process. The Search Committee plans, prepares, evaluates, schedules, interviews, and finally, makes a recommendation of ONE candidate to the Vestry. The Bishop is then notified for the final approval.

Q Where are we in the process right now?

A As of early December, we are finalizing our Parish Profile for submission to the Diocesan office. The profile is an important document because it introduces candidates to who we are and why we are a great faith community. It tells our unique story and invites the reader to see themselves in this place of purpose and potential. It also highlights our desirable geographical area which will interest many priests scraping ice off a windshield in January.

Q What can I do as a parishioner while we wait?

A Be a parishioner! Live fully into the life of the parish. There is no shortage of engaging worship, education, and fellowship opportunities. Continue to support Good Shepherd faithfully and financially so that the next rector has a strong foundation to build on. Be a loving friend and neighbor. Share joys and sorrows with each other. Pray. Volunteer. This is an exciting time to be here as the next chapter in our story unfolds.

Updates on the search process are posted on our website every two weeks or so. You can find the link on our home page at GoodShepOnline.org. The Rector Search page also has a chronological list of updates, a transition message, our CAT Survey Executive Summary, and links to our Strategic and BRIDGE plans.

Three women, each coincidently with an injured wrist or hand, came forward side-by-side, arm-in-arm for prayer and anointing at a recent Wednesday morning Holy Eucharist and Healing in the church.

The service is one of my favorites that we do here at Good Shepherd, and with usually between two and eight people in attendance, the service is more informal, intimate, and communal in nature. In place of a homily I normally offer a short reflection on the topic of a saint or Feast Day and invite those gathered to share their own thoughts and reflections. As we share, we learn from the wisdom of each other's stories. After the homily we pray a litany for healing, often led in the moment by one of those in attendance, followed by an opportunity to come forward for prayer and anointing.

Please join us!

While folks usually come forward one at a time, they are often surrounded by others in attendance who sometimes place a loving

hand on their shoulder. In the year and a half of participating in this service, however, I had never had three people come forward together, side-by-side. It was a beautiful demonstration of solidarity, and later as I reflected on the experience, it occurred to me how appropriate it was, because healing almost always comes in the midst of community. Healing, of course, comes from the gracious hand of God, but more often than not, we are God's hands for those around us. God uses us when we gather together. We need one another for true healing.

And healing is what we're really all after in life, isn't it? Whether it is physical healing after an injury, emotional healing after a broken relationship, psychological healing after an experience of trauma, or spiritual healing after a crisis of faith, we are all looking for healing. And a worshiping community like Good Shepherd is a great place to experience and participate in the work of healing because we are a community focused on embodying the love and care of God for one another. We are both those seeking healing for ourselves and those offering healing to others. We are—as the priest and wisdom writer, Henri Nouwen, would say—wounded healers. And we find healing and offer healing in community.

This edition of *Tidings* — Behold! focuses on calling our attention to the many ways that God's presence is incarnated in the community of Good Shepherd. The word "behold" has mostly fallen out of use in contemporary English, and harkens back to the days of the King James

Wherever we gather together God is at work among us, bringing healing through the hands of those beside us.

Bible. In fact while the New International Version of the Bible uses the word just once, the King James Version uses it almost 1,300 times! Today we associate it most often with the telling of the Christmas story on the lips of Peanuts characters and angels (who always seem to prefer King James English), "Behold, I bring you tidings of great joy!" But if we're using the King James Bible, the word is all over scripture.

One of my favorite passages that uses the word takes place at the end of the gospel of John with Jesus on the cross.

"Now there stood by the cross of Jesus his mother...When Jesus therefore saw his mother, and the disciple standing by, whom he loved, he saith unto his mother, Woman, behold thy son! Then saith he to the disciple, Behold thy mother! And from that hour that disciple took her unto his own home." (John 19:25-27)

I can only imagine the grief and brokenness felt by the disciple and Jesus' mother there at the foot of the cross. I can only imagine the long road to healing they must have walked after that experience. Even after Jesus was raised I imagine the trauma of it all haunted their dreams for years to come. And yet seeing their pain (even while suffering his own), Jesus called on each to behold the path of healing in one another.

In my time here at Good Shepherd, time and time again I have beheld God's healing hand working among us. On Sunday mornings. In Grief Share. In discernment groups. On Wednesdays. At the food pantry. In the Pennies shop. Wherever we gather together God is at work among us. bringing healing through the hands of those beside us.

In this winter season perhaps you are looking for healing. Perhaps you feel isolated or alone. Perhaps you are looking for deeper connections. I invite you, then, to behold those standing beside you. Behold your community of Good Shepherd. Behold God's presence in those around you. And come, arm-in-arm, to experience the healing of God.

The Gift of Community A Reflection by Beth Bohnsack, Volunteer Youth Leader

Over the years while working with the youth of our parish, there have been many opportunities to see God's grace, goodness, and beauty at work. What stands out the most is seeing children grow into young adults, a transformation from sixth graders in middle school to seniors in high school. It is a joy to see them take leadership roles and guide the younger members of the group. It makes my heart happy when one of them steps up to support church leadership by vocalizing or explaining the importance of a project. The relationships that are built within the group strengthen each year. Sure, they may disagree and argue, but ultimately, they talk about it over time and remain friends with a stronger bond.

Some of the most enduring memories which demonstrate that God is among our youth community have occurred on our mission trips and pilgrimages. I can remember encouraging a sixth grader to go out and pick up trash because that was what needed to be done; flash forward and as a tenth grader that same person is leading a team of youth in anther project — digging a trench for a water pipe. The youth are proud of the work they put into mission trips. Some even had their family drive by St. Columba, in Marathon Key, to see the work they did in 2019 to assist with ongoing recovery after Hurricane Irma and helping the parish with light construction and thrift shop organization.

It's a rewarding to witness the youth demonstrate empathy and caring not only for those they serve, but for each other.

Over six years ago Good Shepherd began the practice of inviting a Youth Group member to report at Vestry meetings, which we continue today. It's helpful for our governing body to hear youth perspective, challenges, and successes — a reminder of finding God in one another and the wonderful gift we have in community.



Did you know that in addition to mission trips, Good Shepherd youth help ministries right here in our own neighborhood? Making sandwiches for bag lunches for distribution at St. George's Community Center in Riviera Beach is one way they have helped recently.



Where I feel His presence most, is in places and opportunities where I can help and give back. Over the years, Good Shepherd has given me a number of these of opportunities.

I learned about "gleaning" one Saturday, years ago, when a group from Good Shepherd joined others and picked corn in Stuart. My youngest son came with me and we spent three working hours picking corn and learning that our efforts would help others have fresh food. After Hurricane Maria hit the Florida Keys, again, the church offered the opportunity for me to put my faith into action and I spent a long weekend with others from our parish in Marathon helping to clean up after the destruction. We did not know the family we helped nor did they know us. They realized that we had been sent by the local Episcopal church and that beyond the physical labor we would offer, we would offer our fellowship. I was so pleased that later that year, the youth of the church would also travel to the Keys to continue to help the cleanup. These are just a few examples for me of how I feel and see God in my community.

Church to me is more than a building, and prayers are more than words. I gather with my faith-based community most Sundays (in person or virtually) and know that I have a place



to belong and worship. I am thankful for the Outreach Ministry here that provides opportunities for me to give back however I am able. The yearly drives that we have to help our local school children make my heart smile, as I am teacher and hate to see a child needing anything.

The food packing days that we have are filled with energy, love, and understanding for our neighbors, known and unknown. I believe that God and the Holy Spirit are present in all aspects in my life; however, I feel his smiles most when I can give back to my community. I am certain that is what drew me to Good Shepherd and eventually to the Outreach Committee. The motto "We have a place for you" is true here. I am grateful and thankful to have found a community that allows me to worship in many ways, not just on Sunday. *Thank you!*


